Eddie Cameron, popular mentor who Army and who was named permanent head coach when Wade returned but decided to take the post of athletic director, has been named the new athletic director: Cameron will assume the post he held under Wade in other duties. The announcement of these changes, when they came on December 21, surprised many fans, but tirely satisfactory; he had. Cameron produced good winning ball clubs. He piloted the 1944 squad to the over one of the best college teams in the nation, Alabama. Last season his squad made an excellent record as they
took everything into the fold except Army and Navy. (And for that matter, who could beat those two dripping-with-power clubs?) Cameron had done an excellent job, We believe it was because they hated to see Mr Wade retire from active participation in the great grid gam. They hated to think that they would never arain see a Wade team in action. And so they were plensed when they heard that the Old Master was going to be in harness again.
Wade has what is one of the best, and probably the competition. He began his coaching career at FitzgeraldClarke and in the time he was there won 15 games while dropping two. Moving up as assistant coach at Vanderbilt, he helped the Vandy team keep an unblemished
record for the period of his duties there. Then Wade became head coach at Alabama, and among other things urned out three Rose Bowl clubs that won two and tied one out in Pasadena. Since coming to Duke the Old
