Next Thursday, December 11, the University will celebrate James B. Duke's signing of the Indenture of Trust on December 11, 1924, which created the Duke Endowment. The most elaborate program in the 32 year history of this event is planned, with the distin-guished journalist Henry J. Taylor speaking on "The J. is of michael chinespeak the this extensive way.

Survival of American Principles." It is not without coincidence that this extensive pro-gram will be given Thursday. Although James B. Duke was generous to an unprecedented degree in setting up the Endowment. the annual income accruing from that source is, in these days of record prices and inflation, not adequate to meet the yearly operating expenses of the

University. For example: For the last school year, the Univer-sity expended approximately \$4,750,000. About \$1,750,-000 of this amount was received from the Endowment; 000 of this amount was received from the Endowmant; \$1,500,000 was incoming from sufaert fees; and the de-ficit of \$1,500,000 had to be borrowed from the sinking fund of the Endowment. Due to the stringent restletions of the Indenture, set up to keep the University on a sound financial basis, the income from the Endowment may be withheld in whole or in part if the University should incur expense or liability beyond provision, or in the judgment of the trustees of the Endowment "be not operated in a manner calculated to achieve the re-salts intended." 


