## Audience Applauds Tenor At Concert

Violist Veissi, Pianist Evans Assist Singer

Ferruccio Tagliavini, brilliant tenor star of the Metropolitan Opera, gave out of his few Southern recitals in Page auditorium last night. He completely charmed the capacity audience with the beauty of his tone, particularly in his pianissimo passages, and his joyful stage presence.

Tagliavini was assisted by violist Jascha Veissi and accompanied by Ethel Evans at the piano.

Tagliavini's concert was a success at the very start in an Italian group which opened with a beautiful bel-canto piece "Amarilli" by Caccini. His next group was French and included Massenet's "Flegie," the lovely "Le Heure Exquise" by Reynaldo Hahn, and Westerman's "Jeune Fille" which he apparently enjoyed.

Mr. Veissi then gave Handel's Concerto in B minor for violin and was highly applauded. After singing arias from "La Sonnambula" by Bellini and "Werther" by Massenet, Tagliavini offered "M'appari tutt' amor" from Martha in response to the clamor of the audience.

In an English group after the intermission, Tagliavini sang "None But the Lonely Heart," Rogers' "At Parting" and Curran's "Dawn." Mr. Veissi followed with another group in a more modern vein which included Milhaud's "Wicoromanian" and a "Damas de Rhumba," for which the audience demanded an encore. He obliged with the "Bumble Bee" and "Ave Maria," the latter with obvious feeling.

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## Choir Opens Duke Christmas Observances With Handel's 'Messiah' Sunday Afternoon

Traditionally opening the Duke Christmas season, the Chapel Choir, directed by J. Foster Barnes, and with Mildred L. Hendrix at the organ, will present the fifteenth annual performance of Handel's oratorio "The Messiah" on Sunday afternoon at four o'clock in the Chapel.

Soloists for the occasion will be Mrs. J. Foster Barnes, soprano; Miss Evelyn Barnes and Mrs. H. E. Myers, contraltos; William Kirkpatrick, tenor; and John H. Anderson, Dr. E. B. Dunlap, and Clarence Smith, baritone. The performance will include ten choruses by the 200-voice choir, nine vocal solos, and two organ solos.

**Sing Hallelujah Chorus**  
With one chorus replaced, and a number of solos rearranged, the performance will be similar to last year's, though slightly shorter in length. Instead of "His Yoke is Easy" will be sung "Since by Man Came Death." The oratorio will reach a climax with the singing of the "Hallelujah Chorus."

According to Barnes, a semi-chorus of about 40 chor members has been invited to give the oratorio in the First Presbyterian Church of Danville, Va., on Thursday evening, December 11. Soloists for the performance will be the same, except that Mr. Kirkpatrick's tenor solo will be sung by George Clark.

**Handel Composition**  
Completed in only 24 days, "The Messiah" was first performed in Dublin in 1742, under the direction of the composer. "I think I did see all Heaven before me, the great God Himself," said Handel when writing the Hallelujah Chorus, and it is reported that when it was first sung, George II and the entire audience rose spontaneously to the oratorio in the First Presbyterian Church of Danville, Va., on Thursday evening, December 11. Soloists for the performance will be the same, except that Mr. Kirkpatrick's tenor solo will be sung by George Clark.

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# Durham Chamber Arts Society Sponsors Concert December 8

Singing as the English Duo, Viola Morris, soprano, and Victoria Anderson, contralto, appear in concert Monday night, December 8, in the Music room of East Duke building at 8:30 p.m., sponsored by the Chamber Arts Society of Durham.

Acclaimed by critics for the perfect blending of their voices, Miss Morris and Miss Anderson are reviving vocal duets in recitals of chamber music. With a repertoire which covers four hundred years of vocal music, the Duo features songs of the Elizabethan period.

**List Program**

Opening the program with songs of the 17th century, the Duo sings "Herr, ich hoffe darauf," by Schutz; "My Dear-

est, My Fairest," and "Sound the Trumpet," by Purcell; "Motto," by Couperin; and "Quelle est cette odeur agreable," an old carol arranged by Liddle. A group of romantic songs on the program includes "Ich denke dein," and "Schon blaumeln," by Schumann; "Phaenomen," by Brahms; "Le coeur de mam le," by Dalerne; and "Les danses de Lormont," by Franck. A modern group sung by the Duo includes "The Lamb," and "The Sea Garden," by Thomas Dunhill; "The Gracelful Swaying Valtze," by Frank Bridge; and "My Bonnie Lass She Smileth," by Eric Thiman.

Contralto And Soprano Solos

As a group of solos for contralto, Miss Anderson sings "Il

miu bel foco," by Marcello; "On a Time," from Pierre boules d'ayres, by Atter; "Volet Noel," by Weckerlin; "The Donkey," by Vera Buck; and "The Twelve Days of Christmas," arranged by Frederic Austin.

Miss Morris sings, as a solo group for soprano, "Ahl What Sorrow," by Handel; "L'invitation au voyage," by Duparc; "Chanson triste," by Duparc; "I

Wonder as I Wander," arranged by Niles, and "Oh No, John," arranged by Cecil Sharp.

Born in Melbourne, Australia, both vocalists intended to develop solo careers. They studied under the same teacher in London, and at his suggestion, began singing duets.

## Duke Wrestlers Open Season: More Than 20 Out For Squad

Duke's varsity wrestling team, coached by Carmen Falcone, is now hard at work in pre-season drills for the opening mat meet with the University of Maryland on January 17 at College Park. More than twenty hopefuls, most of whom are inexperienced at grapplers, turned out for the initial practice last Monday. Coach Falcone stated that, in view of the fact that so few boys turned out for the bone-bending sport, he would welcome any new material, whether the candidate has experience or not.

A letterman from last year, and veteran from past years, who is now working out with the Blue and White matmen is Mike Kunturisa, star Duke performer in the 121 lb. class last year. However, he is a doubtful granger in this season because of his being a graduate student in the Law school. Other veterans on the squad will be Ben Pomplun, 135 lb. class; Larry Phelps, who is now sidelined with a nose injury, 155 lb. class;

Lynn Dollenberger, a 44 veteran in the 165 lb. class; Francis Journeal, 155 last year, now in the 145 lb. class; and Howard Hein, stellar heavyweight from the 17 season. Garrett Blinnier, who grappled in the 145 lb. class last year, has reported yet.

Promising new men include Joe Orzano, a 128-lb. freshman matman from Baldwin, N. Y., and Freshman Jack Wamsley, Oklahoma scholastic state champion, now tending in the 155 lb. class for the Blue Devils.

Russ Hook and Dick Harrison, members of the Blue Imp grid eleven, have been showing promise in the 175 lb. class, as has Bill Britt in the 145 lb. class.

Speaking on the prospects for the forthcoming mat season, coach Falcone said, "The squad, as a whole, is inexperienced, but we have a few outstanding boys, and a few more are coming along very quickly, therefore I feel that we shall have a successful season."
