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Fans flatten 11 as crowd storms to worship Ciompi

Eleven people were tragically killed last night, smothered by a flood of irate concert-goers when nearly 10,000 undergraduates stormed the Raunchy Conference Room as the doors opened for the bi-weeky Ciompi Quartet concert.

Upset by an hour-and-a-half wait, the crowd began chanting "Ciompi, Ciompi, Ciompi" and rushed the door, trampling the unexpecting fans in the front of the line. Apparently, the fans had become upset over the fact that the doors, scheduled to open at 7:30 p.m.,



One survivor who was at the front of the line reported that the crowd became even more agitated when Alfredo Ciompi, guitarist for the Quartet, came up to the locked door and began taunting the fans.

Ciompi, reached at Manella's during a post-concert party, denied the rumour. "Thatsa notta true. I wasa notta taunting thema. I wasa looking fora my wifea. I lefta my guitara at homa anda she wasa bringing ita

Paul Dumass, director of Public Safety, was at a convention in Philadelphia and could not be reached for comment. However, one security officer at the scene said there was nothing they could do to deter the

"We had plenty of officers on the scene earlier in the evening, but they were all outside when the rush occurred. There must have been 200 cars parked illegally, and most of us were out on the street issuing tickets," the officer said.

University President Terry Sanford, obviously distraught about the incident, said students would no longer be able to gain admission to concerts with their meal tickets. "If I had only done this earlier, this never would have happened. I thought we did away with that when we opened up the new student union. Since there are all kinds of free concerts in there, I did not realize this unjustified waste of parents' money was unnecessary," he said

Sanford commented that the money coming from home could be allocated to much more essential things, such as presidential campaigns

A memorial service will be held tonight at 8:15 in the Chapel. Organ music will be performed by Pete Townsend, who said in a telephone interview, "The Ciompis were nice enough to perform with us in Cincinnati. It's all I can do to return the favor.

ASSDU debate ends in war, happy birthday greetings

ASSDU bus service to Chapel Hill gets off to flying start.

Last night's ASDUdu meeting was marked by violence as a debate over whether to end debate on a discussion turned into all-out war.

The discussion was sparked by a bill brought to the floor by a legislator from House P which called for the lengthening of hours in Perkins Library. Apparently, many legislators felt they were not getting in enough studying time, due to lengthy ASSDU meetings.

This controversial issue came to a head when one legislator daringly asked whether ASDUmb meeting could be shorter in the future, suggesting that not everything discussed in the meeting is essential.

Ben Sheridan, speaker of the legislature and all round nice guy, seemed to resent this insinuation. He later said, "Everyone knows that ASDUck meetings are absolutely essential to the everyday functioning of the University. Just think what would happen if all of these obnoxious loudmouths who serve as dorm reps would be forced to go one week without having a chance to shout their fool heads off."

Shep Molye, parliamentarian, readily agreed with this assessment. "I mean, just think what I would be like without these meetings.

Bill Podonkey, chairman of the SUC, also extolled the merits of participation in ASDUII. He said he enjoyed the chance to hassle every other organization on campus for a few cents, and he "really gets chills down his spine when he does budgets.

During the discussion which opened and continued

to dominate last night's session this controversial issue forced heated argument. Several representatives came to blows and were later asked to leave the room or go sit in the corner. No final vote was taken on the matter, it was instead sent to committee. Sheridan predicted that the bill would reappear on the floor of the legislature some time in late 1985.

Porter Durham, ASDUyu president, said he was "shocked and appalled at the juvenile behavior with which my fellow student government bodies have conducted theirselves in this most solumn of forums. He said he planned to start a telethon to contact the legislators' mothers for assistance in "ascertaining that this won't happen again.'

A member of the executive who asked not to be identified, said he thought the University administration should be grateful to ASDUn for having devoted so many hours to alleviating the aggressive and oral tensions of the student government. "Them that talks the most, doesn't do,"

Since Sheridan had several people to wish a "happy birthday" before adjourning the meeting, all of the other bills scheduled for discussion were tabled until next week. Sheridan said next week's ASDUd meeting would be an "exciting" one with discussion scheduled on the new plan for the dining halls involving mandatory board, the beginning of construction of the University Center, and Chancellor A. Kenneth Pye's

Terry running for president on Prohibition Party ticket

University President Terry Sanford yesterday announced his candidacy for a 1984 run at the White House. "My goal is to make America less democratic and more totalitarian," said Sanford.

Speaking before the Women's Christian Temperance Union, the unsuccessful presidential candidate in 1972 and 1976 said, "If at first you don't succeed, try, try again. If you blow it a second time, what the hell, go for broke."

Sanford said he forsees no difficulty in gaining the nomination of the Prohibition Party. Reminiscent of the words of Duke alumnus Richard Nixon, the former North Carolina governor said, "Teetotalers are a 'silent majority.' I'm confident that all my fundamentalist brothers and sisters will come off their

wagons in 1984 to vote for their Uncle Terry."

Sanford recently made headlines as the leading force behind the Forum to Destroy the Presidential Nominating Process, a panel whose purpose is to devise a scheme to do away with presidential primaries, re-instate big city bosses, revive Chicagotype "graveyard" voters and restore power to the smoke-filled backrooms.

Among those serving on the panel are many Washington notables, who, like Sanford, have been

big losers in the presidential race: Robert Strauss, manager of former president and peanut farmer Jimmy Carter's disastrous re-election campaign; Edmund S. Muskie, unsuccessful candidate for president in 1972; and John Sears, former Reagan campaign manager fired after a tussle with Nancy Reagan over choice of bathroom wallpaper in the White House.

"If they didn't want him in '72 or '76, then we'll just have to change the rules and make the people take him in '84," said long-time friend Strauss.

"Terry has been like Roebuck to me," said Sears. "Without him, I wouldn't be where I am today."

The Prohibition Party was delighted to hear of Sanford's surprise announcement. Donny Osmond, party chairman, in Salt Lake City attending the Annual Circumcision of Mormon Tabernacle Choirboys, said, "Hot diggity dog."

With no other official party statements than the total prohibition of alcoholic consumption, Sanford is free to dictate the Prohibition Party platform. "First thing we do when we get elected is retrench Dean Smith," he said.

"I want to return to the gool 'ol days, when Americans were proud to be Americans, when it really meant something to vote."

Sanford outlined his voting requirement proposal, known as "Non-blind admissions," that would give the ballot to the top 50 percent of the country's population in terms of wealth, and to the needy, the minorities and North Carolinians. Under Sanford's plan, many middle-class white Americans would lose the right to vote.

"It's modeled after the changes we're making in the admissions and financial aid policies at Duke," said Sanford.

Another of Sanford's proposals includes the revamping of the food stamp system, placing responsibility for it under the auspices of the Duke Dining Halls.

"People on food stamps have it too good," he said. "If they were forced to eat in the Pits, you can bet (but not a beer) that they'd get a job real fast.'

Although no public announcement has yet been made, the Assolus has learned from Ken "Deep Throat" Pye that Sanford has narrowed his list of vice-presidential nominees to five: Clay Hamner ("IfI don't make him my Veep, he's liable to buy the White House"); Major Attractions Chairman Cliff Chanler ("We could use some variety in government"); Martin Bronfenbrenner ("That guy really knows how to handle the Japanese"); Robert Young ("Tm sure Margaret Rose could use a new interior decorator"); and Gerald Ford ("I need somebody who knows what he's doing").

Sanford has already named Richardson Preyer as press secretary. Said Sanford, "Poor Richardson has to have someone to talk to."

Terry's Palace, located in the subbasement of the Trampeled Crow Hotel complex, will be designed after the MGM Grand Hotel in Las Vegas.

"It's going to be the hottest place on campus," said Trampel Crow, president of the firm and a frequent visitor to Sanford's late-night Allen Building poker

Sanford's poker games have drawn the attention of the national press lately after his latest book, A Danger of Bluffing, was published last year. Asked about the book, Sanford said, "Oh, is it out now?"

Although SHAKEIT will now own and be responsible for the maintenance of the Chapel structure, the University retains the right to use the building at the following times: Saturday mornings and afternoons, all day Sunday, and Monday nights.

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

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
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

Dad, can another points?

The Chronicill has learned that University President Terry Sanford has learned what Duke student bodies have known all semester: You can buy sex with meal plan points.

This latest scandal involving the new meal plan — following the discovery that points can buy beer and wine in the Cambridge Inn — has led to a series of the coveries which threaten the illicit sex life of every Duke undergraduate.



Chronicill reporters, dressed as normal students and wielding their points-heavy meal cards, were sent to do some undercover research. Although they said they tried to get solicited, all they ate was lunch.

Porter Durham, ASSDU president, said that while he understood Sanford's reasoning for ending the sex-for-points plan, he was glad that the scandal would "finally end those stupid myths about not being able to get laid at Duke."



Duke athletic director Tom Butters yesterday asked for the resignations of sports information director Tom Mickle and assistant Johnny Moore because of 'an obvious conflict of interest" concerning their jobs

with the athletic department

Mickle and Moore both held outside jobs of which Butters was not aware until recently. Mickle, a 1972 Duke graduate, has been a beer taster with the Anheuser-Busch Company for the past 23 years, while the 5-2 Moore has held a starring role in the popular television series Fantasy Island since the show's inception.

before the blowout."

"I told Butters the show hasn't affected my performance here in the least - that I'm still the same model of efficency I've always been," said Moore. "For some reason, though, he just laughed and wished me well.

Returning from a recent trip to the Middle East, Virginia's All-American center Ralph Sampson has decided to follow the footsteps of another 7-footer and change his name for religious reasons.

Sampson, college basketball's player of the year, said his new name will be Jacob Meyer Leibowitz, following his conversion to Judaism and his initiation into the Theta Chi fraternity at the university.

Duke senior Larry Linney has accepted an assistant coaching position at Brigham Young University. Fellow forward Gene Banks, having rejected the NBA, will accompany Linney to BYU, where he will be in charge of tuxedo rentals and floral arrangements at all worship services.

Terry Sanford may have handed down the law on selling beer for dining hall points in the Cambridge Inn, but Duke athletic director Tom Butters seems to have come up with a way to undermine the University

Butters, ever the opportunist, announced yesterday that beer will be sold for points at all home football games in Wallace Wade Stadium and at all home basketball games in Cameron Indoor Stadium.

Duke football coach Red Wilson was ecstatic, "This

is one of the greatest things ever to happen to Duke football. It should really help us to win more home games in Cameron Indoor Stadium."

Duke assistant basketball coach Bobby Dwyer will become head basketball coach at Jersey City State College in Jersey City, N.J. next season, according to published reports in the Bergen Co. (N.J.) Record.

Senior basketball player Kenny Dennard has decided that the National Basketball Association is not for him after all.

Several NBA scouts reportedly informed Dennard that he would not be selected on the first round of the annual college draft this summer and this cooled the scrappy 6-8 forward to the idea of the NBA.

"Dean Smith said several times over the last few years that I was a 'definite' first-round pick," a tearful Dennard said. "But after the way Carolina played in the finals against Indiana, I guess all the scouts figured, 'Hey, what does that guy Smith know







© 1981 NYT News Service GDANSK, Poland — The national commission of Poland's independent labor movement, despite heavy attacks on its agreement with the government, voted here Tuesday night to abandon a general strike that had been threatened for Tuesday.

The vote, in a sense a vote of confidence in the leadership of Lech Walesa, was 25 in favor of calling off the strike, four against and six abstentions.

The meeting was called to ratify an agreement reached Monday with the government after four rounds of talks. Union delegates from around the too vague and too conciliatory. Much more could have been won, they said, if the union's negotiators, headed by Walesa, had stood firm.

At the same time, the delegates reported that factory workers were relieved that the strike was canceled and that it would be almost impossible to gear them up for another strike threat

The agreement with the government seemed to fall short of the union's demands, but it did advance some of those demands significantly. In past confrontations, the government had almost totally capitulated. The union has never had to compromise before

Krzyzewski inks Wendt

Greg Wendt, a 6-6 swingman from Catholic Central High School in Detroit, Mich., agreed to attend Duke next season last Monday night, as predicted in Tuesday's Chronicle. Wendt is the second recruit to be

signed by first-year Blue Devil head coach Mike Krzyzewski. Dan Meagher, a 6-7 forward from Canada, committed to Duke in October.

Wendt, who was also considering attending Michigan, averaged 32.1 points, 14 rebounds and five assists per game in leading Catholic Central to a 17-6 record this season. He was named first-team all-state.

"He's got a lion's heart," said his high school coach, Bernie Holowicki. 'You can't leave him open. All he saw all year was a box-and-one or a diamond-and-two, and he still fought and clawed his way to 30 points a

"He wasn't rated anywhere before the season, but he improved so much, he worked so hard. He's one of the best ever to play at this school."

Some of the athletes Catholic Central has produced are former North Carolina stars Tom LaGarde and Tom Zaligaris and current Notre

was heavily recruited by Krzyzewski last year and overshadowed Wendt until this season.

Described as "an excellent perimeter player" by Krzyzewski, Wendt was also a lefthanded baseball pitcher in high school, like another former Catholic Central star, Frank Tanana of the Boston Red Sox.

Moon loses libel suit

LONDON - In a case that could have wide international repercussions, the Unification Church, founded by the Rev. Sun Myung Moon, lost a major libel suit against a London newspaper Tuesday.

The Daily Mail, which won the case, had made the five-month trial into a far-ranging review of what it said were brainwashing and kidnapping techniques practiced by the controversial church. Accepting the newspaper's view, the jury Tuesday not only ordered the church to pay court costs estimated at nearly \$2 million, but also unanimously

recommended that the church's taxfree status "should be investigated by the Inland Revenue Department, or the ground that it is a political organization.

Through its British director, Dennis Orme, the Unification Church had filed suit over a two-page spread that the Mail published in May 1978, about the church. Under the headline "The Church That Breaks Up Families," the paper recounted two case histories of young Britons lured into the "sinister sect" while on visits to California, and warned:

"It woos to its ways young people who walk out on their everyday lives. leave behind families in despair.

Suspect wrote of his plans to actress

WASHINGTON — Federal investigators have found evidence suggesting that John W. Hinckley Jr. attempted to assassinate President Reagan Monday in an effort to impress Jodie Foster, an 18-year-old

actress whom he apparently never met.

"I have killed the president," Hinckley wrote to Foster in an unmailed letter investigators found in his Washington hotel room Monday, according to one account provided by sources familiar with the

investigation.

Another account reported that Hinckley wrote, "If you don't love me, I'm going to kill the president."

Hinckley apparently imagined that Reagan had somehow insulted Foster, officials said. This suggestion was contained in another letter to the actress which Hinckley had sent her in recent weeks.

The nature of the imagined insult was not disclosed by officials.

Investigators believe Hinckley developed a romantic fantasy for Foster after seeing the 1976 movie "Taxi Driver," in which she portrayed a teenage prostitute.

In the movie, the protagonist, played by actor Robert DeNiro, is a taxi driver who plots the assassination of a United States senator after his romantic overtures toward one of the senator's aides are rejected.

Federal investigators believe that Hinckley may have been living out the role of the taxi driver.

Foster, currently a freshman at Yale, issued a statement Tuesday which said, "The FBI and the U.S. Attorney's office have asked me to say nothing about John W. Hinckley, but I do wish to say that I have never met, spoken to or associated with him."

Justice Department officials said Foster has

received several letters from Hinckley in recent months. They would not discuss the contents.

The unmailed letter found in Hinckley's room at the Park Central Hotel here, officials said, indicated that he was in a despondent, fatalistic mood and might take some action that would result in his death.

Federal agents questioned Foster in New Haven Tuesday, sources close to the investigation said.

Hinckley was in custody Tuesday in Virginia as FBI agents in Washington, Nashville, Denver, Dallas, Los Angeles, and Lubbock, Texas, investigated his background. Hinckley lived in or visited all those cities during the last several years, officials said.

Hinckley was moved before dawn to a small prison cell at the Marine Correctional Facility in Quantico, Va., following the formal filing of charges against him at a midnight court session here.

In his appearance before federal Magistrate Arthur L. Burnett in the United States Courthouse, Hinckley was charged with attempting to kill Reagan by shooting him with a pistol, and with assaulting a Secret Service agent.

Hinckley was overpowered at the scene, and police recovered a .22 caliber pistol from him.

Monday night, Burnett ordered Hinckley held in without bail. He set a bail hearing for Thursday morning.

Once, when Burnett asked Hinckley if he was familiar with his legal rights not to enter a plea and not to give testimony against himself, Hinckley rose from his chair and answered, "Yes, sir."

Hinckley was represented by two court-appointed lawyers, Edward Wilhite and Stuart F. Johnson. He was dressed in heavy cotton blue coveralls cutoff at the sleeves

Charles F.C. Ruff, the United States attorney for the District of Columbia argued against bail for Hinckley. He said investigators had developed information indicating that the defendant was "a wanderer and irresponsible." He noted that Hinckley had "irregular habits."

When the session ended, Hinckley was driven to the Marine base at Quantico where he was placed in a 6-by 10-foot cell in a block containing five other unoccupied cells. He was given a sedative after an examination by a prison physician.

As investigators checked Hinckley's recent movements, little information was made public about their findings. According to officials, Hinckley appears to have arrived in Washington on Sunday by bus, possibly from Denver where his parents live.

They said he checked into the Park Central hotel, located two blocks from the White House, where he took a \$42 per night room

took a \$42 per night room.

Investigators searched the room Monday night, discovering the unmailed letter to Foster, and other undisclosed possessions.

Reagan OK; others doing better

WASHINGTON — President Reagan was reported in "exceptionally good condition" and given a favorable prognosis by his doctors here Tuesday, after passing a critical stage in his recovery from emergency surgery to stop life-threatening bleeding from a bullet wound in his left lung.

That stage was the removal of a tube that had been placed in Reagan's windpipe during surgery and kept there afterward, largely as a precautionary measurein case he required mechanical assistance in breathing.

Dr. Daniel Ruge, the president's personal physician, said late Tuesday afternoon that Reagan "is doing extremely well." The president was awake much of the night, but then slept in the morning, read newspapers and began eating soup and gelatin. He is receiving intravenous fluids and antibiotic drugs.

The president's breathing is painful because the bullet cracked the seventh rib and he has a 6-inch chest incision from the operation. Also, there are two other tubes still draining material from his lungs through his skin, and the tubes are connected to suction darriess.

Even so, Reagan was "requiring almost no pain medication at all," according to Dr. Dennis S. O'Leary, dean for clinical affairs at George Washington University Hospital where Reagan is a patient in the intensive care unit. By Robert Reinhold

His doctors said the 40year-old Brady was conscious, with eyes open and that his pupils reacted well to light. He obeyed commands to move his left arm and leg and to wiggle his toes, and he squeezed his wife's hand with his right hand. The left side of his body did not respond so well, but it was not yet clear if there was full paralysis. Tuesday evening the hospital listed his condition as "critical but improving." Brady suffered "fairly extensive" damage to tissue in the right side of his brain but only "minimal" damage to the left, said Dr. Dennis S. O'Leary, dean of clinical affairs at George Washington University Hospital, where Brady underwent about four hours of surgery Monday night.

Meanwhile, two law-

enforcement officers also struck in the fusillade of bullets aimed at the president were reported to be in stable condition Tuesday. Timothy J.
McCarthy, 31, a Secret
Service agent, was "doing
very well" after surgery to repair liver damage and was expected to recover fully, according to a spokesman for the service. The other officer, Thomas K. Delahanty, 45, a District of Columbia policeman, was reported to be still in "serious" condition, but coherent and "doing quite well' with a bullet still lodged in his neck, according to a police spokesman
