man relied on offense. Kirmeyer is a seat back who showed plenty of promise last spring in off-season drills.

Back at tailback is rugged Gwynn Fletcher, the squad's leading ground gainer last year. Being a triple threat, Fletcher will probably open tomorrow. Ogden Smith is a good punter and passer, and Coach Feathers will certainly use him.

The find of the year for the Wolfpack is Bill Thompson, a converted wingback with lightning speed. Shifted to tailback last spring, Thompson, who is also rated as an excellent hockey performer, has been very effective in scrimmages with his accurate passing and sensational running. Despite his weighing only 170 pounds Thompson is a driving runner, very difficult to tackle. A good pass defender, the Winston-Salem fall may be given the opening assignment.

**Duke's Folger Uncertain**  
Two big questions that are currently flashing across Coach Wade's mind on the night before the season's opener are probably "Will Freddy Folger's old baseball injury hold him up at all?" and "Will Billy Cox and Bolo Hodges provide competent relief at the tailback spot?"

Tomorrow's game may be played without the services of the star of last season who has been sidelined from practice since the Erskine scrimmage two weeks ago. Appearing in that scrimmage briefly Folger stayed long enough to aggravate an old injury, and the tailback spot has seen varied performers in action during these two weeks. Working out at the spot have been sophomore Bill Cox and senior Bolo Hodges. Both are prolific throwers but lack the two main reasons for the success of the injured Folger, namely his legs.

**Duke Fields Yet Line**  
Bill Duncan and Clyde Bryant will likely receive the starting nod at the flank spots. Both are big and fast and should be an asset to Duke's passing game tomorrow. Not a starter but certain to see action is all-American Al Deloaghi who is playing his first year at Duke. Other than Allen who will start and probably in the big way for this rugged linebacker is on par with any tackle in the nation.

Bill "Whitney" Davis is another all-American at the right guard position with runningmate Jimmy Knotts holding down the other side. At center will be big Carl Perkins who finished last season as top man at the pivot spot. Assisting Cox and Hughes in the backfield will be Paul Stephens and Jack Mounie at fullback, John Montgomery and Jack Belick at blocking back, and Tom Hughes, Bettis Herring, and Jack Friedland on the wing.

This year's Duke-State encounter should not be an exception to the "all-out fight" rule that has run true in the past few seasons. Both teams are in fair shape as far as casualties are concerned, excepting of course Duke's Folger, and the fans can expect the usual fairs when Duke meets State tomorrow.

## Jack Hennemier First Freshman Coach Since '42

Late last spring, Wallace Hennemier was named Coach Hennemier to be the head coach of the first freshman football team since 1945. This lapse was caused by war time Southern Conference rule allowing freshmen to participate on varsity teams. Hennemier is, however, a native of the former Alabama star, who is now varsity end coach.

Hennemier, who weighed only 150 pounds during his playing days, won the award of "Duke's Most Valuable Player" in 1940 following his final season when he lost two games but pulled a smashing surprise upset over a mighty Carolina team.

After finishing at Duke, Hennemier coached the line at his old high school in Savannah, Georgia, and then in 1939 went to Washington and Lee University as line coach.

Entering the Naval Service in 1942, he was an assistant coach and player of the Pensacola Naval Air Station team in the fall of 1942 before shipping out on an aircraft carrier. On the carrier, the Chesapeake, he participated in eight engagements in the Pacific and only received commendation for these engagements. He was separated from the Naval Service in October, 1945, with the rank of lieutenant commander.

Hennemier joined the Duke coaching staff after his discharge and acted as assistant line coach to "Dumpy" Hagler.

Dan Hill, another former Duke star, has been aiding Hennemier in the coaching duties of the Blue Devils. Hill, now assistant to the Athletic Director, was co-captain of the 1939 Rose Bowl team which went undefeated and uncored upon during the regular season.

The 1941 Blue Devils, who had piled up some 311 points on the opposition during the regular season, were invited to the Rose Bowl. When the West Coast Army officials, in view of the war emergency, refused to permit the playing of the California game, the Rose Bowl was transplanted for the only time in its history to the Shrine.

On a rain-soaked turf the Blue Devils overcame the vaunted Stanford team in a game that was packed with thrills. Shortly after this Coach Wade went into service, being succeeded by Eddie Cameron, his backfield coach.

The new head of the football team, who had led the Blue Devils to his teens to Southern Conference laurels in 1943, 1944 and 1945. The first of these championships squads lost but one game, this by one point to the Navy, and rolled up 383 points in a season that brought two 29-26 victory over Alabama in the Sugar Bowl.
