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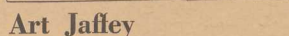

## Winter Sports

Only one of these squads has bettered its last season's record. That one squad is the wrestling team which has won one out of its four matches so far. ## Stender Leads Matmen Through Current Slate

Top man in the Duke wrestling by far this season by virtue of his three wins in as many matches is Herb Stender, Marine transfer from The Citadel.

And the amazing feature of Herb's success is the fact that, previous to coming to Duke, he had never done any competitive wrestling either in high school or during his college years at the South Carolina institution.

Stender says that when the physical education department issued a call for grappling hopefuls back in December he thought that he would like to try it, and he did. Because he had no experience whatsoever in the sport, Herb had to learn everything from the very beginning. His record shows that he must have learned a great deal, for three of his mat victories were by way of falls, which means that he did it the hard way.

Tangling with boys who had previous mat experience, who knew the so-called ropes, and following the advice and hints of wrestling coach, Harvey Potter, has made Stender into one of the best grapplers of the Duke squad. Consistent daily practice furnished Herb with the knowledge that he did not have, and when the first mat came up, he was ready for it.

Herb, who hails from Charleston, is a little man physically, but only physically. He weighs in the close vicinity of 123 pounds, therefore he grapples in the lightest of the weight divisions. He's a manly twenty-one (that proves he's a man), approximately 5'9", blond and tan.

## Grid Squad Ends Spring Sessions With Scrimmage

The third and final week of this semester's spring football practice was concluded this afternoon with a scrimmage in which nearly all of the candidates participated. The final three weeks of the grid drills will begin on March 1.

Naturally, there is at this writing no definite first string lineup. Substitutions were frequent as Head Coach Eddie Cameron tested his materials. Practically all of the positions on the first team which Coach Cameron fielded, however, were occupied by White Squad performers from last fall.

The team was split into two squads, the first two weeks emphasized blocking fundamentals, and the mastering of a repertoire of some dozen plays. Earlier this week, however, the Devils were driven indoors by inclement weather and devoted the session to dummy scrimmage on the floor of the Indoor Stadium.

Cliff Lewis, 179-pounder from Cleveland, Ohio, and George Clark, Wilson, N. C., have been running and passing well at all back, along with newcomer Ed Anthony, who hails from Lexington, N. Y. Eric Folen, also of Wilson, and Mount Airy's Butler Cox have alternated at the right half position, while Norman Harris of Asheville has been steady duty at the blocking post.

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## Grapplers Tangle With Leather Neck Matmen Tonight

Harvey Potter's Blue Devil grapplers will conclude their season tonight when they play hosts to the Cherry Point Marine squad. The first match is scheduled to begin at 7:30.

Leading the Duke grunt and groaners against the Leather-necks will be Herb Stender, winner of all four of his matches so far, wrestling in the 121-pound division. Bobby Stroppe will grapple in the 123-pound division. McGinnis in the 136, Weil in the 145, Patrick in the 155, Robinson in the 165, Woodall in the 175, and Bill Milner in the unlimited class.

The Devils have an opportunity tonight for turning in one of the best seasonal records in many years of Duke wrestling. A win tonight will give them a 400 percentage tally on the year, and will also produce a greater number of victories than any Duke squad has managed to garner in the past five years.

The Cherry Point lands, in tangling with Carolina Pre-flight, managed to win only one bout. On the two occasions that the Duksters met with them, they managed to take at least two individual contests. If this record of past performance means anything, the Devils have a better than even chance of taking the Matmen into camp.

Pre-flight's Cloudbusters handed the Devils their third defeat of the year last Saturday night in the Indoor Stadium to the tune of 20-10. It was the night when the Devils were whipped Duke. The loss was the worst that the Devils have suffered this season.

Herb Stender and Bobby Stroppe, in the first two bouts of the evening, captured victories via falls. But the Cloudbusters came back to win the remaining six bouts, one by a fall, and five by decision.

Stender's win makes him the only undefeated member of the squad. Stroppe has now won two out of his three bouts. Dick Weil, who had a record of two wins in three matches, dropped a decision to Pre-flight's Black to give him a 500 percentage for the season.

## Tankmen Swim Two In Atlanta

Still seeking their first win in dual competition, the Duke swimming team will entrain tonight for Atlanta, Ga., to meet Emory and Georgia Tech in two meets tomorrow afternoon and evening.

The Tech meet will be a revenge encounter for the Devils who lost to the Ramblers' Wrecks earlier this season, 43-32. The previous meet was held in the Duke pool.

In that meet, the margin of victory came in the last event of the competition. The entire result hung on the outcome of the 400-yard freestyle relay, which Tech won.

Swimming away from home, the Devilswill will be at a disadvantage because of the differences between pools. Tech's pool is shorter than Duke's, thus swimmers used to the longer pool must rework their timing and pace to fit the shorter distance.

The first of two meets in Atlanta will be against Emory tomorrow afternoon. In the evening the Devils scuttled the Emory team, 50-23. If they can repeat tomorrow night will give them their first win of the year.

Last Saturday the Duke mermen routed the Duke North's Home outfit, 54-21. The Goldsboro boys fought every first but one in the meet. The outstanding swimmer on this squad was Peggy Tate, named the outstanding women's breaststroke title holder in winning the 200-yard freestyle relay, they added another

Bledsoe entered Mississippi State upon graduation and achieved the honor of being named to the first team on the All-Southeastern Conference basketball team last year. . . . he played against Bill Wright and Bill Bailey, current members of the Duke team, while at Mississippi State. . . . Wright and Bailey were members of the University of Tennessee squad, also in the Southeastern Conference.

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## Wolfpack Invades Indoor Stadium Tomorrow Night

The Duke basketball squad will make its last home appearance of the year tomorrow night when it plays host to North Carolina State in a return match. The contest will get underway at 7:30 in the Indoor Stadium.

Saturday night's game will be the last for Coach Jerry Greer's pupils before he leaves for the annual Southern Conference Tournament, which will be held in Raleigh Friday, February 12.

In their last meeting with the State "Red Terrorists," as they are called, the Blue Devils did a bit of terrifying themselves, to the tune of 60-36. The victory was Duke's first in the indoor game in Southern Conference competition. Playing on the losers' court, the Blue Devils got off to its customary slow start but began coming midway in the first period and was never headed thereafter.

State pulled away to a 3-2 advantage in the closing minutes of the game but went down under a rapid-fire drive of Coach Greer's pupils. The contest also marked the appearance of a new starting five. Assistant Coach Horrell Caldwell, taking over in the absence of Coach Greer, sent a team onto the floor consisting of Bill Wright at center, Dick Gilbert and Gordon Cerver at the forwards, and Harry Harter and Bill Bailey at the guard position.

This new combination seemed to work well together on both ends of the floor. Coach Greer is expected to make no changes in the lineup for tomorrow night's encounter. Leading the State representatives into action will be Bud Kohler, a fast-breaking forward who accounted for eight points in the game at Raleigh.
