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## Navy To Transfer V-12 Unit Head; Name McFeaters

Captain A. T. Clay, commanding officer of Duke Navy V-12 Unit since July 1, officially revealed today that he is soon to be relieved here by Captain C. P. McFeaters, USN, and ordered elsewhere.

Captain McFeaters comes to Duke from his post as Commander, Fleet Operational Training Command, Atlantic Fleet, Representative, 1st Naval District. Attending the United States Naval Academy while today he is a graduate of the Navy War College and a holder of the Navy Cross.

Coming to Duke University three years ago as Professor of Naval Science and Tactics and U.S.S. Lonsdale, 1st Naval Reserve Officers' Training Corps, Captain Clay was made commanding officer of the Duke Navy V-12 Unit when that program was initiated last July 1.

Captain Clay graduated from the Naval Academy in 1910. His first tour of duty was aboard the U.S.S. Lonsdale. In 1912, aboard the U.S.S. Tennessee, he was in Turkey for eight months while others of Captain Balkan were in progress.

The present V-12 commanding officer has also served in the Far East and in areas of the Pacific where many of today's major sea battles are being waged. For nine months he commanded the naval base at Olongapo, Philippine Islands, and shortly afterward was made commanding officer of the destroyer USS.

Captain Clay received his wings in the Naval Air Corps in 1931, and served in the lighter-than-air branch of the Naval Air Arm. His last command before retiring in 1939 was that of the U.S.S. Arizona. For a short while he was also a member of the Naval Examining Board in Washington.

# Nine Home Contests On Diamond Schedule; Nereidians Present Colorful Water Show

## "Top Hat" Theme Well Received By Spectators

With the cry, "Clarettes! Clarettes!" the Nereidian Club's 1944 water pageant, called "Top Hat Club," was introduced last night before a large crowd of swimming enthusiasts gathered about the East Campus pool. The sides of the pool itself were decorated with black and white cloth. Along the walls were large silhouettes of such typical night club figures as the chorus, the cigarette girl, and the inevitable waiter. Frank Sinatra was in there, too, slumped over a microphone.

The show was in all respects a hit and received vigorous applause from the spectators. The production was the result of several weeks of intensive preparation on the part of the members of the organization, which is led by Ruth Kennard.

As for the program, Peg Fisher, clad in a white tutu and accompanied by two cigarette girls, started the ball rolling with a tap routine to the tune of "Top Hat." As the first number was announced, sixteen corks, said gracefully into the water. Maeshu, dressed in red and gold, followed by five groups of three, all of whom were bright red suits and top hats. Scrumbling the length of the pool, they returned to the shallow end in a diamond formation and followed this by making a very clever figure in the water.

The second figure, "Waltz Time," saw the ensemble of sixteen girls swim the length of the tank, using various strokes and keeping time with the music. The girls then formed a star-shaped figure, turned this into a circle and swam out to the corners of the pool.

Ruth Kennard and Marie VanTine then swam in a specially, wearing black suits and rubber "spenguin" feet, which added considerable speed to the figure. These two girls gave an excellent exhibition of good swimming, and were followed by Patsy Foote and Annie Rabel, who danced to "Shoo, Shoo, Baby" in the program's first row show number.

Perhaps the show's most colorful number was "South American Rhythms," which involved a sort of conga routine in the water. The participants were clad in red suits and white tutus, which were topped with red flowers.

A diving exhibition, featuring Ruth Kennard, Marge Lucke, and Pat Frazier, was next on the program. Miss Kennard did a back jack, a jack half twist, and a swan dive. Miss Lucke contributed a back flip, and a jack kick. The minute Miss Frazier completed the exhibition with a half gainer, a back pike, and a half twist. All three girls accomplished divers.

The traditional figure, "Candlelight," provided the pageant's finale. Twenty girls crossed two lines in the center of the pool then formed five lines of four. In this formation they dipped their candles, thus concluding the 1944 Nereidian water pageant.

Mention the name of George McAfee to any sports fan and the conversation turns immediately to football. Ensign George McAfee, prominent during the golden era of Duke sports in '38 and '39, is now stationed at the Naval Mine Depot at Yorktown, Va.

Receiving his boot training at Norfolk, "Gorgeous George," as he was tagged in his college days, was selected by Commander Gene Tunney for further training as an instructor in the Navy's physical branch. McAfee was stationed at the Jacksonville Air Base with a chief specialist rating and while there he continued to add laurels to his already studded athletic career, playing on the baseball and football teams. George's efforts, in fact, were largely responsible for the 15-0 licking which the Jacksonville Flyers dolled out to our Blue Devils at the conclusion of the 1943 grid season. Upon receiving his commission just recently, he was transferred to his present station.

To those who followed the football campaigns of 1939 and 1940, the name of Wesley McAfee should be familiar, too. A year behind George in college, Wes was a very popular player and a particularly good one. He was a high-stepping halfback and in his senior year never had a forward pass intercepted. Hickman, dean of the Chapel, will present the 11:00 Service of Worship, and a vesper organ recital will follow at 4:00 P.M. that afternoon.

Under the sponsorship of the Religious Activities Staff, the motion picture, "One Foot in Heaven" starring Frederic March will be shown at 8:00 P.M. in Page Auditorium. Admission will be free.

## Dr. Boyd, Alumnus Edits Jefferson Works For Times

Dr. Julian P. Boyd, Duke alumnus and librarian of Princeton University, will be editor in charge of a 50-volume edition of the works of Thomas Jefferson, to be published under the joint sponsorship of Princeton and the New York Times.

The comprehensive edition will make available for the first time an accurate, scholarly, and complete presentation of America's great political philosopher.

Dr. Boyd, a historian and editor of wide experience, estimates that Jefferson's correspondence alone, excluding his public papers, addresses, and miscellaneous writings, embraces some 40,320 documents.

The unpublished Jefferson collection has been termed "the richest treasure house of information ever left by a single man."

First step to be taken will be a careful survey to find out how many of Jefferson's records are now known to be in public repositories. An appeal will be made to scholars, historical journals and societies for their aid in discovering unlocated items.

Present publication plan is to issue the 50 volumes at a rate of three annually after the necessary preliminary editorial work is completed. The edition will be limited to 1000 copies to be sold by subscription.

Announcement of the collection stirred up much enthusiasm among the nation's historical scholars, who have for years been stressing the need for such an edition.

## Jones, Young In Glee Club Posts

Betty Jones was elected president of the Women's Glee Club last week, replacing Shirley Spencer.

Carolyn Young was named vice-president of the organization, which includes all members of the women's section of the Chapel Choir.

It was also announced that the books sent to the Forum by the Carnegie Foundation, as the "key" reserves and are shelved in the International Relations Club have been placed in the Undergraduate Reading Room in the West campus library. These books, written by faculty members, are devoted to international problems of the war and peace, and are of about at the center of the west wall of the Reading Room.
