'Playboy' to run special on 'Deans of the ACC'

Semans for her "outstanding contributions to the people who have made outstanding contributions to the University," said Giggie Tickle, committee member and Trinity senior.

University Chief Teri Sinful announced Thursday that a special committee has been formed to explore the means of discerning the possibility of establishing a task force for attracting minority professors and students to Duke.

The committee is due to file its report in the spring of the 2035-2036 academic year at which point it will be submitted to the Board of Trustees who will eat fine meals and discuss stock portfolios.

Sinful praised the plan and said, "Thank God it will be submitted 50 years after my retirement so I won't have to make any risky decisions."

President Ronald Raygun, under a lot of pressure recently for his militaristic attitude toward El Salvador, tried to ameliorate the festering animosity between him and the South American nations yesterday by participating in the first-ever "Soccer for a Nuclear World" symposium, held on the White House lawn.

U.S. and U.S.S.R. to swap nuclear weapons, we think

In a joyous and historic ceremony Thursday, the leaders of the United States and the Soviet Union agreed to put an end to disputes over military advantage and aggression by trading the entire nuclear arsenals of the respective countries.

"Yeah," said President Raygun, "It just occurred to us, since we always say they have more and they always say we have more, why don't we just switch and then everyone will feel secure."

Soviet leader Yuri Andropov said he was pleased with the agreement, saying, "The first thing I'm going to do when the deal comes through is take a ride on one of those big submarines."

At midnight tonight, U.S. officials will take the estimated 20,000 to 30,000 American nuclear warheads to the front door of the Kremlin, ring the door-bell and run around a corner. Soviet officials will do the same at the White House.

Caspar, the friendly secretary of defense, said, "Sure its going to be sort of tough learning how to work all the Russian equipment, and don't get me wrong, we might make a couple mistakes here and there, but I think its worth the risk."

Members of the American nuclear forces had mixed reactions in a poll taken after the announcement.

"I'm glad," said G.I. Joe, stationed at the NORAD post responsible for scanning the globe to bring you the constant variety of Nukes, "Our equipment always breaks and screws up. If you only new how many times we've almost destroyed the world."

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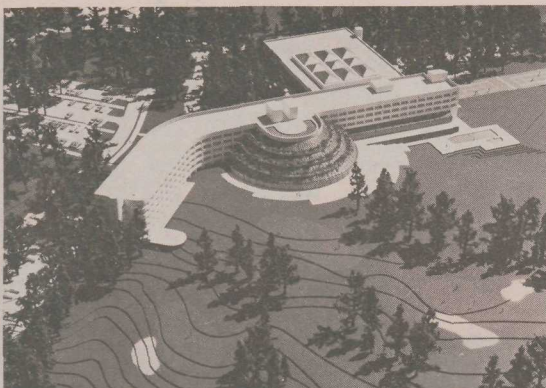
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Jocks to get \$500 million condominium

To increase Duke's chances of landing the best athletes in the nation, a \$500 million luxury condo for jocks will be constructed instead of a proposed student dormitory, Univeristy officials announced Thursday.

All male and female varsity athletes will be given a private room; each equipped with a bathroom and jacuzzi, as well as color TV, air conditioning, carpeting, maid service, stereo, stocked bar and facilities for overnight guests.

The building will have built-in French, Italian and Chinese restaurants, swimming pools, tennis courts, bowling alley, X-rated movie house and massage parlor.

"Since these scholar-athletes work so hard and give so much to the school, it seems reasonable to give them this small privilege," said Tough Tom Bitters. "Afterall, can an A.B. Duke scholar dunk a basketball?"

Bitters said money for the building would come from regular student financial aid. "Some students may have to leave Duke, but they're a drain anyway," Bitters said.

Freshman basketball player Bill Jermkan said he thought jocks should

get special treatment. "We have to play basketball a couple of hours a day, and it would be at least a 10-minute ride over from East Campus. Besides, I don't like having to see all those students study; it makes me feel like I should study, too."

Football coach Steve Loan-shark said he welcomed the new condominium. "We'll be able to recruit more of these scholar-athletes that Duke wants. Why, we just recruited a star lineman whose SAT score at least matches his weight."

Bitters said each jock would have the option of living in the condo or renting it out for \$10,000 a month to a Scrap-Iron Duke. "Renting them would be a good way to earn some lunch money," Bitters said.

Housing empress Dragon Lady Bushwoman said she didn't want to discuss the new building. "Don't talk to me," she said. "I don't want to say anything controversial or I'll get all kinds of nasty notes."

William Wypmth, in charge of nothing, said, "I tried to see that all students are treated the same, but Bitters unleashed a couple of 500-pound scholar-athletes on me to persuade me of the error of my ways."

Ending more than a century of delay, University officials announced they would begin work on an Afro-American-Women's-Gay and Lesbian-Central American Solidarity Committee-Foreign Student-Off-Campus-Type Center to be located "somewhere in North Carolina."

Nicknamed the "Freak Center," officials hope it will end "years of bellyaching" by "all kind of weirdos" who have sought a center where fellow freaks could meet. Vice president of non-action Willy Wymph said, "I'm against students developing any kind of identity other than as typical lazy Dook students, but I'm willing to give all these weirdos a place of their own."

"We don't know exactly where it will be located yet, or when it will be ready, or how much room there will be in it, but we're terminating all these students' housing licenses in anticipation of the move."

Even Chapel Hill President Willie Fruitcake has gotten into the roll of things. "I get to have the opening break," he giggled.

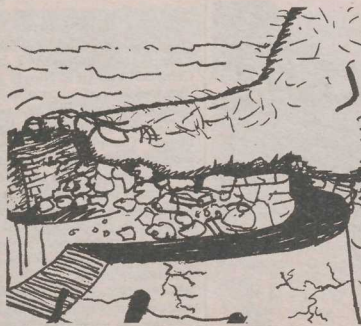
What's a Terrapin?

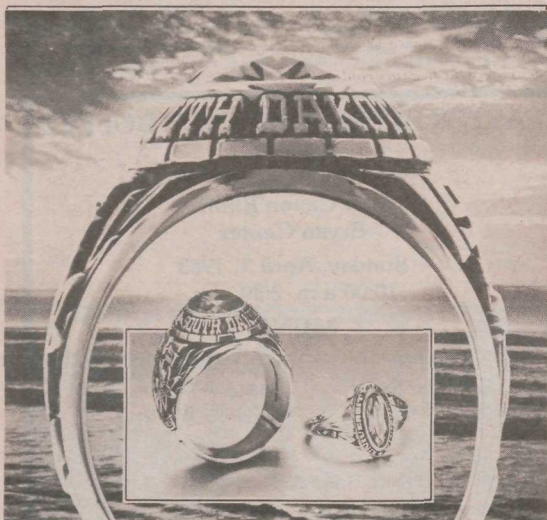

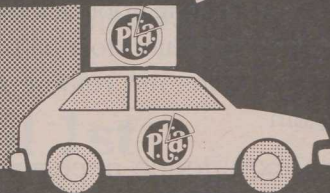

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Public menace officers gun down student

From rumors and C.I. gossip

Duke Public Menace officers shot and killed a student Thursday for allegedly "swinging a deadly bookbag," according to menace director Paul Dumbass.

"The student was walking along Chapel Drive and bumped into one of our officers with his bookbag. The officer, sensing an ambush, immediately called for 10 backup teams.

"After the teams arrived, the menace officers surrounded the student and told him to drop the bag. When he reached for a textbook, we let him have it."

An autopsy report showed that 20-year-old John Smith was shot 100 times in every part of his body. "Books can be deadly weapons, just like big sticks," said one of the officers, attempting to defend the shooting.

"Have you ever been hit with a history book," another officer asked. "It can leave a mighty big bruise, you know. We were only trying to defend ourselves."

The *Chemical* heard a different story from a suspicious source, however.

"Listen, we all know public menace is for losers who couldn't make it as regular storm troopers. Life gets pretty boring around here when all you do is give parking tickets and harass black students for looking suspicious.

"Smith went for his history book and the officers just overreacted a little, that's all. None of them had ever fired their guns at anyone, and they were real curious to see what would happen," said the source.

According to Dumbass, all the officers will receive raises and medals. "We have to recognize this kind of bravery in the line of duty," he said. "Smith could have given one of those officers a big black and blue. They had no choice but to fire once or twice."

Dumbass said a grand jury would look into the case, but called it "just a formality." "The jury won't do anything. This is a clear case of self-defense."

Democrats. Fourth, they take up space that could be used by some enterprising free-market capitalist as a drug store or hot dog stand.

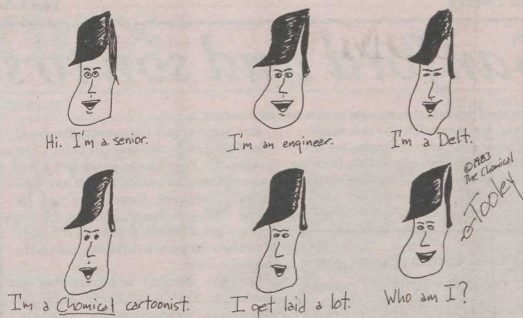

Soccer shakeup: Rainy axed

Former player replaces successful coach

Duke head soccer coach John Rainy, who led the Blue Devils to a 22-1 record and the runner-up spot in the nation last season, was forced to resign his position, the *Chomical* learned Thursday.

Rainy will be replaced by sophomore striker Melon Robinson, who left the team last September for personal reasons.

In a prepared statement Duke Athletic Director Tom Parkay said Rainy's services "were no longer needed. He had taken the program as far as he possibly could." Parkay could not be reached for comment at any of his three palatial mansions or at his houseboat on the French Riviera. His trusty assistant, Dick York, was

out to lunch.

Sources close to the athletic department said that Parkay could no longer afford Rainy's substantial salary, especially after the Duke AD recently put a downpayment on a new Mercedes.

The *Chomical* also learned that Rainy would be offered the position of head nurse in Duke Hospital South's proctology wing. "After taking it up the chute from Mr. Parkay for four years I feel like I'm more than qualified for the job," said Rainy.

Because of the limited time available to prepare his squad for next weekend's McDonald's Spring Soccer Classic, Robinson has engaged the services of former teammates Luis Frieto and Karloff Illic, both of whom spent a large part of their careers in Rainy's doghouse.

"It really smelled in there," said Frieto. "It was dark and the food was terrible."

Duke reserves Tohd Andersohn, Greg Went and Jay Byron, unsatisfied with coach Nikita Krushchevski and his basketball program, will transfer to schools with more firmly established basketball traditions, the *Chomical* has learned from scurrilous-sources.

That awkward-looking jump shot of Went's is surprisingly effective despite taking forever to release. All he needs is to learn to get rid of that woman-to-man brand of D that K instills. With Went, we'll play some serious zones."

Greg, a legend in his own driveway, affectionately was called "Went to the Bathroom," by neighborhood tots.

Byron has narrowed his list of potential schools down to just Louisville and Kentucky. Byron, a 6-8 disco boy and bench rider for Krushchevski, was reached Thursday at his chalet home in Aspen, Colo. "They'll both need a lot of help up front next year. Plus, Joe Blow Hall and Donat Crumbs told me they've never seen so much power in a forward. I guess they've

Crum reveals Lewis as 340-year-old ex-Munster

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. — Plans for Saturday's Louisville-Houston basketball showdown were placed on hold Thursday, when it was discovered that Houston head coach Guy Lewis is really former television actor Al Lewis.

Lewis, who gained fame while portraying "Grandpa," on the series *The Munsters* in 1964-65, has compiled a 529-245 record in 28 seasons as the head coach at Houston. Prior to 1965, he coached the Cougars part time while pursuing his acting career.

The secret of Lewis' second identity — which he discarded several years ago — was uncovered early Thursday by Louisville head coach Denny Crum. Arriving early for the Cardinals' morning workout at the University of New Mexico, Crum said he found Lewis hanging upside down from one of the baskets inside the darkened arena.

"It was goddamn horrible," said the normally unflappable Crum. "I used to watch the *Munsters* and think it was all fake, but after seeing Grandpa, all dressed up and hanging there... ugh! And those fangs, all yellow and disgusting. Somebody should have told Al about Ultra-Brite."

According to Crum, his screams awakened Lewis, who, turned into a bat and flew away.

NCAA officials said that because of the deception Houston will either have to forfeit its shot at the national championship — giving Louisville a free pass into the finals — or play the tournament games with center Akeem Abdul Olajuwon as its coach. University of Houston president Elvin Hayes Sr. said the school is weighing its options.

"We were gonna make Al forfeit all of Houston's games for the past 27 years, but he came in dressed like Napoleon and threatened to turn us all into wolves," said NCAA Enforcement Director I. Scrood Climson. "Plus, he came in with some huge guy in a Frankenstein suit. So we took it easy."

Proof of Lewis' true identity goes beyond the statements of Crum and Climson. Friends of the family say Lewis cannot be seen in mirrors, never schedules day games and has an instinctive aversion to garlic.

"Yes, yes, I'm Grandpa," Lewis said when contacted via a Ouija board. "I'm 340 years old, and I've been sentenced to walk the earth eternally until I win a national title to make up for the one the Big E [Elvin Hayes Jr.] lost for us in '68."

Lewis revealed that he is in the midst of concocting a

Also featured are: "The Othell Wilson" — watch it,

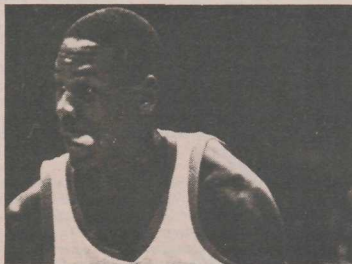

The children's menu includes "The Ricky Stokes Salami Sandwich" and "The Richard Ford Frankfurter."

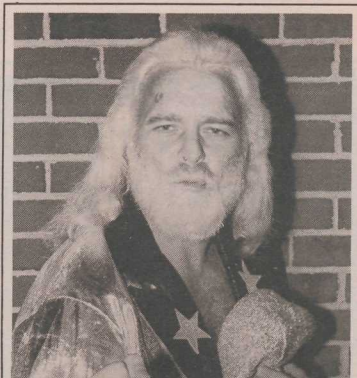

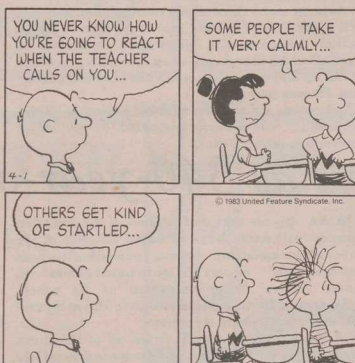

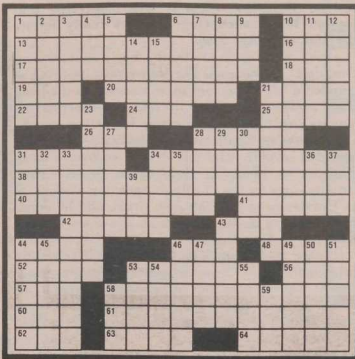

Hold on to your helmets, everyone. The *Chemical* sports staff has learned that former Duke football mentor Surely "Red means Blood" Wilson has been appointed Chief Surgeon at the University Medical Center.

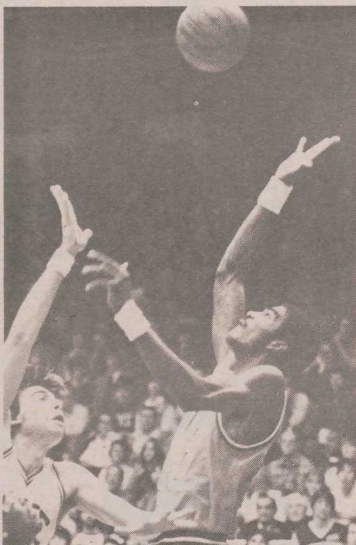

Leopard inks black player

Duke women's basketball coach Debbie "Can't change the color of my spots" Leopard announced Thursday that she had received her first verbal commitment in three years from a black player. Anne Parker, a 6-8, 215-pound All-America center from Brooklyn, gave the nod to the Blue Devils over traditional powers Old Dominion and Louisiana Tech.

Leopard, whose teams have become known as the "Pale Devils" in recent years, guided her squad to a 15-10 mark this past season. Six of those losses came to three Atlantic Coast Conference schools with predominantly black top 20 programs: Maryland, North Carolina and N.C. State.

"I learned my lesson this year," Leopard said. "Our team isn't going to be great until we get some real ballplayers on the court. Anne is going to enable my squad to really take off. I'm tired of watching UNC's Kathy Crawford yell 'In your face' at my players. I'm tired of not having a transition game."

Duke players were elated upon hearing the news and immediately embarked upon a campaign to make Parker's adjustment to college basketball as easy as possible.

Strains of the Sugar Hill Gang's latest album blared across the locker room during a special team meeting Thursday. It's the kind of thing that has Leopard extremely optimistic about the future of Duke basketball.

"It took me a while to stop seeing the light, but I'm really glad I did," Leopard said. "Ain't no stoppin' us now."

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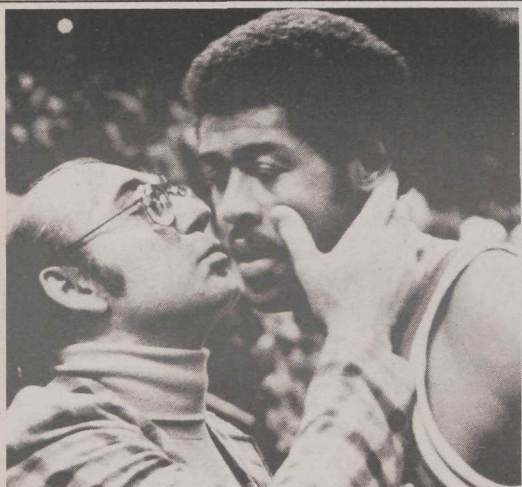

Moore arrested for theft of Duke soccer trophies

Duke assistant sports information director Johnny "Tattoo" Moore was arrested Thursday and charged with the theft of two trophies belonging to the Blue Devil soccer team.

The alleged theft, which was captured on camera by *Chemical* photographer Steve Foolman, took place during a basketball game Jan. 18 in Cameron Indoor Stadium. According to Public Safety officer Kruppke Playpolice, Moore swiped the trophies — which commemorated Duke's 1982 Atlantic Coast Conference championship and national runner-up finish — and attempted to hold them for ransom.

"He sent notes to Bob Bender and several Iron Dukes demanding enough money for a trip to Fantasy Island," said Playpolice. "He said some guy named Ricardo was waiting for him."

The 4-foot-1 Moore, who has worked at Duke for six years, is being held without bail by Elson Armstrong, sports editor of the *Carolina Times*.

"Nobody can escape the grasp of Big Elson," said Playpolice. "We send our worst offenders to him."

Moore was turned in to Public Safety by his assistant, John Roth. "Anybody would have done what I did," said Roth. "I have to move up to covering football and basketball. One more fencing match, one more women's tennis match

and I'd go bananas."

Sports Information Director Tom Mickle refused comment on Moore's arrest, but was heard to be giggling uncontrollably behind his locked office door.

Moore used his one phone call to dial the *Chemical* sports department and issue a one-sentence statement: "Please, don't tell my wife."

No date for the trial has been set.

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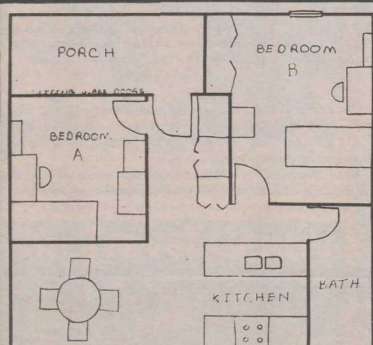
