Unofficial figures place the navy errollment next month around 800 with the influx of 250 V-5½. And the Dean's office is preparing for a freshman class of some 480 men, almost maximum pre-war strength. The continuation of the Navy program prevents the fresh from being housed in the freshman quadrangle, now occupied by ROTCs. This means that present freshman dornitories, now extending down the campus into the fraternity quadrangle, and on into E. F. and G. This leaves only Crowell quadrangle of civilian upperclassmen.
