We are labeled and out unjustifiably - with a reputation as a country club and we have nour place in the public eye, un-fortunately, as a store-bought college where money grows on trees.

This we have done—and, withal, we have high rank. 'e enjoy that rank because of the excellence of the culty which we have bought, because of the number volumes in our combined liberaries, because of the illiance of our scientific research, because of our tidy

ndowment. But in all this gay superficiality of Rose Bowl football, se College Day, nights at the Goody Shoppe, and de-plie the behnd-the-scenes labor of highly educated, ublicity-shy men of science, have we not missed the ark in rulling the prime purpose of a university—to routice e ducated men and women who will become in-illigent at twomothic eitheres.
