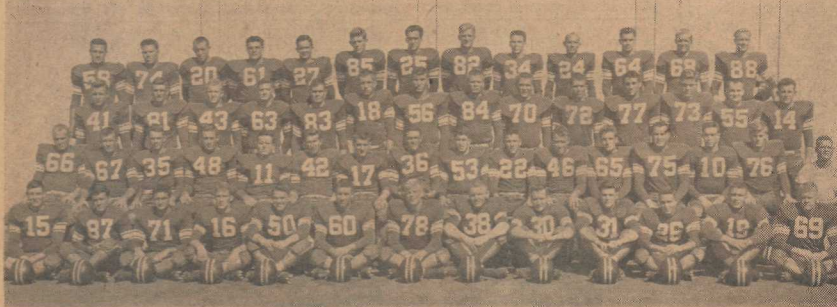

### East Upperclassmen Meet New Councilors; Miss Clay Replaces Traveling Dean Jenkins

Acting Associate Dean of Undergraduate Instruction Susan Clay and three new house councilors met East campus upperclassmen returning for Freshman Week at a general meeting Wednesday evening in the East Duke Building.

Miss Clay, formerly Assistant Academic Dean at Mt. Holyoke College, was introduced by Dean R. Florence Brinkley. A graduate of the University of Kentucky and Syracuse University, Miss Clay will assume the duties of Dean Marianna Jenkins who will be on leave from the University for one year, serving as Associate Director of the Sweet Briar Junior Year in France program.

Incoming councilor of Southgate Hall is Miss Margaret Flory who has been connected with the Y.W.C.A. in Fresno, Calif. and Hartford, Conn. From 1951-53, she acted as Dean of Women at Bridgewater College, Va., her alma mater.

Miss Alice Phelps, a candidate for the Ph.D. degree in guidance at the University of Michigan, will act as councilor in Brown House. A graduate of Oberlin

College and the U. of Michigan, Miss Phelps served in the Navy during the war and was associated with the Social Security Administration for a short time.

New councilor in Giles House is Mrs. Bidwell Wright. After receiving her A.B. from the University of New Hampshire, Mrs. Wright took her Master's degree at Columbia.

The new house councilors were introduced to the Woman's College students by Mary Grace Wilson, Dean of Women.

### A Thousand Freshmen Arrive From 40 States, 10 Countries

More than 1000 freshmen, representing approximately 40 states and 10 foreign countries, arrived at Duke yesterday and are now being oriented into the seemingly endless maze of placement tests, meetings, and general working of the university community.

The freshman class will be about the same numerically as last year's, with 518 freshmen entering Trinity College, 167 in the College of Engineering, 318 in the Women's College and 51 in the School of Nursing. This will make Duke's total enrollment about 4,800, some 3,300 of which are undergraduates.

About 175 student leaders, including members of the YMCA and YWCA, members of the men and women's Freshman Advisory Council, Sandals, honorary leadership society for women, Woman's Student Government and house officers and assistant housemasters will be available to help the freshmen with their problems.

This year's freshman class has students hailing from many parts of the United States. A geographic breakdown shows that 300 students come from North Carolina, 268 from the southeastern states, 301 from middle eastern states and 49 from New England. From the Central states 101 freshmen are entering; three from northwestern states; seven from southwestern states; nine from far western states and 16 from foreign countries.

Foreign countries and territories represented are Australia, Brazil, Cuba, Greece, Korea, Netherlands, West Indies, Puerto Rico, Saudi Arabia, Thailand, Venezuela.

### Low Cost Culture Offered To Aesthetes Through Season All-Star Concert Tickets

One of the many cultural advantages offered at Duke is the All-Star Concert Series. This year such famous personalities in the musical world as George London, leading American Bass-Baritone of the Metropolitan Opera Association, and Boston Pops Orchestra will appear here on the Concert Series.

Approximately 400 series tickets are still available and are on sale from 9-5 p.m. Monday thru Friday, and from 9-1 p.m. on Saturday in 210 Page Auditorium. The remaining tic-

kets for the five performances, including Eleanor Steber, George London, Madame Butterfly, Boston Pops Orchestra, and Clifford Curzon, will be sold for \$3 and \$9.

In addition to the regular series tickets for off-season performances will be sold for \$2.50, \$3.00, and \$3.50. The two Off-The-Series performances this year will be the Ballet Theatre which drew the "Biggest audience in ballet history" at the Metropolitan Opera House recently, and Anna Russell, international concert comedienne.

### 45 Y MEN ON HAND First Week Starts In Bag Barrage, Hasty Briefings

Sparked by the arrival yesterday of more than a thousand new students on both campuses, Freshman Orientation Week ushered the thirtieth freshman class into the fold of university life.

Incoming men were immediately met and oriented to the preliminary phases of campus activity by a group of 45 white shirted, blue arm-banded "Y Men", under the supervision of Jim Harbison and the Senior Y Cabinet, while on East Campus the newly arrived freshmen women were greeted by the YMCA's counterpart, the YWCA in coordination with Sandals, sophomore women's honorary.

Greeting new students, parts of the burgeoning student union have begun to take some definite form. The Chronicle will present more details on this subject next week.

Yesterday afternoon, A. Hollis Edens, president of the University, and Mrs. Edens received parents of the freshman in their home. The students themselves were officially welcomed to the University last night by the President Edens and respective college deans in an assembly in Page auditorium.

All throughout this day the entire freshman unit has been engaged in a round of placement tests in English, foreign languages, mathematics, and sciences, while the intermission hours have been filled with physical examinations and interviews for Air Force and Naval Reserve Training Corps candidates.

Yet to be endured and enjoyed by the incoming class is a meeting with their respective faculty advisers on Saturday afternoon; open houses for freshmen in the East Campus dormitories on Saturday night; special worship services Sunday morning and evening; the President's reception honoring the class at University House on Sunday afternoon; a welcome from the city of Durham on Durham-Duke Freshman Day Monday afternoon; and an exchange picnic sponsored by both YMCA and YWCA.

The 80 faculty advisers to the Class of 1958 will begin individual conferences concerning their students' choice of courses for the first semester.

## To The Class of '58

A university without its students is a mere shell. It is the students who make or break a university. They are its life blood and the focal point of its interests and efforts. You who have come to Duke this week for the first time are beginning the process which will make you an integral part of this university.

In addition to the placement tests, open houses and other phases of Freshmen Orientation, it is important at this time that you consider the main purpose of your being here. Primarily you are here to learn. But this learning should not be confined to classroom recitation and final exams alone. The academic should simply provide you with the keys to open other doors for self-improvement and self-enlightenment later in life.

College is a time of transition from adolescence to adulthood. Do not throw away this opportunity to prove yourself capable of making your own decisions and taking the consequences regardless of what they may be. Develop within yourself strong convictions which will not wither before the opinions of others, but remember that there are usually two sides to an argument. Learn to appreciate the other person's viewpoint although you do not hold it yourself.

You can graduate from Duke without ever taking part in student activities. You can fill your schedule card with crisp courses every year. Yes, you can waste your own and the university's time if you want to, but in so doing you will only be cheating yourself.

College is the time of transition. You members of the class of 1958 are beginning the final step in the process which will carry you to the status of maturity. The kind of adult you will be after you leave college depends to a great degree on what you do with yourself and with Duke during the next four years.

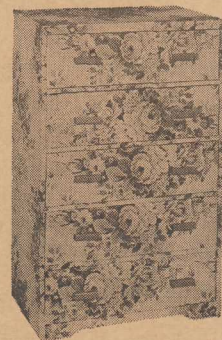

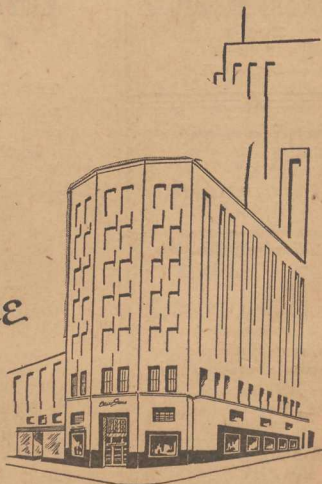

# Blue Devil Gridders Prepare To Open Schedule With Penn

Coach Bill Murray's Duke gridders swing into the last week of pre-season practice tomorrow, preparing for their September 26 opener with the University of Pennsylvania in Philadelphia.

Murray says of the drills to date, "We have a group of boys interested in playing football. We have a tough schedule, but the boys have worked hard and we are pleased with the results so far."

The big news of fall practice was last Saturday's scrimmage game with the strong Camp Lejeune Marines. The Blue Devils dominated the scrimmage throughout, although the first team played less than half the game. It is understood that the Dukes outscored the Marines, six touchdowns to three.

Quarterback Jerry Barger, Duke's claim as the most versatile player in college football this fall, was the spark as he led the first team on a sustained scoring drive early in the contest. Fullback Bryant Aldridge, operating with the first unit in

place of the injured Worth Lutz, broke away on a 50-yard touchdown jaunt for one of the longest runs of the afternoon.

The first eleven appears set for next Saturday's lid-lifter, and it will be the same team that was designated the number one unit at the conclusion of spring practice. It has Sonny Sorrell and Jerry Kocourek at ends, Fred Campbell and Doug Knotts at the tackles, Jesse Birchfield and Ralph Torrance at the guards with Johnny Palmer at center.

Captain Barger will guide the offense from his quarterback slot with Nick McKeithan and Buddy Bass at the halfbacks and Lutz at fullback.

Quarterback-half Dale Boyd is on the indefinitely disabled list along with reserve guard Chuck Gwinn.

## Ticket Situation

Tickets for Duke's four home football games have been selling at the fastest pace in the school's history, and although none of the games have been sold out as yet, H. M. "Red" Lewis business director of athletics, expects all games to be sellouts.
