Stepping into top positions on the editorial and business staffs of the Chronicle, three men and two women assume duties this week following election Wednesday by the Publications Board.

Phillip A. Treleven and Betty Brown lead the editorial board as Editor and Coed Editor. Business Manager Julie Gwyn takes over the business staff, aided by Assistant Business Manager Charles Dayton and Coed Business Manager Joan Burns.

Treleven has served on the editorial staff of the Chronicle for three years, holding the position of managing editor this year. He has been a member of the Interfraternity Council, F.A.C. and Choir. Treleven was president of Phi Delta Sigma his sophomore year, editor of the JPC handbook for two years, an SGA representative, and a member of Alpha Kappa Psi, Beta Sigma Phi, Gamma Phi Beta, and Phi Kappa Psi.

Brown served on the Chronicle business staff for three years, acting as assistant business manager this year. She was a member of BOS, SOA and is a member of Sigma Alpha Chi. Beginning the tour on Monday of last week, the club sang in the National Press Club Auditorium under the auspices of the Washington Alumni Association and the Optimists Club of that city.

Tuesday, the club travelled to Harrisburg to sing in the William Penn High School. As the group entered Pennsylvania, another Battle of Gettysburg was fought, and the Southerners in the club shocked the town's residents with the ringing strains of "Dixie."

Pittsburgh is always one of the high spots of the glee club tour, for after the concert in Carnegie Music Hall before some 2000 people, the club was given a formal reception in the University Club by members of the Western Pennsylvania Alumni Association.

On the Duke's recent road trip, hurlers Leroy Klein, Bud Ayers, Paul Karakuts, Dick Foley, and Al Currie have shown promise and one of these chumpkins will get the opening assignment against the Baptists. For relief work the Duke mentor can call upon Dick Strauch or Frank "Chico" Graham. Klein, Ayers, and Graham worked during the Yale game Wednesday.

Right-hander Harry Nicholas has been nominated to start for Wake. Backing the speedy New York grown pitcher in the mound department are Mickey Vander Clute, "Preacher" Mian, Charlie Krishnaw, and Mos Bauer. Wake Forest has been very impressive in its first games, holding among its victories two runaway wins over Lumberton of the Tobacco State League, Kersh, Rogers, Teague, and Fulgum led the visitors' hit parade.

Hendrickson Joins Coaching Staff As Freshman Mentor

Horace Hendrickson, one of Duke's more famous athletes, is returning to the campus soon to take over as head coach of the freshman football and basketball teams.

He was also the star third baseman on Coach Jack Coombs' baseball club and starred on the basketball court under the mentorship of Eddie Cameron. He won three letters in his senior year.

While at Pennsylvania he was chief scout in football and will serve in the same capacity here.

The play was produced in this country with substantially the same cast on October 12, 1914, at the Park Theater, New York. It was screened by Gabriel Pascal and received the Academy Award for the best screen play of 1938.
