









## University Appoints Brockman Head Dietician For Union On East

Former S & W Cafeteria Employee Plans Menus

Appointed head dietitian of the Women's College Union, Mrs. Olivia C. Brockman came to Duke University at the beginning of the Spring semester.

Mrs. Brockman studied Home Economics at Georgia State College for Women, and later introduced the first course in Home Economics into the high school in her home town of Co., Georgia.

After her marriage in 1918, Mrs. Brockman took a position as dessert dietitian in charge of afternoon teas at the Mary Elizabeth Rooms on Third Avenue in New York. While in New York, she studied at Pratt Institute in Brooklyn where one of her instructors asked Mrs. Brockman to assist her in writing the Women's Home Companion Cook Book. She was also employed by the American Meat Products Company in New York.

During the war Mrs. Brockman came to North Carolina and was employed as head dietitian by the S & W Cafeteria, and later worked for the United States Rubber Company. After the war she held a position at the Charlotte Country Day School and was kitchen manager at the Charlotte Country Club, which was her last position before coming to Duke.

## Appoint Dr. Phillips Director Of Duke Religious Activities

Dr. James H. Phillips, assistant professor of biblical literature in the Duke department of religion, has been appointed Acting Director of Religious Activities. Dean Herbert Herring announced recently, Dr. Phillips succeeds the Rev. Robert Dobbins, who has been named Executive Secretary of the Commission on Christian Higher Education.

Graduating from Duke University in the class of 1933, Dr. Phillips has been a member of the Duke faculty since the fall of 1946. He received his B.D. at Yale University in 1936 and his Ph.D. from Yale in 1942. Before coming to the University, he taught at American University in Washington, D. C., and was a chaplain with the Second Air Force for three years. Dr. Phillips will continue his duties in the department of religion.

## Alter Amendment Involving Election In WSGA Meeting

At a called meeting in the Woman's College Auditorium last Monday night, WSGA unanimously passed two amendments to the constitution. The by-laws pertaining to election procedures now read as follows:

Section 1, Paragraph 2. The Examining Board nominates for each office those candidates that are qualified, on the basis of the examination and the interview for the office. If only one, or none, is nominated, the Council announces to the members of the association that the office is open for additional candidates. The changes effected by the amendments are, 1) any number of candidates may be nominated by the Examining Board, instead of only three, as has been the practice; and 2) if there are no candidates, the Council announces this to the entire association, so that candidates may have a chance to submit their names to the board.

At the 11 o'clock clock service last Sunday Mr. John Coleman, executive secretary of the World Student Christian Federation, spoke to one of the largest congregations in recent weeks. In his sermon, "Thou Art My One," he pointed the WSSF's contribution to Christian unity.

Mrs. Phillips Farley, Student Relief Administrator in Poland last year, spoke several times this week at the interdenominational and class meetings. Mrs. Farley, who was the first student relief worker behind the iron curtain, emphasized the critical conditions these war-torn countries would be in without college graduates in the next four or five years.

Mrs. Farley denied reports that the communists were dominating universities in their occupied zones, pointing out that of the 89 thousand students in Poland only two thousand belonged to communist groups despite the fact that members of the party receive free tuition, books, clothing, and food.

## Students Plan Religious Talks

Brotherhood Day, celebrated throughout the United States, will be observed by Duke University in a student-planned program tonight at 8:15 at the University House.

Representative students from each faith will talk on the subject, "My Faith's Concept of the American Way of Life." Speakers include Thomas Knight for the Catholic Church, with Dr. Paul Nagel, executive director of the Durham Community Choral, as adviser; Leon Dvorsky, representing the Jewish faith, with Mr. Bert Werbel of the Chemistry department graduate school as adviser; and Jean Saunders for the Protestant churches, with Dr. B. B. Childs, professor in the Education department, as adviser.

## Increase Veteran's Allowance

Starting in the first part of April, veterans going to college on the G.I. Bill of Rights will have increased subsistence allowances from the government, under a bill which was signed by President Truman last Saturday.

The bill passed by the Senate last summer, and then by the House on February 3, will become effective the first of April. Single veteran-students will receive \$75 instead of \$65, those under the new bill, \$105 instead of \$90, and those with two or more dependents will receive the new high of \$120.

## Increased Expense

These new rates have been estimated as an additional \$217,000,000 for the annual budget. The average expense for a veteran under the G.I. Bill to the Government is now estimated at \$100.50 per month.

Experts on the staff of the House Veterans Committee said that veteran-students who have part-time jobs will be eligible for the new allowances, but their combined earnings and subsistence allowances will be held under a ceiling. These ceilings are \$175 a month on combined earnings and allowances for veterans without dependents, and \$200 for those with dependents. These figures are the same as were carried under the present law.

The same ceilings on combined earnings and allowances are imposed on veterans taking on-the-job training under the G.I. Bill. The House and the Senate are trying to adjust differences on a

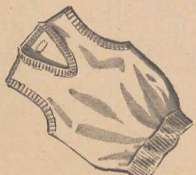

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## Goffard Lectures On Hypnosis; Demonstrates On 4 Volunteers

### Overflow Crowd Attends Lecture

Sponsored by the Sophomore "X" Cabinet, the second in a series of lectures was held in the chemistry lecture hall, Tuesday evening, as Prof. S. J. Goffard spoke on "Hypnosis" before a capacity crowd.

Goffard traced the history of hypnosis, and he related many interesting facts about the subject. He stated, "Ever since the beginning of hypnosis with the early medicine men, the subject has been surrounded by mystery. Now it is being accepted by many mental authorities." Goffard told the audience that "a hypnotized person is not asleep and not in an abnormal state. Instead, he feels lethargic, heavy, as in a half-sleep state. Most people can be at least slightly hypnotized." He pointed out one danger in a demonstration that "usually a person will do nothing he wouldn't ordinarily do. However, we don't know what he would do ordinarily."

Subjects Demonstrate  
Four men who were hypnotized during the afternoon, were seated in the front row asleep.

The first volunteer, Alan Sugarman, rose when addressed by Prof. Goffard, and walked to a chair. He sat down and went to sleep. Then, he described a jumble of letters, written on the blackboard, as a beautiful poem. The second volunteer, Hans Bonstede, was told that the room would be filled with fog when the water faucet was turned on. When he awoke, he complained of the fog and opened the door. The third experiment consisted of the volunteer, Lamar Crews, drawing faces on the board. He was previously instructed to draw a red mustache on the face when Goffard was not looking and he did this.

Goffard, now a member of the faculty, received his A.B. degree at the U. of Michigan, did graduate work at the U. of Oregon, attended Harvard during the war, and is now working on his Ph.D. at the U. of Minnesota.

## Angier Finalists Named This Week

Thirty finalists have been selected from a group of 135 candidates in North Carolina high schools in the Angier Duke Regional Scholarship competition. The finalists, chosen by district committees, will visit Duke University early in March for tests and interviews, on the basis of which final awards will be made.

Six scholarships are offered to one student in each of six geographically divided districts in the state of North Carolina by the Angier B. Duke Memorial, Inc. The scholarships are valued at a maximum of \$3,000 for a possible four-year period, and are to be applied towards education at the University. The scholarships offered for the first time this year, are renewable from year to year provided that the student maintains a creditable scholastic average and displays the qualities of leadership and citizenship while at the University. Dean Freshman and Clerk M. Manchester is the chairman of the scholarship committee.

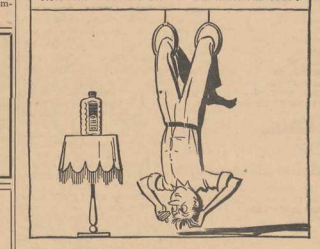

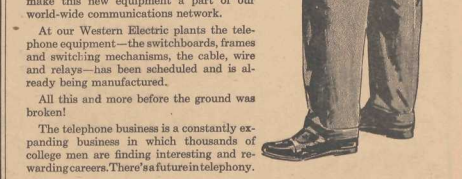

We feel that Coach Gerard deserves a lot of credit on what was definitely a moral victory for the Big Blue eagles. Using a system of play new to the 1948 Ducks, Gerard took the pressing defense of Mr. Case and rammed it down his throat.

The fact that the State boys were playing up to their usual par served to make Duke's show all the better. Dickey and Bartels and the rest looked every bit as good as we had previously except in the matter of points in which they were controlled admirably by a fast and plucky Duke five. Every one of the Gardeners looked better than we have ever seen them this season with the possible exception of Ben Collins, but very few men look good when guarded by State's Bartels.

Individually and collectively the boys looked good, but we were particularly impressed with the play of Tommy Hughes and Curly Gooten. Hughes played merely strengthened our previous opinion that his light and speed forms a sparkling which has pushed the Devils along in some of their best exhibitions of the season. Gooten, last year one of the starting Duke eagles, hasn't shown up particularly well previously this season. On Saturday night, however, he played the sort of ball that deserves a place on a varsity ball club. If there were two better guards on that court Saturday, for either team, we failed to notice them.

Monday night, the Ducks downed Georgia Tech in Atlanta; and the next night were upset by Clemson. Wednesday they met the Gaeseum once more. Here, they lost, but they proved that beating them was no easy chore. Gerard had Case's number, and only the superiority and reserves of the Terror made victory possible. Orbits to K. C. 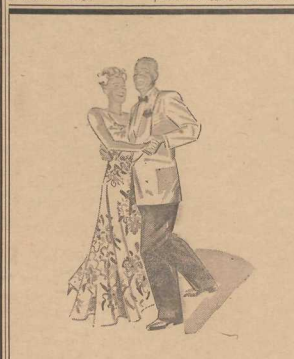

Following their 15-9 conquest of Davidson's Wildcats, the Duke University wrestlers journey to Virginia this week-end for encounters with the grapplers of Washington and Lee and V. P. I. The Blue Devils' opponents on their invasion of the Old Dominion are the top ranking wrestling clubs of the Southern Conference, with the Generals of W. and L. now occupying the number one slot. The Gobblers of V. P. I. who are generally regarded as being the second strongest team in the circuit this season, will tangle with the Duke matmen tomorrow in Blacksburg. Monday will find the Dukesters facing the undefeated Washington and Lee squad. The loop pacer's closest match came when V. P. I. was able to win a mere two bouts. Their other victories include a 25-3 drubbing of North Carolina State, a 21-3 drubbing of Carolina, and a 20-3 triumph over Maryland.

Couch Carmen Falcone's team has been plagued the entire season by injuries. Billmore will not be available for further duty because of an injury. In the same plight is Howard Hesse. At present Dallenberger, Hesse's successor in the unlimited division, is also out. New men in the Duke line-up are Moser, G. McMillasters, the Wamsboro, S.
