Charles Gillilan, star defenseman on Duke's 1948 lacrosse team, has been named to a first team defense position on the Intercollegiate Lacrosse Association 1948 All-American. A freshman from Baltimore, Gillilan is the only Southern Conference player to be thus honored.

Although it was his first year of college lacrosse, Gillilan performed brilliantly at defense throughout the campaign. V. S. Persson, Duke stick mentor, has named Charley as one of the best ever to play on a Blue Devil team. Gill was particularly outstanding in clearing the ball.

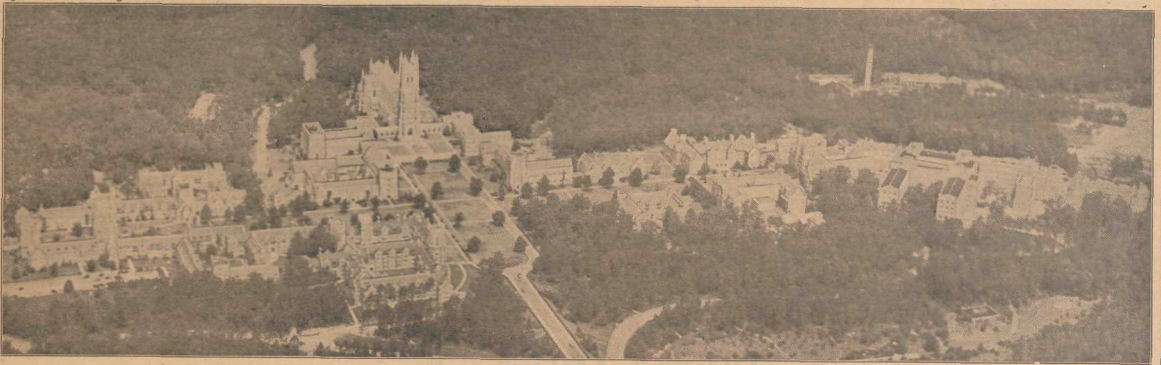
