Freshmen Begin Four Year St

Devils To Test S.C. In Debut Tomorrow

At 8:00 tomorrow night the 14th edition of Coach Bill Murray's Duke Football Team will take the field in Columbia, South Carolina. The opponent is a big and ambitious University of South Carolina squad. Although there is an optimistic outlook in Blue Devil Land that a successful season is in the works, the Gamecocks are not a team to be taken lightly.

Last season's South Carolina squad sported a disappointing 1-8-1 record. Yet often their losses were close, due mainly to the mistakes of inexperience. Six South Carolina fumbles helped the Devils win by a 22-14 score last fall. Marv Bass' crew later lost to Wake Forest by one point, to Clemson by four, to Carolina by seven and to Maryland by eight. The added year of experience could well transform this team from a cellar dweller to a league leader.

The Gamecocks have almost always proven to be tough for Duke. In 1961, a late touchdown and the ensuing extra point gave the Devils a come-from-behind 7-6 victory. A similar battle is foreseen this year. South Carolina is pointing for this game. They want to get off on the right foot toward their march to a successful season.


OPTIMISM HIGH

Here optimism is the key word. A fine schedule, a large number of experienced performers, an explosive backfield and an improved defense are some reasons for the smiling outlook. Two members of the 1957 Orange Bowl team have been added as coaches. Former all-American and pro guard Mike McGee is an assistant line coach. Hal McElhaney is tutoring the linebackers. The line is larger and deeper than in past seasons. Increased practice stress on defense should have beneficial effects. Offensively the Devils will again be dangerous. The threat of a touchdown will always be imminent wherever Duke has the pigskin.

The grants anounced today are for the entire year although the in-dividual amounts will be credit-ed to the recipents by semesters.

In the freshmen class, 119 women received aid totaling \$120,200 and men students were awarded \$217,500 dollars in aid. Freshmen nurses received a total of \$17,150 toward their expenses for the coming year.

Why Eight Dollars?

The YMCA is asking \$8 from you for 'Y' memberships. The Chronicle has long been concerned with this excessive membership fee and we have never in recent years urged freshmen to join. We have watched with concerned silence. This year the YMCA has raised dues again and now we must finally draw the line.

The editors have poured over the 'Y' finances and feel the 'Y' is not justified in asking for the increase. The 'Y' does undertake many fine programs and renders many fine services to the University and we certainly do not take exception with the YMCA itself. However, the YMCA did not fulfill its program last year and the 'Y' could not supply us with any figure for any previous year—it appears that the YMCA did not keep an itemized accounting.

year—It appears that the FMCA did not keep an itemized accounting.

The YMCA is composed of 10 committees, an example of the program failure of the 'Y' last year can be seen in these figures compiled from the official and final treasurer's report of the YMCA, released 2 days ago.

We feel that before the 'Y' undertakes any expansion. it should first fulfill previous programs, show nee expansion and demonstrate the ability to meet

expansion and temonstrate the abouty to meet these needs.

We do not suggest you not buy a membership, neither do we urge you to buy one. Our intent is to call your attention to the failings of the past YMCA and to express our concern with its proposed budget and program. Eight Dollars is a substantial amount, before the YMCA should ask you for this amount they should demonstrate the need for it and explain their plans to cover these needs. Only then can you make an intelligent decision. In the days to come, during the membership drive, the 'Y' will attempt to inform you of their position. Consider it carefully.

We feel that the YMCA is long overdue for revision and introspection. Hopefully the 'Y' will now see the wisdom of this. The 'Y' should insure itself against failings again this year by striving for fiscal responsibility at all levels.

Freshmen Beware

It's really not a hoax but it is a deception. It's the same deception the University has been committing for several years. This year we are again compelled to bring the matter to the freshman's attention.

THE DECEPTION

In your orientation handbook there is a statement, "textbooks issued, Concourse of Indoor Stadium." The implication is clear and it is most certainly intentional, you are to buy your books at the Indoor Stadium. This is wrong, you are under no obligation to buy these books. THE BOOKS ARE NOT BEING ISSUED, THEY ARE BEING SOLD.

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BEING SOLD.

The bookstore is a University concession and its aim is to make money (which it does). The University bookstore is no different from any other business concern. The bookstore has found it most advantageous (profitable) to employ this clever deception of making it appear that freshmen must buy books at the Indoor Stadium.

We feel that it is only fair to note that books are also sold at the Book Exchange in downtown Durham. We will not recommend the Book Exchange but we cannot recommend the University. We urge you to shop around, ask an upperclassman—even a Y-Man. It has been our experience that the Book Exchange often gives better deals. USED BOOKS

Take special heed if the University Bookstore tells you that they have "just run out of used books." It is obvious that more money is made selling new books, however it is totally unnecessary for students to buy new books in most courses. A great deal of money can be saved by purchasing old books—spending money on new books is a luxury; you will find that this University wheedles enough money out of you to warrant savings now and then.

If the University Bookstore runs out of used books, perhaps you can check downtown.

FAST SELL APPROACH

Beware also of the fast sell, in some cases you will
not need all the books handed to you for a course. It
is our experience that checking with the professor to
see if all the books are necessary might result in

savings.

Freshmen will learn the tricks soon enough, but at least they can be forewarned.

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
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Naval ROTC Plans To Recruit Freshmen



Frosh Face Exams

Incoming University freshmen took a battery of placement tests today. This is an annual ordeal gone through by every Freshman class.

The results of these tests together with the Scholastic Aptitute Test and College Board Achievement Test are combined to give a basis for the Administration to place freshmen in advanced courses and sections.

The University's Bureau of Testing and Guidance has charge of organizing these tests. Today's tests are the culmination of half a year's work by the Bureau.

Math and Foreign Language

Two tests will be given to most of the students: mathematics, and a foreign language. The mathematics test is designed primarily for students who have not taken the College Board Tests already. Thus all Freshmen who plan to take a mathematics course, and have not already taken the College Boards should take the mathematics placement

test.

The foreign language test is taken by all Freshmen who
have studied a foreign language in high school, who did not
take the APP or College Board Tests, and who plan to study
the language during the fall semester.

Testing Bureau Program

Testing Bureau Program

Eight math majors and the Bureau's staff are used to score the mathematics tests, The foreign language tests are machine scored. To prevent the chance of error in correcting the tests, all are checked twice.

The main function of the Bureau, after giving the Freshmen placement tests, is counseling. The area of vocational-educational goals is the field in which students most commonly seek counsel and advice.

Slightly less than half the student body uses the Bureau at least once during its University career. The Bureau is headed by Dr. Robert M. Colver, a counseling psychologist.

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Closed Relations Govern Freshmen During Orientation Week Activities

Rules governing the relations of freshmen to fraternities and sororities go into effect this week. Fraternity men may not wear pins, jackels, or any other articles identifying them with their fraternities. Freshmen may not have dinner with a fraternity man, including Y-Men, unless they are with at least four members of their 'Y' group.

Under open relations, once the semester begins freshmen may associate with fraternity men on campus except at reg-istered freshman or fraternity functions. Freshmen and fra-ternity men may not associate at any time off campus, except with their Y-men in groups of four or more. Freshmen are not to discuss a fraternity or the fraternity system with a fraterfraternity system with a frater-nity man. They may not enter a fraternity section, nor are fraternity men to enter freshman dorms unless they are on legiti-mate business. These rules will prevail until Rush.

Sorority Rules

Similar in many ways to fraternity standards, sorority rush rules stress that Greeks do not wear sorority pins or display decorations in dorm rooms until classes start on Thursday

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Until rush officially begins, a sorority girl may visit rushees only in her own dormitory.

Prior to and during rush on visits outside the dormitory, two sororities must be represented on any visit to a room in which

a rushee is present

There is no other university in the nation which combines the academic excellence and the athletic prowess to such a high and successful degree as Duke University. A member of the Atlantic Coast Conference, Duke gives athletic scholarships in only football and basketball. Most of the other members of the conference have scholarship performers in golf, baseball, swimming, tennis, track, soccer and lacrosse. This fact accentuates the fine record the University maintains in intercollegiate athletics. The success of all teams depends on enthusiastic entry by the individuals. With so few scholarship athletes available, the "minor" sports are graced by students such as yourself, students who have an interest and enthusiasm for sports and who manifest it by trying out for a team.

Dave Uible graduated this June. He did not enter Duke on a football scholarship, yet, at this time last fall, he was Duke's starting quarterback. Although his football season and a promising baseball career (all-league first baseman) were curtailed by a serious knee injury, his success should stand as an example to all of those who are athletically inclined but are unsure of their chances against the "jocks."

THE INDIVIDUALS who carry Duke's name in the athletic world are your classmates, friends and fraternity brothers. They are not professionals. They are not perfect. They will make mistakes. They are students, like you, who are also involved in highly competitive and highly publicized extra-curricular activities. They do not have a pass to academic success, nor do they possess an impunity to the enforcement of University regulations. What you see on the football field on Saturday afternoon, or on the basketball court on any night, is not a group of Duke men getting together to put on an unrehearsed "performance." It is a team effort which is the result of many hours of practice sessions. In the same amount of time that you study, play cards, and watch television, these men are preparing for a game and studying. The effort involved is considerable.

THE MEN who represent Duke in intercollegiate athere are students first and athletes second. But they are more than that. They are fine citizens and gentlemen, and they are an integral part of the campus. John Markas was a starting guard on Coach Murray's football squad two years ago. In fact, he was elected captain of the team. He was also elected President of the Men's Student Government Association (MSGA), the highest student honor on campus. Jay Wilkinson won all-American laurels as a halfback last fall. This fall he is studying theology in Boston. Jay Buckley, the center on Duke's fine basketball teams of the past three years made up for what he lacked in ability with great desire and hustle. He was the first man named to the Academic All-American basketball team. He is now studying Nuclear Physics at Johns Hopkins on a NASA grant. In fact, thirteen of the twenty-one graduated seniors from the football and basketball teams have gone on for higher degrees in graduate schools.

THE HIGH quality of Duke athletes as students and as citizens is further cemented through their close association with the coaching staff—the men who guide the athletes and who affect them both on and off the playing field. Athletic Director Eddie Cameron is a distinguished leader among his fellow A.D.'s. Bill Murray was President of the American Football Coaches Association two years ago. Basketball coach Vie Bubas doesn't rant and rave, scream and jump up and down as do many coaches. Instead, he quietly and efficiently molds both great teams and great men. It is the same down the line of coaches—Carmen Falcone, Ace Parker, Dumpy Hagler, Bucky Waters, Chuck Daly, Jim Bly, Jack Persons, and all the rest are fine men.

BUT WHAT ABOUT the non-athlete who still has a great interest in sports? How does Duke fit his needs? There are several possible solutions. The intramural program, under the excellent supervision of Physical Education Director Dr. John Friedrich, is expanding rapidly. It is a varied and most important facet of life at Duke, Participate in it, for intramurals can only be what the student body wants them to be. Crowd support at varsity and freshman athletic events is another outlet for the vicarious athlete. It is not childish, "Mickey Mouse," or whatever you may think, to stand up and cheer a Duke team. Duke Depth, Defense, Speed To Be Tested by Gamecocks

The key to the rise of the Gamecocks this year will be their brilliant but brittle quarterback, "Deacon Dan" Reeves. After netting 1,401 yards total offense as a sophomore, Reeves was stidelined early last year, throwing Jim Rogers into the breach. Back at full force in Spring practice, Reeves is set to gain All-American acclaim. Coming off the undefeated freshman team of last year is boy wonder, Ted Wingard, who may see action at quarterback. As a unit, the Gamecock backfield is a tough, seasoned group. Halfbacks Marty Rosen and Larry Gill are explosive backs while fullback Pete Di-Venere is a fair rusher and better defender. All are seniors. Newcomer Phil Branson, a transfer from Kentucky, ran well this Fall at full.

Of twenty-two lettermen returning at Duke, most of them are in the line which will average a little under a hefty 220 a man. Head Coach Bill Murray is quick to praise his backfield though: "Glacken has a burning desire; Curtis is big and strong, and we believe he is ready to have a great season after injuries sidelined him most of the way last year; Bracy has speed and he too will start off at top form after a broken collarbone kept him out of the lineup and Odom is an all-around fine player."

Scotty Glacken is Duke's most acclaimed ball player. Last year he was second only to Junior Edge in passing in the ACC record). The four he threw against Clemson in our 35-30 win also equaled the previous standard. Kent Denton has been passing well this fall on the second unit. Junior Biff Bracy is "potentially great." Last year after being injured, he averaged 6.69 yards a carry in 26 attempts for 174 yards and on TD. He is a big back, 6-1, 200 pounds, with great steed. Like Glacken, not enough can be said about

6-2, 212 Mike Curtis. Great as a sophomore with three TD's, a 2.96 average gain, and 35 points, his injury in the State game all but ended our chances provided in the State game all but ended our chances wastly improved Dar for the ACC title last year. The 6-5, 240, who "lool fogottten man in the first unit backfield is balding Sonny Clome, 6-1, 188, out of school last year.

The second unit is composed of sophomore giant halfback Bob Matheson, 6-4, 213, and awhale of a defensive back, Rich Kraft, a fullback who ran well as Curtis's replacement last year and was even better in drills this year, and little (5-10, 177) John Gutekunst.

The difference in the caliber of ends on these two squads could make the difference in the game Saturday. South Carolina's are competent, but small. J. R. Wilburn is the best of the three returning lettermen, with juniors Scott Breeden and Doug Senter and Bill Dlekens, the sophomore son of Indiana Coach Phil Dickens, a promising new-comer. Duke is loaded at end this year with five returning lettermen. Of tight end senior Dave Burdette, 6-3, 203, Murray says "He's a fine blocker, a real scrapper, and he's always prepared. He knows what to do." Backing up will be big lettermen Al Matuza and Rod Stewart who along with soph Dave Dunaway will handle the punting chores. At the swing end replacing Stan Crisson will be Chuck Drulis' tough assignment. Back here too will be speedster Jim Scott and Sonny Morris, impressive last spring. Soph Dunaway figures here too. South Carolina has an enormous line as do most of the rest of Duke's ACC opponents. Holdover giants at tackle "Lil" Abner" Cox, 6-4, 250 and Len Sears, 6-5, 235 are two of the heftiest tackles in the ACC. Massive senior guards Jim Johnson, 6-3, 230 have been around. The line especially benefits in quality depth from the undefeated freshman team.

lineman but as 6-1, 210 he has some big opponents to take on this year. Bill Jones, 230, a junior is being pushed by the vastly improved Danny Litaker, 6-5, 240, who "looked well in all our pre-season drills," Don Lynch, 6-3, 206, and Chuck Stavins, 6-2, 220 are battling for the other second unit tackle position with letterman Lynch leading at the moment leading at the moment.

The guard position has been filled with the shift of J. V. McCarthy, the 5-11, 218, alternate captain from tackle. He will team with Fred Cromartie, a holdover starter on the first unit. Earl Yates, 6-4, 222 is showing well on the second team with John McNabb shifted from center and Bill Simpson, letterman end of last season battling to be his running mate.

There is only one proven center on both squads. Jon Linder, 6-2 215 will start for the Gamecocks but Mike Johnson, 6-3, 220 could oust the letterman. Bob Davis has been outstanding for two years for Coach Murray and has the size at 6-3, 218. Bill Thomas, switched from tackle, and soph Roger Hughes were impressive in early drills. Murray insists, "There will be a little platoning on the second unit, but the number one will go both ways." The notable exception will be specialist safetyman Bob Jamieson, 6-5, 204, who will replace the valuable Glacken on defense.

Scotty Glacken relays the feeling of the Duke team: "The South Carolina opener is a real test for us, they are always tough. If we can take that one, I believe we'll go."

Coach Murray sums up the Duke football outlook himself. "Naturally we're always optimistic at the start of a new season. I think we have a good nucleus to have a fine team. Our first two units at the moment have the capacity to give us a good team. But we can't afford many injuries because we London Heads Line

billed as another great Duke of experienced depth."

Rule Changes Affects Subs **And Timeouts**

NCCA rule changes for the 1964 season should produce a livelier, swifter game. The new substitution rule permits the use of two or three units and liberal employment of specialists. Last year's rule permitting free substitution only on certain downs proved unworkable and unpopular.

This year a full team can be sent in any time the clock is stopped. When the clock is running, each team is limited to two substitutions at any one time. The only other rule change of much significance to spectators is one designed to discourage deliberate out-of-bounds passes to stop the clock or to avoid yardage losses.

On such plays the clock will be started again as soon as the ball is spotted, instead of when it is put into play.
