Brodie, Campaign director duke it out

More than a month of relative peace between Capital Campaign director Joel Fleishman and President Keith Brodie ended abruptly Tuesday when Fleishman leaned over to Brodie during a luncheon and told him to "just shut the hell up."

The remark, made in front of a room full of prospective donors, touched off a furious exchange of one-liners between the two senior officers, complete with name calling, familial insults, the throwing of food and ultimately, fists.

The reason for the altercation was unclear, but sources at the luncheon said that Brodie was offended by a remark by Fleishman, in which he repeatedly referred to *The Chomicle* and the *Noise and Disturber* of Raleigh as "great places to take a leak."

"Nice hair, Joel," said Brodie, tossing a dressing-laden lettuce leaf at the University's principal fund raiser.

"Nice lawsuit," Fleishman replied, lofting a buttered roll in the president's direction. Brodie dodged the projectile, which hit the wife of a potential multi-million dollar contributor instead. Emerging from under the table, Brodie stuck out his tongue and said, "Nice aim."

From there, the situation deteriorated rapidly as outraged guests rushed for cover. Brodie hurled his coffee, showering Fleishman and further rumpling the decrepit suit he has worn every day since 1985 to save money to buy vintage wines. "You throw one more thing," Fleishman cautioned, "and I'll pour this boiling water for my snobbish, exotic tea right in your lap."

"I'd be delighted," said Brodie. "By the way, Joel, how

much money have you raised so far? Here, I'll double it," he said, removing a \$20 bill from his wallet. "Stanford and Yale have had bake sales that raised more money."

Fleishman, infuriated, then told the president that he "better watch out or else."

"Whooh, big man, big man," said Brodie in mock fear. "What are you going to do, backslap me to death?"

Fleishman, nostrils flaring, then charged the president and knocked him to the ground. Brodie recovered.

ASDU disbands

Thanks to an obscure, 10-year constitutional oversight discussed during a special four-hour session of the legislature Tuesday night, ASDU no longer exists.

While thousands of students swarmed to the Pub and Hideaway to celebrate the organization's demise, former ASDU officials scrambled to figure a way out of this latest and most dramatic screwup.

"I don't know how this could have happened," attorney general aspirant Imreally Coolman said, "but we haven't existed for 10 years."

Dave Markup, speaker of the now-defunct legislature, cast the deciding vote dissolving the group after refusing to recognize a request by one of the two legislators remaining at the meeting to check for a quorum.

"Quorum calls are just a lot of legislative mumbo-jumbo," Markup said, knocking his head with his gavel just to attract attention. "We have these rules so I can break them. And I really enjoy doing that. Since I have no friends, it's really the only thing that occupies my time."

The meeting was called because a rare examination of ASDU legislation by Coolman revealed that a previously unnoticed 1977 amendment to the constitution outlawed the group. The amendment restricts official recognition and allocation of student funds to organizations that do not debate or express opinions. Since the legislature does not meet these qualifications, it cannot receive the student activities fee or approve its allocation.

With the University's Capital Campaign for Moolah still dimly short of its \$200 million goal, Campaign director Joel Parkay announced Tuesday that if money does not start rolling in soon, God will turn him into an ox.

God's mandate, which according to Parkay, arrived in the form of a telegram, demands that the Campaign hit the \$200 million mark by the end of April.

"God knows, you can do better than that, Joel," the telegram apparently read in part, with the Almighty himself seemingly trying to crack a pun. "Everyone's tired of waiting around for the dough. Get it now. Or else. Yours truly - The Big Guy." If the goal is not met, God has stated that Parkay will spend the rest of his life grazing on main quad.

dressing that he is taking the heavenly message seriously. "This is very shocking, God knows, I'll have to improve my squash game."

God could not be reached for comment Tuesday.

Roberts' announcement dismayed many religious observers, and cracked others up, but apparently brought in enough cash to save Roberts from an untimely fate.

Attempts to binge NCPURGE first spewed from New Jersey

The issue of whether or not students will vote this week to fund NCPURGE (People United to Rip-off General Education) is attracting attention from battle-scarred veterans from across the country of previous struggles with PURGE.

"We were victorious in saving society, particularly college students, from the communist Nader disciples before. And, we will continue the crusade here," pontificated Craig "Egg" Sucker to concerned members of the campus gang SFR (Students for a Fourth Reich).

Sucker, a representative of the national group NOTACT (No Tolerance for American Commie Turncoats), was referring nostalgically to the 1985 federal court decision in *Alda v. Rutgers*. That suit ruled that the "un-American" PURGE policy of taking away 25 cents a semester from apathetic students to be illegal.

Fifth year law students Greg Nipple and Joe LaRouche have threatened to sue the University if NCPURGE receives funding approval April 2. "Alda v. Rutgers is exactly the same situation as here," winked LaRouche broadly. "So what if there's a teensy-weensy stumbling block because Duke is a private university? Hey, we're law students, so it should be a breeze [for us to win]."

LaRouche denied having any connec-

tions with Sucker, despite having been seen with him before and after the March 23 ASDU meeting. "Hey, just because this Sucker guy happens to show up at the one meeting we do, and just because he's one of maybe four people who think our suit might hold water... Nahhh, we don't know him," said LaRouche.

Trueman Seemingly, steering committee vice-admiral, said he would not comment on the efforts of NOTACT and SFR to defeat funding legislation for NCPURGE. But, then he changed his mind. "Like, why should I say anything to you? I mean, all you do is write hidden opinions into your manipulative articles about us and our totally non-partisan activities. Like, get a clue, you know?" said Seemingly, shaking his fist in characteristic protest.

Wisconsin PURGE member Ty D. Bole did, however, accuse NOTACT of being funded solely "by super huge corporations who don't like us because we're a bunch of knee-jerk liberals, errr, conscientious young citizens."

Sucker replied with a chuckle to Bole's statement, saying, "It always amuses me when those people talk like that, because everyone knows we're just an independent educational group that receives millions of dollars in private donations. We're not a shady bunch. You reporters act like we have hair on our palms, or something."

Meltdown at Harris plant

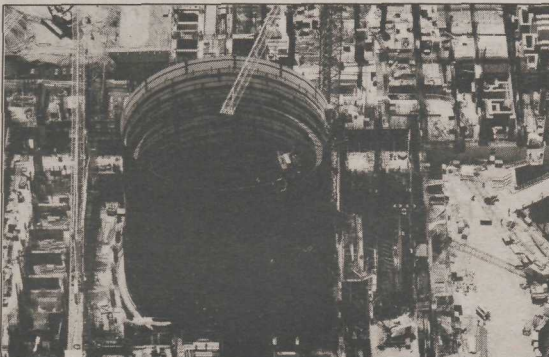

Carolina Power & Fright's Shearon Harris nuclear power plant suffered a meltdown early Tuesday morning. Although CP&F officials repeatedly denied that something had gone wrong, a huge mushroom cloud was later spotted drifting towards the Triangle. If prevailing south/southwest winds continue, the fallout will contaminate most of Chapel Hill, Raleigh, and Durham by late afternoon today.

At a press conference last night in Richmond, CP&F spokesperson, Wang P. Enis, continued to claim that the plant is completely safe and that none of the problems reported have any effect on the plant's ability to operate safely and effectively. Enis had difficulty responding to reporter's questions through his sporty orange radiation-proof space suit.

Members of the Coalition for Alternatives to Shearon-Harris (CASH), were quick to point out the severity of the accident. CASH members were last seen rushing off towards the stricken plant to monitor the performance of CP&F's emergency evacuation plan.

According to an unnamed informant close to the accident, the meltdown occurred after the plant collapsed upon itself, following a seismic disturbance (rumour has it that Sol 'Jabba' Green was seen in the area). The plant's seismic

supports, designed to protect the plant in the event of an earthquake, had inadvertently been secured with Jello rather than concrete during CP&F's rush to get the plant in operation.

Meanwhile back at Duke, administration officials were relieved when the *New York Times* reported that Duke's "hot college" reputation would be enhanced by the impending fallout.

As per University disaster policy, classes will be held as long as professors continue to show up. Busses will run every half hour between East and West, though

service has been suspended indefinitely through Central.

Joe Peetrantooey, assistant University business mismanager, promised students he would keep the Rat and Licks open, but the Pits will close for good. Employees are not being allowed to leave the University during this time. Peetrantooey has barred the doors of the Bryan Center to stop their departure. "It's ridiculous," he said, "during the last disaster by the time we got the DUFUS workers home, we had to turn around and get them back to campus."

Council quits

The Durham City Council voted Tuesday to dissolve itself and the city of Durham, due to student apathy at Duke University.

"Sheeece-it, if them thar Dewk stewdnts don't appreciate us as much as we luv them, we'll just pack up and skeedaddle," said City Council Chairman Dumb Bell.


According to Bell, the first indication that Duke students didn't care was the lack of readership for the *Our Town* page. "Hell, I ain't saying th' *Our Town* page is good, or anything, but you'd think at least th' editor would read it."

Durham mayor Webbed Gullet was dismayed about the students' disapproval of Durham. "When we planned Durham for the Duke community four years ago, we thought it would be the perfect environment for students from New York," Feet said. "It has lots of minorities and litter and everything ... and then some ornery rednecks to give the place a Southern flavor."

Durham residents were given 48 hours to evacuate.

In response to the news that Durham would be dissolved, Duke students went to class, studied in Perkins and went to kegs at night.

"No more Durham? Does that mean no more Bruegger's bagels?" asked Trinity junior Gus Untight. "Gee, that's too bad. I like bagels."

Dober: Raze chapel for student rays

As part of East Campus enhancement, the Chapel will be moved from its prominent position in Gothic Wonderland to the soccer fields by Broad Street, campus slammer Dick "bow tie" Doberman barked yesterday.

The removal of the Chapel will allow for the construction of a multi-million dollar indoor/outdoor health spa and recreation facility for undergraduate students only. Senior faculty members will not be allowed on the premises, even as students' guests, and will be required to spend muggy fall days in their own commons.

The facility is a necessity, according to Doberman, who cited a recent *Chomicle* poll saying overcrowding in the Sarah P. Duke gardens is overtaking the housing crunch as students' major concern for the spring. The increased space in the spa will compensate for this despicable overcrowding, the campus slammer said.

Seventy-eight percent of students polled say that having a large enough playground to use while cutting classes and catching some rays is more important than a new dorm, more computer clusters or an eight dollar increase in the student activities fee.

President Harland Brodie formed a special committee in the fall to assess future changes in the University's image. Five months later, the Elitists for the Continuation of the Country Club at Duke, issued their 150 page report urging Doberman to trash the chapel in favor of the new and improved recreation facility. The committee

believes that a country club will better represent the University for the next decades.

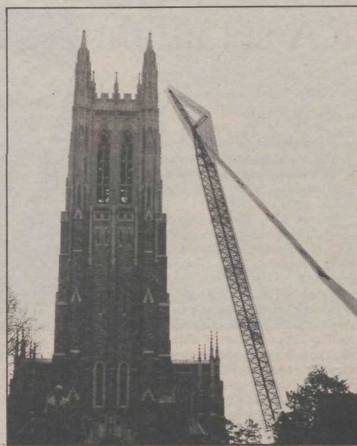
"The purpose of an undergraduate education is to prepare men and women to be tomorrow's leaders," Brodie said in his first press conference in four months. "Since leaders, myself included, spend most of their time at exclusive, pretentious recreation facilities, it is only appropriate that we have such a complex on campus to begin training tomorrow's leaders."

"Pictures of the Chapel are too serious to represent the true aura of Duke University," Laney Flutterbudget, a member of the committee, said. Flutterbudget advocates building at least three large, garrishly painted benches to place in front of the new facility. "We need to communicate the true nature of Duke's students. They are a wild and obnoxious group of kids who party five or six nights a week," said Flutterbudget.

Admissions director Dickey Steal is excited about the change. "Just think, the complex will be the key to attracting the quality students Duke deserves."

Funds for the project will be donated by an anonymous Divinity School graduate who now operates a Florida dog-track. "I would like to return something to Duke in exchange for all the institution has given me," the benefactor said.

Costs have not been finalized, but Doberman predicts it will cost \$49.99 per stone to move the structure or \$7.9 billion to trash it and rebuild it on East.

Tel-Com stays busy, busy

In the first evaluation of the new NoNet system, Tel-Com officials are still waiting for response on several comparable Ivy League long distance systems.

Officials are optimistic, and hope that their calls to stepsister schools Yale and Princeton will begin ringing at the other end within the semester. "We hear random clicks every now and then on the line, so we assume the system has engaged," said Tel-Com head of systems M. C. Iris.

Comments from Harvard and Brown have not helped officials greatly in determining system efficiency, they said. When contacted in a phone interview, Brown officials were quoted as stating, "Brsft xcvf bdt sksksksk fvtlg."

Harvard officials refused to aid Tel-Com in its inquiries after Tel-Com allegedly hung up on it. Tel-Com's assistant of-

ficial Connie Edison claims, "We didn't even touch the phone."

Duke officials plan to use the phone system as an emergency warning system in times of extreme crisis, but the new difficulties raise questions about such a system's safety.

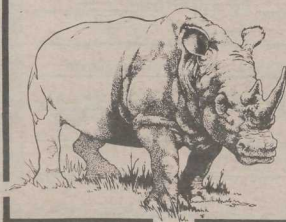
"We figure we'll just use WXDU and Cable 13 in the event of an emergency," said University Safety Manager Oliver North, former director of NASA. "They tell us that pretty much everyone watches or listens to them all of the time."

Tel-Com officials also said the system may have undergone severe stress in recent weeks. Disgruntled ASDU members have tied up the phones calling their mommies, due to extreme mental stress over huge, world-shaking issues they have faced concerning the legislature and the Publications Board.

RA set alight

Alleged assailant Jeremy Vaiden's lawyer declined comment Tuesday on whether Vaiden's father had contacted North Campus physical plant manager Chaim Lu in an attempt to buy his son's freedom from criminal charges with donations.

Vaiden allegedly soaked resident advisor Allen Funt with bacon grease, forced him to ingest ready-to-eat pickled pig's feet from Sam's Quik Stop, and then ignited him.

James Vaiden denies that he called Lu last week offering donations. Vaiden is a major donor to the Capital Campaign, having flipped them a shiny new dime each month since its inception. Campaign director Joe Land O'Lakes pleads that if Vaiden is antagonized by *The Chomicle's* coverage of the Lu scandal, the Campaign's back may be snapped by Vaiden's withdrawal of his \$1.20 per year.

University President H.K.H.K.H. Gerbilguts said the new Vaiden Center in women's studies had nothing to do with University indifference to the still burning Funt. Traffic Office goes high tech

The University Traffic Office Tuesday unveiled new weapons in their crusading fight against illegal parkers.

Equipped with a sophisticated computer targeting system boasting an accurate range of just over 400 feet, heat-seeking missiles, lasers and a powerful loud-speaker with the ability to blare Traffic Office director Liz Campbell's whiney, high-pitched voice over a five-mile radius, the X-8000 Enforcer is ready for action.

DUMBies mandate funding needed to save organization

In an effort to raise money for the continuation of their program, DUMB (Duke University Marching Band), will host the first annual Ironduke Triathlon 10 a.m. Sunday. The event, participation in which is mandatory for all students, faculty and staff, will include a sprint to the top of the Baldwin Auditorium dome and a scavenger hunt through the tunnels. The competition ends in a race around the traffic circle in which participants will each be given a 1975 Pinto to drive while blindfolded around the traffic circle, backwards, and fast, real fast.

Proceeds will come from a \$4 increase in student activity fees and an annual \$4 deduction from employee paychecks. Those students who are on the payroll will pay \$8 but will only have to compete once.

"We need at least twice as much money to buy beer for road trips, pay for week-ends at Myrtle and finance music lessons," said band director Leslie Truckstop.

The three-part competition will begin on East Campus where contestants will dash to the top of a greased-down Baldwin. The pack is expected to be led by chicken extraordinaire Pete Rinaldi. Said Rinaldi, "Yea, I'm a sure win. I'm used to dealing in grease."

Survivors of the tunnels and traffic-circle chase will be declared Triathlon winners, but will get nothing and like it.

Housing reinvents the dorm: The housing office announced Tuesday a back

to basics approach to undergraduate housing. According to Genie Howd some incoming freshman will be housed in pup tents on the residential half of Main West.

The plan will solve two problems. "We're trying to relieve overcrowding, but don't want to bother with a new dorm," she said. "This way we can house more freshman on West and keep the four year housing guarantee."

Duke invests in paint store: The Board of Trustees approved in their last meeting the use of funds obtained from University divestment from firms with interests in South Africa to purchase a Durham paint store.

"This will be a real boost to our portfolio," said president Helen K. Helga Brodie, who ordered last week that the University's mud filled quads be spray painted green. The directive was in response to alumni complaints that the University was allowing the campus landscape to deteriorate. "This way we can strengthen the Durham-Duke ties and be our own best customer," he said.

DUFS cuts costs: DUFS director Givmee Scurry contracted last week to purchase leftover food from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. "Students will have a better variety of food to choose from, while we cut costs substantially," he said. Scurry may also negotiate with local pig farmers for the rights to any remaining fodder.

Bovine benefit: In an effort to recolonize the Duke campus, the Phi Mu sorority has taken a page from the AEPi sorority fund-raising handbook and scheduled a Chutes-and-Ladders benefit for starving cows.

Originally the event was to have taken place on Main Quad, but University administrators later decided to move the benefit to Wallace Wade Stadium in case of overwhelming response. "That Twister thing really got out of hand," said Dean SuSuSudio. "It could have been like that Who concert in Cincinnati."

Bio-Sci stampede: Eighteen people were trampled to death and many others injured Tuesday night in a mad rush for seats minutes before a 7 p.m. botany

seminar was scheduled to begin in the Biological Sciences Building.

The lecture, "Life in a Stump: The Macromolecular Structure of Brown Appalachian Wood Rot," to be given by visiting professor Fred Rogers, had drawn a waiting crowd of more than 1,200 by 4 p.m. Tuesday. Hundreds had been camped out along Science Drive since Sunday night.

Public Safety officers blew their whistles and checked student IDs but were unable to stop the rush.

Official makes resignation of the week

RDU urinals widened so FAA won't get pissed

Planners at Raleigh-Durham Not-Ready-For-Prime Time-International-Travel Airport (RDNRFPTITA, or RDU for short) are expanding their recent renovations, according to Chuckie Linberger, airport coordinator. In addition to the new terminal, the airport will widen the space between the urinals in all the men's bathrooms and post signs explaining exactly what the "U" stands for in "RDU."

"The few people who actually decided to get off their planes discovered that, gohhhh, the whole cotton-pickin' airport is ugly. That's when we added the 'U.'"

The signs will be placed in all prominent places in the airport, according to Linberger. "We even made them eight inches wide special, so we can put them between the yurnils."

however, grabbed Fleishman by the belt buckle and, in an astonishing display of strength, threw him across the room. Brodie, reached at home late Tuesday, described the move as "a much needed boost for the Capital Campaign."

Public Safety officers then arrived at the scene, and arrested three DUPS employees who were serving the meal because they could not provide adequate identification.

In the end, the display cost the University more than \$35 million in pledges, according to John Piva, Fleishman's butterball yes-man. "But we fully expect to reach our [totally unrealistic] goal of \$200 million by 1989. Really."

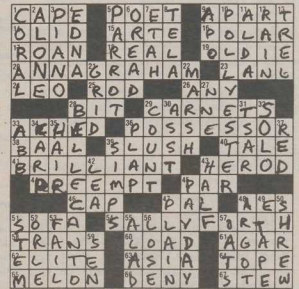

Weinberger, Shultz to wed

Amid rumors of discord in the Reagan administration, White House officials announced yesterday the engagement of Defense Secretary Caspar 'The Friendly' Weinberger and Secretary of State George 'Lips' Schultz. The pair will wed in early June at Schultz' Niagara Falls love nest, official sources said.

"There was no way we could hide our feelings any longer," Weinberger moaned as he tucked in his shirt while leaving his Pentagon office. "Secret get-away weekends at Camp David were just not enough. I couldn't stay away from George one more minute."

White House observers began to suspect the illicit affair when unnamed sources leaked reports of the two playing footsie under the table during Cabinet meetings.

Chief of staff Howard Baker announced that President Ronald Reagan will give away the grooms in the double-ring ceremony. Reagan, recovering from a recent case of laryngitis, said "Well, it doesn't seem so weird to me. But then again, I'm from California."

First Lady Nancy Reagan was unavailable for comment, but sources report she plans to make her entire wardrobe open to the couple. The first lady is reportedly delighted at the inclusion of her little boy Ron, Jr. in the ceremony as the flower boy.

"This isn't the first time down the aisle for me, so I guess white is out of the question. Maybe something in pink taffeta," Schultz told reporters Tuesday afternoon.

While precise plans for the ceremony have not yet been finalized, the couple hopes to keep the affair small and simple. Weinberger said, "We're not looking for anything fancy. Probably just a few of our favorite freedom fighters."

But according to late reports, the nuptials may be delayed by a conflict over honeymoon plans. A high ranking White House official told *The Chomicle* Schultz was seen storming out of the Oval Office with tears streaming down his face shouting "He's so damn stubborn!" Weinberger has insisted on visiting Managua while Schultz "had his heart set on honeymooning in Teheran," the source said.

As ASDU disbands, thousands party in The Hideaway

"We checked it out, and we actually did express an opinion back in 1983," said former ASDU president Jan Molting. "Those were radical days," she said wistfully. "I think they came out in favor of the basketball team or something. That was gutsy."

Of course, unpaid and unloved busy manager Gomer Pile immediately impounded all student organization funds. "I never get tired of doing this," he said, waving several colorful, exploding pie charts depicting the breakdown of ASDU's funds. "I love wasting people's time. And since I don't have any friends, impounding funds is really the only thing that occupies my time."

When asked what would become of the ASDU money, SUC chair Elly Weisel said she would like to get permission to use about \$10,000 to commission her official portrait, which she would immediately release to *The Chomicle* for publication.

"They always run the worst picture of me, on purpose," she bitched to anyone who would listen. "I think they're just jealous of my naturally rumpled hair and inviting, angelic smile."

Weisel referred to a precedent for such a situation set by former clerk corporal Boy Barquettette. "Boy said *The Chomicle* and the Union could keep on running even though they're illegal. Why can't we? It's not like anyone will notice," she said. "And I'm sure no one will care."

Rozelle: no more Super Bowl blowouts

NEW YORK — In the wake of yet another nail-biting finish to an NCAA championship basketball game, a press conference was held Tuesday to announce a series of measures to keep all future Super Bowls close.

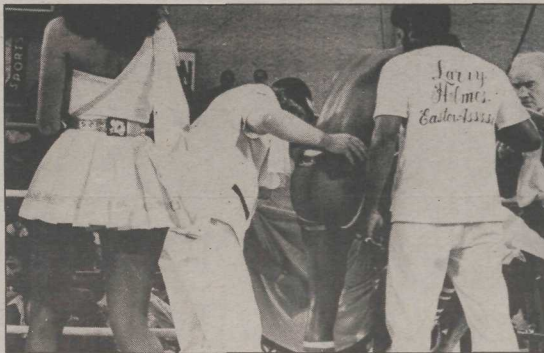
For those of you not familiar with the now cancelled halftime show, "Up With People" is the group of singers and dancers

Reid shuns North Carolina, will play in NBA next year

J.R. Reid, the man who was expected to become the dominant center in college basketball over the next three years, has decided to forego his remaining collegiate eligibility to enter the upcoming NBA draft as a hardship case. *The Daily Tar Hole* reported today.

Reid, the man who was expected to lead his North Carolina Tar Heel team to unlimited heights, said his decision was easy.

"I didn't think twice about it," said the 6-9 Virginia Beach, Va., native. "I knew before I got here that I would only play one year. I could have played pro basketball last year if I wanted to, but I thought I'd check out college life and see what it's about. Of course, Coach [Dean] Smith didn't know that."

Smith could not be reached for comment because he was still recovering from nasal surgery Sunday. He did leave a written statement with his personal secretary which read, "It's a shame that a guy like this can be allowed to stab his teammates, his coach, and his school in the back like this. Do you know how many times I visited his home and stuffed his mother's awful pot roast down my throat and said it was good just so that his family would like me and encourage him to come to this school? I hope he's a second round pick!"

Reid said he didn't mean to deceive anyone or hurt any feelings, but that

after one year of college basketball it was time to move on.

"It's too easy. It really is," said Reid of the college game. "Coach Smith knew I could carry the team all year, but didn't really give me a chance until the end of the Notre Dame game. If he'd have let me play my game all year I would have scored 45 points a game."

Reid scored 16 of UNC's last 17 points in the East Regional semifinal against Notre Dame.

"I really don't mean to hurt anyone," said Reid. "Hey, maybe I'll get injured if I stick around, and then what? Why shouldn't I go for the big bucks now?"

"I also want to play for a winner. I think the program here at Carolina is grossly overrated. We can't win the big one, and even if I stick around we still can't because Coach Smith downplays my role. I'm the best — he knows I'm the best, but he just won't admit it," said Reid.
