**DUKE RENEWS OLD GRIDIRON RIVALRY**  
Duke University football welcomes an old rival, the University of Pittsburgh, to the 1950 schedule as officials of the two schools announce the ancient gridiron rivalry will be resumed following the coming season. Underlying in that season, the game will be played at the Panther's lair on September 30.

This historic series was initiated into the annals of football history when the Devils were soundly trounced at their own hometown celebration—the dedication of Duke Stadium—in October of 1929. That day, Pitt's forces routed the late Jimmy Delaney's Blue Boys by the score of 32-7.

Next in the series, was the tight thriller of November 27, 1937, when Frank Soucek, brother of one Mike Soucek who is currently gridironing at Duke, kicked an extra point, then added a field goal to feature a 10-0 Pitt victory.

Most famous of all the games played by the intersectional rivals was the spectacular Duke victory here in snow-blitzed Duke Stadium on November 28, 1939. The Iron Ducks held the vaunted Pitt attack to their only scoreless day that season as they shackled the "Dragon" Pitt backfield, Goldenberg, Chickerman, Stebbins, and Cassano, while gaining seven themselves on a blocked kick. Other stars that day for the Devils were all-Americans Eric "The Red" Tipton, "Tiger" Dan Hill, and Willard "Boo" Perdue.

In 1949, the Ducks lost at Pittsburgh by 14-13 for their only setback the following year, the Blue Devils kept the game ball here at Duke by winning 12-7.

Duke's great Rose Bowl team of 1941 soundly spanked the Panthers at Pittsburgh, pumping a 27-7 victory. The game in 1942 was the last of the series as the Devils pounded out a 28-0 win. After that the rivalry was discontinued.

**SEEMS DUKE HAS A TRACKMAN NAMED REEVES**  
Thomas Charles Reeves, Charleston, W. Va., youth who made good, is the newest sensation in southern intercollegiate track. This 23-year-old transfer from Bethany College has fired up the Duke tracksters to the point that they are winning matches, not just individual events. So far this season the lanky mountain boy has collected 61 points in team competition. Most people from his hometown have been counting that high.

To relate a few of the beano's achievements: in the Florida meet, he took the hurdle events, 100-yard dash, and a third in the broad jump for 16 points. Against Princeton, he took low hurdles and century-dash, placed second in the high hurdles and the broad jump for another 16 points. At Annapolis, the fair-haired lad repeated wins in the hurdle events and garnered another first in the 220-yarder for 15 more points.

Need we go on? Do we agree that Reeves might be developed into a fair trackman? Good, we agree.

## Trackmen Claim Easy Win Over Va.; Frosh Beat UNC

Following the varsity's easy 95%-90% win over the University of Virginia Tuesday, Duke's freshman track squad walloped the Carolina frosh 76-45 Wednesday at Duke Stadium.

Led by Henry Post and Frank Nichols the Blue Imps swept to first in eleven of the fourteen individual events and the mile relay. Post took first in the 100 yd dash, the 220 and the broad jump for fifteen points. Nichols entered in five events, won the polevault and the high jump, took second in the broadjump and third in both hurdles to garner fifteen points also.

Winning the javelin and shot put and placing in the discus gave Blaine Aaron a total of thirteen points. Keith McDonald had double wins in the hurdle events for 10 points. Charlie Tomlinson took the two-mile run and Mickey Salazar captured the 880 to round out the Duke wins.

Per usual Tommy Reeves led in the varsity win as he collected 11 points.

Duke University's golf team compiled an overall score of 301 to place second behind the University of Miami in the annual Southern Intercollegiate Golf Tourney in Athens, Ga. this week.

The Duke foursome, led by Captain Art Wall, averaged a fraction above 75 for the aizzling 18-hole competitive run. Paced by slender P. J. Boatwright, the victorious Miami froshes turned in a total card of 297 to lead the pack. The 21-year-old junior from Wofford, S. C., carded a 68 over the 6,934 Athens Country Club course.

Georgia Tech and Georgia followed Duke with scores of 302 and 304 respectively.

In the medalist division of the tournament, which was played after the team championship was decided, Duke's Art Wall lost out in the initial round in a tough 18-hole match with Miami's Bob Kelley.

Tony Reed of Duke was beaten by Dave Smith of South Carolina also in the opening round. Smith is a dark horse in the tournament.

Lone victory for the ill-fated Duke medalist attempts was Louis McLeann's win over Buddy Gordin of Miami. The Tall Atlantan will play Frank DeArdeleben, Auburn, in the second round today.

Babies, books, and beautiful students are skillfully blended to a day's work at Dr. Geloito McLugh, assistant professor of psychology, Monday night now means an evening of baby sitting to many of his 140 child and adolescent psychology students.

In conjunction with a six week lecture series at downtown Trinity Methodist Church, Dr. McLugh asks for volunteers from his classes to do a two hour baby sitting stint. The student sitters entertain the youngsters' duty to attend and benefit with their wives from Professor McLugh's discussion.

**Practical Lessons**  
The few hours spent baby sitting offer the student an opportunity to apply the lessons he has learned in the classroom. Necessity often requires the changing of a diaper or the mixing of an infant's formula.

In many instances the perplexity can be solved by a hurried glance at Dr. McLugh's latest book, *Developing Your Child's Personality*, a manual for taking care of common child problems.

Many of the lectures are documented and illustrated by sound motion pictures. Some of his topics include: "Childhood Fears," "How To Be Good," "Who Are Adolescents," "How Adolescents Grow," and "Children and Adolescents."

**Children's Clinic**  
McLugh has successfully combined his years of clinical child study with the raising of two youngsters of his own. The results are presented to his classes with a minimum of theory and a maximum of practical, proven experience.

Far from being crib courses, both child and adolescent psychology offer to the present and prospective parent a foundation of sound values in the problems of child raising.
