Shortages And Overloading

The university's inter-campus telephone system, pe-
rennial target of rate students in previous years, is again the subject of heated attack, as visitors, faculty and students alike struggle to make the best of a communica-
tions set-up hamstrung by shortages and jamed to the tions set-up hamstrung by shortages and

over-loaded switchboard at the Dulke hospital, central station for all inter-campus and campus-city calls. Built in 1930, it was adequate for telephone traffic until recent years, when the board's 50 -line peak operation point was
reached; electric and electronic equipment has since been held in reserve for the military or on a strict priority
basis. Orders were placed by the Maintenance Office basis. Orders were placed by the Maintenance Ofilice
and by the Durham Telephone Company for switchboard and by the Durham Telephone Company for switchboard
parts, wiring and receivers in 1940, but war materiel
rreeaing orciers prevented delivery locally parts,

Campus-city calls filter through one downtown Campus-city calls filter through one downtown
switchboard, although a new terminal exchange, built in 1940 at Lakewood, was designed to carry university trat-
fic. That building stands empty today as six-year old fic. That building stands empty today as six-year old
orders for its equipment remain unfilled. Orders placed by the universty for reccivers and spare parts are still awaiting delivery; the shops at the West campus heating
plant are turning out makeshift spares from available material.
The point has now been reached where if a new teleThe point has now been reached where if a new tele-
phone is to be installed, one now in operation must be
cut out of the system. Eventual reduction of the swollen needs of certain campus units, particularly the hospital, may ease the situation somewhat. For the present, re-
placement parts must be used to recondition existing equipment, and the meager supply of new receivers pair.
Trunk lines between the campuses and downtown Trunk lines between the campuses and downtown
Durham number only fifteen; technical difficulties pre-
vent the we of more than ten lines simultaneously, vent the use of more than ten lines simultaneously.
Badly needed copper wire for additional cable is not to be had, The university's system is independent of Durham's operating company. Strictly inter-campus telephones
are maintained by the university; pay booths are under are maintained by the university; pay boths are under
Durham Telephone Company supervision. A repairman makes weekly checks to repair pay telephones, and city
officials state that every pay phone on campus requires oficicials state that every pay phone on campus requires
weekly repair. University figures parallet this situation. A spot-check yesterday revealed 8 public telephones in working order on the West campus, exclusive of the
hospital; of these, six are pay telephones. Two are provided and maintained bu the University. Of the thirteen
booths telephones are lacting boths, telephones are lacking in five.
It is undeniably true that vandalism and careless usIt is undeniably true that vandalism and careless us-
age has drastically reduced the number of available age has drastically reduced the number of available
phones. Receivers are ripped from the wiring; coin rephones. Receivers are ripped from the wiring; coin re-
ceptaces are rendered useless by nails and slugs; transmitters are smashed.
Careful and optimum use of the present facilities is the responsibility of the student body. An equally important responsibility rests on the University; to provide the student body with casily accessible, adequate and
efficient telephone equipment as soon as is physically efficient telephone equipment as soon as is physically
possible.
