Engine House To Pick Council For Next Year

A "moderately heavy turnout of voters is expected" tomorrow to elect student officers of the School of Engineering, Mike Walsh '66, engineering elections chairman, said yesterday.

Walsh said that interest in the election appears to be running high in a number of hotly-contested races.

Engineers will vote in the Alumni Lounge in the same booths used for the Trinity College election.

Candidates for president of the Engineers' Student Council are Louis Hagood '65 and John McClain '65. Thomas Edgar '66, Stephen Simon '65 and Doug Colter '65 are running for vice-president. Alfred Duncan '65, Charles Wright '65 and William Rasnick '66, secretary; and Hal Byrd '66, treasurer.

Announced candidates for class officers are:

Senior Class: William Simpson and Thomas Price, president; Gary Witzenburg, secretary-treasurer.

Junior Class: Lester Hill and Thomas Harrington, president; Jeffrey Brick, secretary-treasurer.

Shophomore Class: Thomas Allen, president; Edward Brown, secretary-treasurer.

Outgoing members of the Engineers' Student Council are Ray Cox '64, president; Richard Zeren '64, vice-president; Ward Seull '65, secretary; and Louis Hagood '65, treasurer.

During its tenure, the council completely revised the engineers' constitution and re-organized the Engineers' Guidance Council.

Zeren listed "more cooperation among engineering organizations" as a probable priority concern of the incoming council.

Feazell vs. Evans

YMCA Elections Coming

G. Landon Feazell Jr. '65 will oppose Thomas S. Evans '65 for the presidency of the Young Men's Christian Association in the upcoming YMCA elections, Wednesday, February 26.

Nominees for the other three executive positions are: vice-president: T. Schley Gatewood '65, Frank J. Huffman Jr. '66; secretary: Harry A. Nurkin '66, Kent A. Zaiser '67; treasurer: Douglas A. Cotter '65, Thomas J. Herin '65.

Senior Cabinet

These nominees were selected by the senior nominating committee, consisting of the senior members of the YMCA Cabinet and the YMCA advisor, Rev. Jack Wilson. The selections were made after interviewing all students interested in the positions. Candidates may run indepen-

dently if they present a petition signed by a majority of the Senior YMCA Cabinet.

Campaign rules allow door to door canvassing by all candidates. Each candidate is allotted one poster in the Union basement and may distribute flyers. Campaigning will begin tomorrow election day, Wednesday, February 26.

Candidates may present their platforms on WDBS provided that opponents be given equal time.

Open Campaigning

According to present YMCA president James T. O'Kelley '64, "This is the first time the YMCA has tried to reach members by campaigning. Major emphasis is being placed on reaching the total student membership."

O'Kelley stated that candidates might possibly make appearances before fraternity and independent living groups.

Y-FAC

O'Kelley also noted that the newly-elected president will choose the Y-FAC chairman and the junior chairmen. The 4 chairmen will then select Y-Men for next year later next month.

There are 600 remaining student directorships in the 'Y' office and O'Kelley requested that anyone wanting an additional copy, stop by the 'Y' office.

West To Vote Tomorrow, 8-6

Elections for all West student government offices will be held tomorrow from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. in the Alumni Lounge.

The three candidates for President of MSGA held a half hour debate on WDBS yesterday evening. Ray Ratliff spoke first and emphasized that he is running on what he has done rather than promises. He went on to say that he would like to look into the possibility of establishing a campus cooperative, which would provide more student jobs and could save students money.

Ratliff said he would like eliminate much of the duplication of work done by the different student government committees. He proposed investigation of student salaries, if students agree with his ideas, and said, "I feel students (leaders) should not be paid salaries. . . ."

Randy Rollins was the second candidate to speak. He emphasized what he considers the three key concepts which will confront students next year: crisis, change, and opportunity. He stated he feels the student government is not fulfilling the needs of the students and that many students seem to think that student government "is on the other end of the campus". He advocated better communication between student leaders and the students, and would like the MSGA and all branches of student government to provide an environment for individual development.

Dick Lam, the last candidate to speak during the program, opened with his and Bob Holt's (Candidate for MSGA vice-president) campaign slogan, "a vote for us is a vote for you." He then presented several concrete items on which he would like to work. Lam would like to look into the possibility of having later library hours, especially during exam periods and during the mid-semester exam period. He would also consider, if elected, the possibility of establishing a place for students to cash checks on Sundays and a student book exchange.

Final Poll Shows Ratliff Has Edge

Chronicle conducted its last pre-election poll late Wednesday night. In a sample of 298 undergraduate men, Chronicle found Ratliff with a slight lead, but far short of a necessary majority. Rollins and Lam trailed slightly. No definite pattern could be detected. In the most closely disputed MSGA election in recent years the only thing predictable is that there will be a run-off next Friday.

WSGA Ends Social Standard; No Need

The Legislature of the Woman's Student Government Association in a meeting last night dissolved the committee on social standards and discussed revisions of the committee structure on East.

After passing a motion to remove social standards from the standing social standards committee, the Legislature passed a resolution stating that at this time there is no need for enforcing suggested social standards. If such a need arises, the Legislature will create a committee to consider the problem.

Revision

The suggested committee structure revisions will replace the three major committees with four standing committees. The international student committee will remain basically the same, though it will not include the student concern. The Co-ordinate Board will be replaced by the student welfare committee, under which will come student concern, and the educational affairs committee. The social-cultural committee will take the place of the social standards committee. The committee on revision, headed by Janet Huntley '65, also recommended coordination of these committees by the Vice-President of WSGA and the committee heads.

Other Business

In other business student concern announced a total collection of \$1365.30 with a few outstanding pledges.

To alleviate the problem of limited study rooms two additional rooms will be open on Sunday morning in Science Building.

The committee on foreign study abroad will set up a summer study program beginning with the summer of 1965. The program will be run in France, Germany and Spain and transfer credit will be possible. More information on study plans will be available through the dormitories.

Campus-Wide Convention

A New Political Structure

The assumed demise of the Campus and Union political parties has brought forth a deluge of proposals for nominating candidates for student body elections. These suggestions range from out-and-out jungle warfare to a ubiquitous interview system. One proposal, somewhere between these extremes, deserves further comment.

It has been suggested that a campus-wide nominating convention be held which would pick two candidates for each office to compete in the general election. Independent candidates could run, but only after the presentation of a petition much larger than the 100 signatures required now. There would be no delegations as such. Each living group would elect independent representatives to the convention in proportion to its size (a ratio of 40 students per representative has been suggested).

There are two main ideas behind this proposal—both of which appear valid. First, the artificial division of the campus into two parties of no unusual homogeneity would be eliminated. The campus-wide convention would recognize the very true fact—as we can see from the platforms tossed about this week—that there are no important issues around which parties could cluster. A corollary to this revolves around the notion that, with the absence of any real issue besides nomination and election, no reason existed for the unstable situation which developed this year. The single convention would discourage this wholesale abandonment for greener pastures chiefly because there are no other pastures.

The second idea behind the single-convention proposal was that the elimination of group-oriented delegations entirely would dampen any serious coalition which might again threaten the stability of the nominating mechanism. The sheer number of representatives (60) should pale any would-be organizer, and the uninstructed representatives themselves may be more ornery than the pragmatic delegations of this and previous years. Any coalition, if formed, would be much more shaky than the phalanxes formed this year.

The campus-wide caucus will never be a panacea. It will have its own weaknesses, just as the present party system. Nevertheless, even at its worst, the campus-wide caucus would assure a steady and measured flow of candidates into the MSGA elections. This would be an improvement.

An Uncovered Plot

February, if you have noticed the news pages of the Chronicle for the past two weeks, is the election month on West Campus. The MSGA balloting tomorrow was preceded by last night's Student Union election and will be followed Wednesday by the YMCA elections. This was not always so.

Two years ago, for instance, February was divorced from the barest hint of campus politics. In the spring of 1962 the Student Union picked its leaders March 1; the YMCA membership elected a president March 16; and the campus was forced to wait until April 6 to elect John Markas president of MSGA.

Ask any senior in one of these organizations about the reason for the change. His answer will be pat: (1) to give the new leaders ample time to make a host of appointments and (2) to allow them sufficient time to adjust to new and greater responsibilities while departing leaders are still around for advice and counsel.

These reasons, as a matter of fact, are just so much nonsense. The graduating senior who *reluctantly* turns over the reins of responsibility a month earlier than he received them is a myth, sinistinely constructed to cover a secret agreement made with the entering Class of 1970. By 1968, according to the plans and current trends, students will be asked to elect the president of MSGA during the summer preceding the candidates' junior year. Thus, the newly elected officers will be inaugurated immediately following Orientation Week and will relinquish office exactly one year later—with nine care-free months left until graduation.

But this is only half of the plot. The multitudinous senior honoraries, who award the student leader with a place on their hallowed rolls, will be composed entirely of students with no responsibility whatsoever. The honoraries' purpose will then become entirely social. Tentative arrangements for small excursions during the winter of 1969-70 have already been started. Among the more lackluster plans are visits to the Mardi Gras, Hawaii, the Dartmouth Winter Carnival, the Virgin Islands, and Stowe, Vt. One group has reservations for the 1972 Winter Olympics.

If you are galled by this whole idea, there is still time for action: write your MSGA Senator; phone your Y-Man; or stop by your friendly neighborhood Student Union office. And if all this fails, we can always have a coup d'etat.

From a report on "Matters Related to the Graduate School" of the University, published in 1960.

If we cannot afford separate graduate and undergraduate facilities, is Duke University too centered in the undergraduates? One professor thinks that a great danger to the achievements and prestige of Duke University is a "pathological over-attention" to undergraduates. Another such man, aroused by this Committee's questionnaire, deplored such things as the enforced personal conferences (e.g., the "freshman advising") that makes the teacher "a sort of psychiatric social worker or substitute parent." All this, he laments, "is not merely too much; it is utterly preposterous. And departments as a whole can suffer from this galloping schizophrenia. . . . It also encourages students to try to have it both ways. They would like to go to Harvard and have a Harvard degree. But they would also like to go to an intimate 'teaching institution' like Oberlin. So

they come to Duke hoping to enjoy the best of both worlds. No wonder some of them are disappointed.

"Clearly, if Duke is to become a great university something has got to give, and it will have to be the undergraduate school. I am not suggesting that we imitate the elaborate indifference to education that is supposed to have characterized Harvard during certain periods. But we could move in the direction of reducing the amount of intellectual nursemaid of students and of throwing them on their own resources. . . .

The student judiciary of Student Government has faced many rough tests in its long history, but none come close to matching in magnitude and social significance the problem face tonight: the first trial of a student charged with ungentlemanly conduct arising from the sit-in demonstrations.

The Honor Council realized that the cases arising from these demonstrations would be extremely controversial, and that any decision would likely please only a fraction of all those people on campus and around the state who are watching the Council's action with keen interest. Nevertheless, they felt the Student Judicial system is strong enough to meet this unprecedented challenge, to weather the fire that is sure to be aimed at it regardless of the decision.

The student is being tried under the broad "ungentlemanly conduct" clause of the Campus Code, and the legality of his actions, which will be interpreted by the civil courts will have little bearing on the verdict which the council must render.

What the Council must decide is the much larger moral issue of whether demonstrating in this manner constitutes ungentlemanly conduct in the current and changing context of today's society. . . .

Silversmiths Offer \$7000 In Scholarship Competition

Reed and Barton Silversmiths have announced the opening of their 11th Annual Scholarship Competition with over \$7,000 in scholarships and awards. The competition, is open to all undergraduate women.

In the "Silver Opinion Competition" twelve designs of sterling and eight designs of both china and crystal are illustrated. The entrant simply lists the three best combinations of sterling, china and crystal from those entries matching or coming closest to the unanimous selections of table-setting editors from three of the nation's leading magazines.

The First Grand Award is a \$500 cash scholarship; second prize a \$300 scholarship; third, a \$250 scholarship; fourth, fifth and sixth awards, \$200 scholarships each; and seventh, eighth, ninth and tenth awards, \$100 scholarships each. In addition, there will be 100 other awards consisting of sterling silver, fine china and crystal, with a retail value of approximately \$50 each.

Verna Lomax is the student representative conducting the competition for Reed and Barton East Campus. Those interested

Through the opinions on silver design expressed by college women competing for the scholarships, Reed and Barton will compile a library of expressions of young American taste.

Asian Studies

The Commonwealth Studies Center has received a grant to support its program in comparative studies on Southern Asia. The funds were provided by the National Defense Education Act.

Program chairman Dr. Ralph Briabanti, of the political science department, announced that this summer's two sessions will emphasize Southern Asia and will include courses in Hindi and Urdu, anthropology, history and politics. Special fellowships will be available for the language courses.

The sessions, from June 9-July 15 and July 16-August 21, will be the University's tenth consecutive program on Asia.

When Burl Rainwater (B.A., 1958) reported to Southern Bell in 1961, he coordinated the Bell System Census Project in Tennessee. Working out his own guidelines for collecting data, Burl analyzed his results to forecast household growth during the Sixties for each telephone exchange in Tennessee.

Success on this assignment earned him a new one where he also had to pioneer. When told to study the possible application of teaching machines to telephone training, he and another employee programmed an entire basic elec-

tricity course to show what the new devices could do. The textbook the two men developed for the machines was later copyrighted and published.

With such achievements behind him, Burl is now carrying out other interesting assignments in the Knoxville Commercial Office.

Burl Rainwater, like many young men, is impatient to make things happen for his company and himself. There are few places where such restlessness is more welcomed or rewarded than in the fast-growing telephone business.

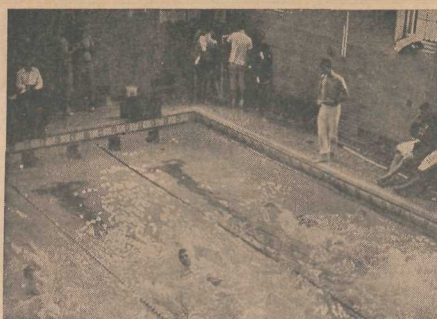
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Basketball: Feminine Point-of-View
