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Basketball team withdraws from NCAA Final Four

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — The men's basketball team announced late Thursday night it will withdraw from the NCAA Final Four tournament this weekend because of prior academic commitments.

Head Coach Mike Krzyzewski said he had hoped senior starter Billy King would have finished a term paper he has due Monday before the team left Durham on Thursday afternoon. King worked furiously on the paper during the flight to Missouri, but still could not finish the assignment. That forced the decision late Thursday to withdraw from the tournament and return to Durham.

The decision was not met with the disappointment some might have expected from King's teammates, however.

"We got this far. How come we have to go and play another two games, anyway?" said junior point guard Quin Snyder. "I'm tired of hiking up my shorts everytime we take the floor."

Other players sounded equally indifferent. "We kinda want to just chill out in the C.I. looking for chicks before we head over to SPE's for a few rounds of beer bongs," said Danny Ferry. "The babes are really hot for us tall boys, you know."

The team's decision comes on the heels of Duke's win over top-ranked Temple in the Eastern regional finals last weekend. Following the victory, administrators had to coerce apathetic students into celebrat-

ing on the quad.

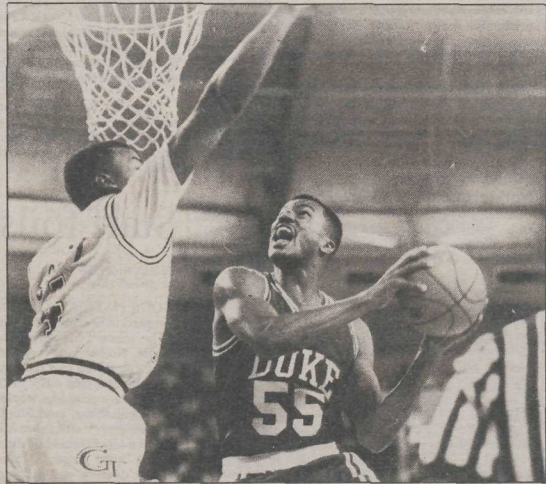
"They kept mumbling about pledge formalism and MCAT reviews," grumbled Bill "don't call me Phil" Griffith, University vice-president for affairs. "I stood in front of House D yelling, 'Look everybody, a bench! Let's burn the bench!' but nobody seemed interested."

President Keith Grodie echoed Griffith's sentiments. "It was anything but delightful," Grodie fumed. "I was out there on the quad with my 12-pack of Goebel's, wearing my best maroon madras tie, and nobody wanted to party."

University students' apathetic reputation has received national attention this week. Last Tuesday The New York Times reported that campus was "blah blah blah" after the Duke Devils' dramatic victory. "How is that going to look to the rest of the country," sobbed Grodie.

With Duke dropping out, Kansas will receive a bye into the national championship game Monday night. That prospect pleased the Jayhawks' All-America forward Fanny Padding. "I'm positively exuberant," Padding articulated. "The ensuing contest will present us with a unique opportunity to exhibit our athletic prowess while accentuating our University's academic integrity."

The Blue Devils' reserve center George Burgeon was not as pleased. "Duh, I think it sucks," he elaborated in great detail.

Campaign reaches \$200 million

The Capital Campaign met their \$200 million goal a year ahead of schedule, Campaign director Joel Mazola announced yesterday.

Mazola returned from his hideout in the New York theater district Thursday and actually spoke to the press.

Members of the Campaign's staff remained puzzled at the overnight \$92 million increase in Campaign coffers. "I just don't know how it happened," mused Campaign employee James Moon, a tall man wit, frizzy red hair. "Don't look at me, I was hanging out on the third floor of the Flowers Building," he claimed.

"This much sure wasn't in the pipeline," said public relations expert Robert Wrong. "But, why question such trivial inconsistencies?" he queried.

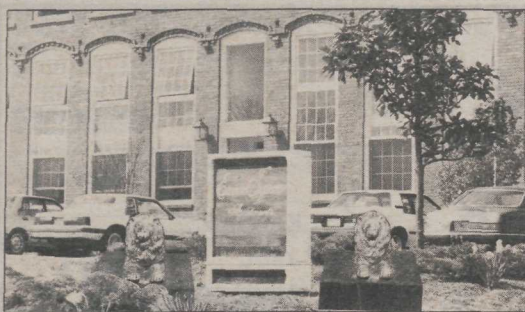
Millions stolen from area bank

SAE frat booted off campus

University administrators announced their decision Thursday night to revoke the charter of the Self Appointed Elitist (SAE) fraternity, effectively kicking the brotherhood off campus. SAE officers say they don't care, as they plan to purchase the Erwin Square apartment building on Ninth Street with the money left over from buying their Porsches and BMWs.

"We're going to turn the place into a den of iniquity," condescended fraternity president Dave Luckless, reached at kegs illegally held in a brother's room Thursday night. "Who wants to live on campus anyway? And this location — AEPI can save it. The air conditioning and the sod outside is great,

Cabinet indicted: All of President Reagan's cabinet officers were indicted Thursday on 56 counts of conspiring to defraud the U.S. government. Special Prosecutor Lawrence Walsh, in explaining the charges, said his investigation determined Reagan's entire cabinet had purposefully avoided doing anything productive for the nation for the past seven years, and instead had used their salaries and department funds to advance their own political motives.

Gore attacks Jackson: In the most scathing attack yet on Democratic presidential hopeful Jesse Jackson, rival Albert Gore said "I think Jesse is wrong on some issues." Jackson called the sharply worded statement "a brutal, spiteful, personal attack on my character."

Noriega holding out: Panamanian strongman Manuel Noriega said he will not leave his country until he receives a better offer than those made already. Thus far, France has offered the drug smuggler political asylum — the so-called "Baby Doc plan." The U.S. then upped the ante by offering Noriega criminal immunity if he accepts the French bid. But Noriega said yesterday he would rather take the "Marcos plan." Under that set-up, the U.S. would sell Noriega an estate on the Hawaiian island of his choice, accepting money the murderer has made through illicit activities, then provide full Secret Service protection and diplomatic immunity.

Special funerals planned: Protestants and Catholics in Ireland agreed Thursday to schedule combined funerals. Although details still will be worked out, the current plan is to have several members from each faction arrive at the graveyard at the same time, whereupon they will shoot each other.

U.S. sends 23,000 troops to Martinique

SANTA BARBARA, Calif. — President Reagan ordered 23,000 battle-ready soldiers to the tiny island nation of Martinique Thursday following the reported sighting of a communist there.

The president of French-owned Martinique, Bouche Parte, said a man with a red lapel pin was spotted in a bustling marketplace around noon. Pentagon officials who requested anonymity said the White House immediately advised Parte that the sighting was clear evidence of a massive communist insurrection.

Based on that interpretation, Parte asked for "some assistance" to counter the possible assault. The White House interpreted that request as a call for an all-out military invasion to secure the country, the Pentagon officials said.

The U.S. force will include 15,000 Marines, 6,000 Army foot soldiers, and a Navy aircraft carrier task force. The force will be accompanied by a full complement of amphibious assault vehicles, tanks, fighter jets and bombers.

The troops will engage in "battle effectiveness readiness support and modification stipulation recognition exercises," said Marlin Fitzwater, Reagan's chief liaison.

"These men will not be in danger. They will not be near any battle areas nor engage in fighting under any circumstances. They're just there to show what we can do," Fitzwater said.

At his ranch in California where he is celebrating National Soup Month, President Reagan said, "He has been my friend for 20 years and I don't intend to let him down now," thinking reporters were asking him about Attorney General Edwin Meese.

Staff foils Reagan's itchy trigger finger

OUR NATION'S CAPITAL — President Reagan attempted to begin a global thermo-nuclear war yesterday as he pressed his personal "nuke button" in the White House. No bombing resulted, though, because the President's staff had had the button disconnected three days after Reagan took office in 1981.

"We were afraid he would be quick to the trigger with this bomb thing," said Chief of Staff Howard Baker. "He's big on staff taking initiative, so we just saved the world a lot of trouble by disconnecting it."

The "nuke button," while not actually triggering any atomic devices, was still wired to notify military personnel when pressed. "We were afraid this might happen, especially with Gorbachev's new popularity," said

General Omar Sharif of the U.S. Army. "He's got that movie star ego, and when he feels upstaged he gets upset. We wanted to know when he was getting antsy."

Donald "No I'm Not Related" Regan, who served as Reagan's chief of staff for three years, said "We all knew the button was disconnected. We made a lot of jokes to the President, like 'well, if Gorbachev makes you so mad, why don't you just go nuke Moscow, sir?' Then we'd laugh and he'd be confused. It was pretty funny, really."

This further evidence of the remoteness of Reagan's leadership will be brought into use in the trials of the Iran-Contra arms scandal. But, according to Hawaiian Senator Daniel I-know-more-than-you-do, "these people won't be prosecuted for taking independent action in this situation. We probably should as a matter of principle, but, Jesus, they just saved us one hell of a mess."

Privileged procure prime parking permits

Campus planner Dick Dover presented a proposal for preferred undergraduate and valet parking services at an emergency session of the Bored Trustees Thursday. The plan addresses complaints by potential donors children unable to find suitable parking places for their BMWs and Saabs.

Anne Yuldonor, a 1956 Women's College graduate and mother of an entering freshman, addressed the group via satellite from her chalet in Bern, Switzerland. "What's my daughter gonna think if she has to park her 750 il in something called 'Guam'?" Yuldonor said. "I want my little girl treated with the respect I deserve."

Under the plan, all parking areas adjacent to the Bryan Center and on Chapel Drive will be rezoned 24K. Gold-plated magnetic strips, electronically corresponding to the owner's American Express Gold Card number, will replace parking decals. "We didn't want to mar those expensive paint jobs with tacky adhesives," said parking director Enzo Ferrari.

Vehicles displaying the gold strips may be parked in any campus zone, in addition to their exclusive areas. If convenient parking is not readily available, owners have the option of leaving their car in front of the Chapel, next to the Bryan Center or at the East Campus bus stop, to be parked by a free valet service.

Rezoning will not effect East or North Campuses, according to Ferrari. "These areas simply do not house our targeted customers," he said.

The 24K Gold Zone service will be available to selected undergraduates by invitation only. Students entering

the University via the president's list and those whose parents' annual income exceeds \$2.5 million minimum will automatically qualify for the program. These requirements may be waived if the future alumnus is heir to a large fortune.

Administrators are enthusiastic about the proposal. "Not only will we end the problem of offending potential donors by forcing their children to waste valuable tanning time finding a safe spot for their Porsches," said Alumni Director Lame Funderdick, "but the University's poor will be aided also by the creation of additional work-study positions."

Approximately 100 work-study students will be hired as valets. When not bodily reserving spaces, valets' duties will consist of circling in front of the Chapel until a space opens up. "Once the car is parked, the valet will be responsible for waxing and buffing it," said Beth Lipton, a traffic office official.

The valets will also be required to trip each vehicle's theft alarm periodically. According to Lipton, the alarms will "annoy passers-by and let everyone in a two-mile

As a result of a joint effort by the Duke Chapel, the physical plant and the department of anatomy, President Keith Brodie signed an order for a new million-dollar organ to be erected on the lawn in front of the chapel. The structure, which is scheduled to be completed in 1989, will tower 150 feet above West Campus, making it the largest organ of its kind on the East coast.

In an effort to integrate the structure into the campus' Gothic architectural scheme, an expert team of ATOs have been contracted to head the construction effort. The ATOs have become famous for their achievement in the snow sculpture world with their stunning reproductions of the average ATO standard-issue equipment. "Everything we do is proportionally

Swiss getaway weekends key to Contra-Capital Campaign scam

The ever-widening web of corruption surrounding the Iran-Contra scandal extended its tentacles to Durham Thursday when Special Prosecutor Lawrence Walsh revealed that Capital Campaign funds have been diverted to provide assistance for the Contra rebels.

Campaign director Jol Fleshguy declined to comment directly on the allegation, but pledged to cooperate fully with the investigation. "Nobody likes to tell stories as much as I do," Fleshguy told reporters during his daily meeting with the press. "I'm prepared to tell the good, the bad and the ugly." He said these are the essential elements of every fairy tale.

Walsh said investigators initially became suspicious after Swissair airline records revealed frequent visits by Fleshguy to Switzerland. The trail eventually led to the University when bank officials notified Walsh that the Campaign had actually reached its \$200 million goal last spring, but account balances had subsequently dropped significantly prior to another of Fleshguy's jaunts to Geneva.

Federal officials conducted an early morning raid Thursday on the Campaign's headquarters in Old Chemistry building in an effort to seize any records pertaining to the possible embezzlement of contributions. But the mission was foiled when the officials discovered that the offices had been completely stripped of all documents,

leaving only a few empty bottles of wine and a waterbed where the complex had once resided.

Arrested at the scene was staff director Margaret Witch, who was discovered smuggling files away under her clothing and charged with obstructing the investigation. The

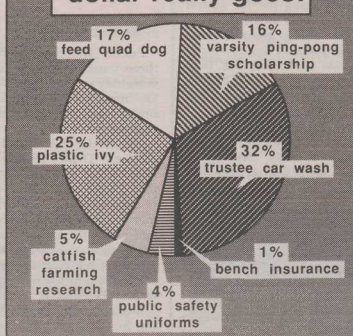

accurate," said team leader Jack Iche. "This is a 150-foot statue, which is about 900 times actual ATO size."

Funding for the structure was provided wholly by the alumni association of the Delta Delta Delta sorority, which has been pushing for the statue for many years. "It's about time Brodie did something," exclaimed Lucy Joosey, president of the association. "We've been after him to get it up for years."

The project will include a pair of internal elevators going up to the top of the organ, where an observation deck will allow visitors to view the surrounding area. Housing representative Troy Jann said both elevators will operate at different times, but they will be unable to run simultaneously. "Some things are just logistically impossible," Jann said.

Jann added that a plastic tarp will be used to cover the organ at night and during inclement weather. The tarp will measure 6,000 square feet and will be stored in a large foil packet in the basement of the Divinity school. "You never know what can happen when you expose an organ to the elements," Jann said. "But, as I always say, better safe than sorry."

Grodie said the organ would be the first on the campus of a major university. "I'm just delighted that Duke has taken the leadership role in this effort," Brodie said. "They might have the same idea at Princeton, but we'll get it up faster."

Crotch takes N.J. on the road

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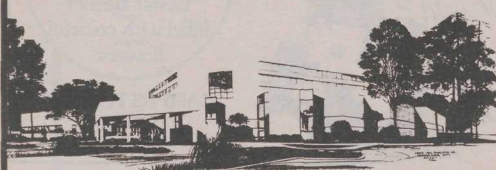

Public Safety offered this composite of the violent criminals.



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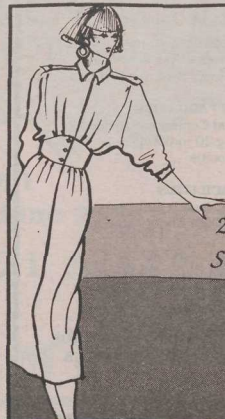

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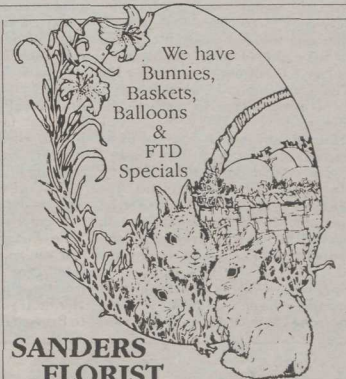
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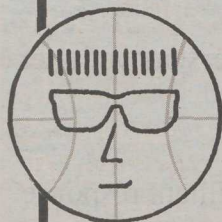
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No holes in our logic

Anyway, we all decided that Bruegger's does bagels right. It was the first time the board had ever agreed

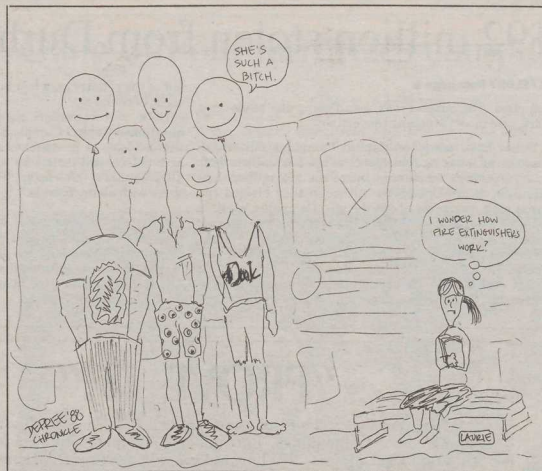
on something for which they had some sort of evidence.

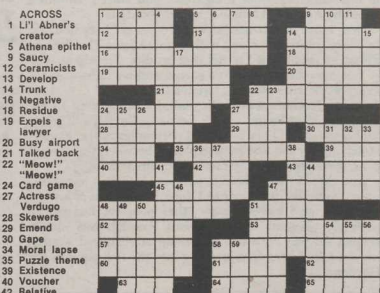

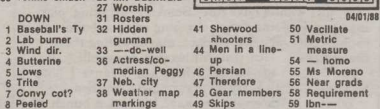
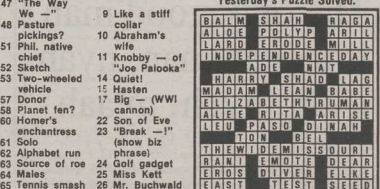

"We have no reason at all to believe that any black student was involved in the attack," breathed Robert Captain, Dean of Public Safety.

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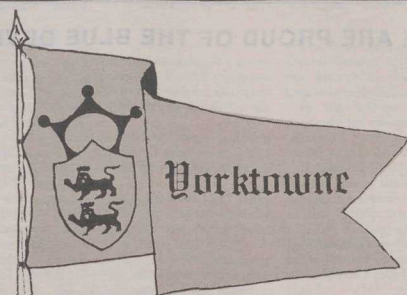

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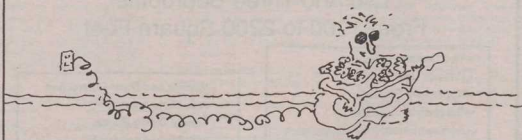

Yogi Berra to replace Krzyzewski as Blue Devil coach

In the aftermath of Dook's withdrawal from the 1988 NCAA's, Coach Mike Krzyzewski will quit and he will be replaced by Yogi "Buckwheat" Berra, according to an exclusive scoop obtained by the Polish Interplanetary News Service (PINS).

Krzyzewski will become the head coach of Poland's Women's Olympic basketball team and Berra will sign a multi-month contract as the new boss of the Dook drib-

blers.

Baseball wins; losing streak is over

The Duke baseball team won a miraculous 5-4 game over North Carolina with the services of 1987 graduate Kent Hetrick on the mound. Kevin Burrin hit a ninth-inning homer to win it after the Blue Devils had fallen behind 4-0 in the first inning.

The win comes a day after the Tar Heels pounded Duke 21-9 and ends a twelve game losing streak. The addition of Hetrick was the key as he went the distance and struck out 17 batters.

"Well, he's a great player, a real talented kid," Duke Coach Steve Traylor said. "His performance inspired the rest of the team out there today. It's one of the finest things I've ever seen."

Hetrick used his last day in Durham before returning to professional baseball to help his former teammates discover what it is like to win again. Last summer, Hetrick was on the Salt Lake City Trappers minor league team that won a record 27 straight games.

"When I was on the Trappers we thought we'd win every game," Hetrick said. "But here, I saw the guys were a little down — they didn't seem to think they could ever win again. I just went out there and tried to convince them they could win a game."

If the Blue Devils were excited by Hetrick's presence, it didn't show in the first inning. It appeared early that the Tar Heels might repeat the drubbing they gave the Blue Devils Wednesday.

Hetrick struck out the first batter but five consecutive errors by the Blue Devils, including two on one play, allowed North Carolina to score four unearned runs. Duke got out of the inning on a routine double play that had the coaching staff on its feet celebrating.

"We were so pumped up, we forgot to catch the ball," explained shortstop Doug Eastman, who had one of the errors but made a spectacular diving grab to start the double play.

In the bottom half of the first, John Furch hit a two-run homer after leadoff hitter Rick Torgalski got on the bases with a single. A North Carolina error allowed David Hawkins to reach base but the Blue Devils could not get him home.

Hetrick controlled the Tar Heels by striking out seven batters in the next three innings. No Carolina players reached base again until the fifth. Hetrick gave Darin Campbell a free ride on four straight balls but another double play cleared the bases and Hetrick got a strikeout to end the inning.

The Blue Devils were still down, 4-2, in the sixth but David Norman hit a solo homer to close the margin to one. Meanwhile, Hetrick struck out five consecutive batters to breeze through the sixth and seventh innings.

In the bottom of the seventh, Rich Bevilacqua and Eastman hit consecutive singles to put runners on first and third. Furch connected for a ground-rule double and the score was tied at four.

It remained tied until the ninth. After Hetrick struck out the side to the delight of a frenzied crowd, the scene was set for Burrin. Despite going hitless in his first four at bats, Traylor stuck with him.

"After Kent struck out those last three guys, I couldn't hold the tears back," Traylor said. "Then I wasn't paying attention and [Burrin] got up there and he took the first pitch before I could get a pinch hitter out there to bat for him."

The count went to 0-2 before Burrin bothered to lift the bat off his shoulder. The fans were looking for help in the on-deck circle but on the next pitch Burrin hit a towering, tape-measure homer 442 feet over left-center field. The standing-room-only crowd ran onto the field and started a bonfire.

"I was so psyched after Kent struck out the side," an ecstatic Burrin said about his first homer of the year. "I just swung as hard as I could and somehow I hit it." "We never thought Kevin would ever nail one like that," Traylor admitted. "But I've always thought he was a great player, a real talented kid."

Burrin got the game winner but Furch was the main offensive weapon as he knocked in Duke's first four runs. Furch leads the Blue Devils in most offensive categories this year.

"John's pulled through for us all year," Traylor said. "He's a great player, a real talented kid. If everyone else was hitting like he is, we'd be in more of these ball games."

"But this one was won by Kent," Traylor added. "Those Tar Heels don't know what hit them today. We really pulled one on them — they think that was Chris Smith out there."

Hetrick wore Smith's uniform and the 30,496 fans were confused initially by the switch. After Hetrick tipped his hat (and identity) to the crowd in the 3rd inning, the Blue Devil students were aware of what was going on.

According to University of North Carolina officials, Tar Heel coach Mike Roberts can't read or write. Roberts

can recognize numbers and follows the game and players that way.

"None of those guys on that team can read," Traylor laughed. "That's why I don't mind telling people we used Kent — they'll never find out. The dumbest one is that relief pitcher they have — Jackson, but he's a real talented player nonetheless."

Ryan Jackson, a 6-7 giant, hails from South Carolina and has created an uproar at Carolina home games. Apparently when he pitches, he makes a lot of noise while reading the signs from the catcher. North Carolina University officials were forced to hire a professional hog-caller from Iowa to get the Tar Heel fans off the field and back in the stands.

The Duke fans rushed onto the field at Jack Coombs Field and celebrated after the Blue Devils won their first game of the month of March.

"Hopefully we can use this win to start a winning streak through the month of April," Traylor said as he threw old bats into the bonfire at home plate.

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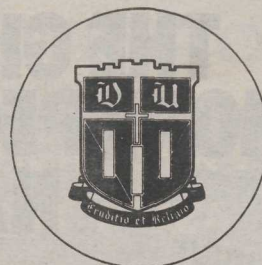

Dude sings Wall St. blues

Social significance is such a rarity in albums recently. Really, one can only turn to the Jacksons (Michael and Lolita, or whatever her name is) and possibly the soundtrack to the hit films of John Hughes, or is that Holmes?

But there's a new voice in American music, and it's quite possible that Dude's debut record on Wench Beta (pronounced bay-TAH) records will prove the most significant and insightful band in Dude's musical heritage.

Dude draws its gritty, acerbic material from a white, upper-middle class background in Athens, New Jersey. The first released single, "Daddy was a Quiche and Mommy was his Little Sister," draws on the depth of relationships in that tiny Jersey town, now facing almost 50 percent unemployment in the wake of the collapse of the Wall Street indulgence market:

"My daddy bought a bimber with the gilded

parachute/and whether I'll get it is a point that's fairly moot/cause Mommy says the S.E.C./wants to trade her and me/for some of Daddy's inside infirma/shun."

Such extraordinary depth pervades the entire work. Dude was established when its members met at a bid night their freshman year and discovered that they shared the lust for musical mediocrity that has pursued them like a ravening dog. The core of the band is the mindless, repetitive guitar work from Mitch Viner, who boasts of knowing fewer chords than R.E.M.'s Peter Buck.

But the spectacularly predictable keyboard played by Al should not go unheralded. (Al explains that he lost his last name in a bizarre T-shirt printing accident.) Al's ability to divine Viner's true intent on the songs is both clairvoyant and reassuring to the listener: on "Green Grass and High Fives Forever," Al backs up Viner's insistent, childish strums with the theme from Green Acres.

In fact, Al backs up most of the songs on the album with the theme from Green Acres. Only on "You Better Shop Around (at Blooming's)" does he change this dire litany, and play the theme to Batman.

Finally, Dude has a drum machine, which they hope to get working in the next few months, hopefully in time for their frat party tour. The album stands tough without it, with Al standing in as a sort of human beat box on tunes requiring some sort of formalized

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rhythm.

The finest songs on the album deal with the sense of isolation and loss that the New Jersey youngsters feel, as well as their dislocation and discombobulation as they find themselves graduating without the slot at the investment bank of their choice.

For instance, "Grab Your Ankles. This is a Hostile Takeover" is a touching and gentle statement of faith in the capitalist system. Despite the tragedy of Black Monday, there is always a silver lining — in this song, it is the promise of buying up helpless corporations with ready cash reserves:

"Honey chile/you make me wild/thinking 'bout those assets piled up to the ceiling/with buzzards wheeling/all around your stockholders."

Dude has made its first, tentative mark in the sensitive psyche of serious Duke students with

its album of paeans to hometown Jersey. Expect more noisome work in the future, with even more powerful lyrics as Viner and Al explore the world of paid commerce.

"We're Dude, we're Dude/and we're naturally rude./we'll love you 'til we die/at least 'til the kegs run dry/or until you can't get your Visa renewed."

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'The Fox and the Hound' a Disney cinema masterpiece

THE FOX AND THE HOUND

That deity of cinematic technique and master of fine-tuned, subtle wit, Walt Disney, keeps the bon temps roulant with his latest gem to subjugate the great silver screen, "The Fox and the Hound."

The Disney studios have fashioned a masterpiece both so poignantly penetrating and sardonically droll, imbued with such piquant perceptions of fox/hound relations, that this reviewer was unsure whether to rejoice or ululate and frequently found himself doing both.

From the opening moments when the camera sweeps the broad environs of a sylvan panorama in a fantastically gratuitous shot so reminiscent of Stanley Kubrick's "Barry Lyndon" that it could hardly be coincidental to the ten-

der closing whose curious camera angles brought to mind the opening shots of Orson Welles's "Citizen Kane," "The Fox and the Hound" is a nonstop joyride through the mystical fields of childhood, puberty, comprehending the adult world, apprehending amorous relations, suffering the tormenting anguish of heartbreak, and exploring the intricate, intimate relations between a woman and her fox, a man and his hound, and a fox and a hound.

Rarely has this fascinating and provocative subject been explored so sensitively and in such detail. Disney's masterful handling of the characters makes one wonder if his whole career had only been preparation for this moment. From the first insouciant flip of the tail of Tod the fox to the last heart-rending bay of Copper the hound, the viewer is held entranced, lost so completely in these actors finely-honed portrayals that had "Fire!" been called in the crowded theatre, nary a one would have left his seat.

"Veni, vidi, vici," is the theme for the winsome stars of this fabulously fun Aesop's Fable—cum—soporific mixer. Copper's succinct yet decisive opening line, "Hi, my name is Copper and I'm a hound dog. A-whooooo!", sets the

tone for the intimate confidences that Tod will later apprise Copper: "You'll always be my best friend," to which the audience in toto can only nod, mesmerized, in tacit accord.

Upon the brutal slaying of the infant Tod's mother by a pack of foxhounds baying with the sweet bloodlust of the kill, the diminutive fox is left solitary and vulnerable to the vicillations of a dangerous world. He is discovered by Big Mama, who contrives to have Tod cared for by the Widow Tweed who lives nearby. The actor portraying Big Mama was last seen as Owl in "Winnie the Pooh" and manages to brilliantly transcend minor hindrances of gender and age to turn in a stellar performance here as a black owl with an accent last heard on Mammy in "Gone with the Wind."

Dinky and Boomer are Big Mama's bird friends who aid her in seeking care for Tod. The plot digressions to focus on their lively pursuit of the guileful tobacco worm, Squeaks, are no less delightful for their frequency.

The Widow Tweed is a fascinating portrait of a sick and twisted woman who will pick up any old stray animal in her domain, raise it to matu-

riety and allow it to live in her house. One is overawed at the subtle psychological message that Disney sends over a full-grown woman who caresses a fox in her lap while referring to it as "such a little toddler."

Her neighbor, Amos Slade, is a trusted old man who hunts for a living. Copper is first introduced as a puppy, the raw material which Slade will corrupt into a lean, mean, fighting machine of a seasoned foxhound.

Tod and Copper mature to discover that their childhood friendship may not outlast the constraints of their adult worlds and duties, much to the dismay of all concerned, except Slade, who is far more interested in garnering yet another fox-skin to bolster the abhorrent compendium in his shed.

Their wrenching conflict and timely propitiation left hardly a dry eye in the theatre. "The Fox and the Hound" is filled to capacity with a veritable plethora of empyrean imagery and intensity of sentiment that erects it as a paradigm of cinematic culmination that subsequent directors can merely endeavor to achieve.

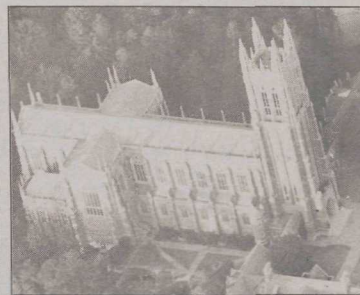
