

TIME OUT

Our column of last week rings a bit hollow on witnessing the excellent sportsmanship of our morose little buddies at the Hill. We wonder why they didn't throw coke bottles on the floor, they did about everything else that would appeal to midlevel intellects under the guise of school spirit.

Disparaging the virtues of our hosts, the type of hall-playing exhibited by the Devil Cagers could have been worse—they could have played on their hands and knees. It wasn't a question of which team was the better, for neither of them were good, it was just that Duke was a little worse than the White Phantoms. Let's look at the individual scoring.

Ben Collins was the only Devil starter who was even nearly up to par, scoring a total of 10 points; however, he was covered like a tent by one Mr. Paxton who, though several inches shorter than big Ben, succeeded in snatching almost every rebound from out of the hands of the Devils' worthy center throughout the second half. Ceep Youmans was held scoreless for the entire first half, coming up with one field goal and one foul in the second; and Bill Martin scored one foul per free throw snapping set shots from everywhere but the press box. From this discouraging recap of the Duke squad isn't get the idea that the Phantoms were much better.

The famous hook of Carolina's oft-praised Dillon was good for a mere two points and Miller's replacement, Swartzburg, was held scoreless during the initial period and held out during the second period. Generally the Phantoms looked like the team which last to the Hoosiers of State by its gigantic margin, but unfortunately the Duke squad isn't quite up to the level of Everett Case's charges.

Speaking of the Red Terrers recalls to mind the rather depressing fact that the Gerardens are slated to meet here tomorrow night. Coach Case's Indiana boys, currently rated third in the nation, will probably trim the Dukes by just as high a margin as they choose. However, we tend to be optimistic and will go on record for a 26-point difference with the State boys on the long end of the score. Last season, the Devil Cagers upset a highly favored State five—it could happen again, but then, crows don't fly.

IM All-Stars Tackle Jaycees

A hand-picked squad of intramural all-stars begins daily workouts Monday in preparation for its encounter with the Duke Junior Varsity. Coaching the All-Stars will be Ted Villanueva, senior manager of intramurals.

In the previous tussles between the Jaycees and All-Stars, the intramural boys have always topped the Blue Imp cagers. This year's game will be a preliminary run to the return engagement with the Duke-Carolina contest slated for February 23. A list of the chosen men will be posted at the IM office by Monday morning. It was also announced that the twenty-man squad selected will be cut to around 15.

In the first division of intramural play, the K.A. "A" team appears to be the team to beat by virtue of their victory over the Sigma Chi "A" club. S.A.A. is also battling for top honors in the hoop. The Sigma Chi "B" team, which won the first half championship of the second di-

vision, was dumped during the week by the Kappa Alpha "B" team. Lambda Chi is dominating play in hoop three, although they are being pressed by the A.C. team. The Grid Club and the K.A. "D" basketballers top the fourth circuit, while the Globe Trotters and Club 111 pace the fifth and sixth divisions. The K.A. "C" team heads its league, with House M still leading the frosh. The M victory over the Sigma Chi practically clinches the championship for the winners.

Duke Matmen Beat Tech; Davidson Here Tomorrow

Tomorrow afternoon, Saturday, February 14th, the unbeaten but once tied Blue Devil matmen of Duke University tangle with the Wildcats of Davidson College in the indoor stadium here at 4 o'clock. Sporting wins over Maryland, and Georgia Tech and a tie with the State Wolfpack, the Dukesters enter tomorrow's bout as slight favorites.

State Invades Duke Indoor Stadium Tomorrow

9000 Will See Match As N. C. State Puts Record On Line

North Carolina State's Red Terrers invade Duke's Indoor Stadium to face the Blue Devil basketball quintet in a Southern Conference tilt tomorrow night before a capacity crowd of 9,000 with the tip-off set for 8:30 p.m.

Boasting a record of 19 wins against 2 losses, the Hoosier Hotshots from Raleigh are currently ranked third in the nation behind Kentucky and New York University, and are in first place in offense with an average of 80 points per game. Their only losses to date are to West Virginia, and Holy Cross in an over-time thriller in the Sugar Bowl, while among their victories are a smashing 76-56 shellacking of St. Johns in Madison Square Garden and an 81-42 rout of North Carolina's hot-and-cold White Phantoms. The point-bayby Wolfpack are currently leading the hoop pace with a 6-0 record and are heavily favored to cop the Southern Conference next March 4, 5 and 6, and to make a bid for national honors in either the N.C.A.A. or the National Invitation Tournament next month.

Coch Gerry Gerard's Blue Devils have shown occasional flashes of brilliance but on the whole are having a mediocre season and are currently fighting it out for a berth in the Southern Conference Tournament, which they are not assured of yet.

In their recent tilt with the White Phantoms of Carolina, Tech Duke lost 44-22. Big Ben Collins was outstanding at the pivot spot in the first half, amassing 11 points in the lead-up period, but later faded out completely. "Ceep" Youmans was also not up to peak form. If the whole squad is in top shape, anything can happen tomorrow. It may be recalled that last year, the Red Terrers were heavily favored to beat the Blue Devils but that night and turned a sensational 29-10 half-time score into a 80-53 upset, with Garland Loftis turning 10 set shots into 8 swishers and 16 points to lead the scoring, while Ed Koffenberg and Berge Seward were being held in check.

Star Fast

Outstanding features of the Wolfpack squad are their phenomenal speed, shooting accuracy, use of the all-court game and their ability to outpace big players, any five are just as good as any other five. The only senior on the team is Capt. Leo Katkavek, an outstanding defensive player and floor captain. Talented man on the squad is freshman Paul Horvath who, although 6' 7" generally is the star. At the forward position are the two point-guards, sophomore Dick Dickey and Jack McCombs.

Marine Corps Seeks Officer Candidates

Students Train At Quantico, Va. In Summer

A reserve training program for college students, leading toward a commission in the United States Marine Corps, is now available to Duke students declared Major George B. Kantner, USMC of the University ROTC Unit today. Students interested in enrolling in the program should contact Major Kantner in his office, House 7, Room 112, any weekday between 9 a.m. and 4:30 p.m.


In an interview with the Chronicle today the program was outlined by Major Kantner who announced that Duke has been designated as one of the nation's accredited institutions at which potential officers are selected for training in the Platoon Leaders' Class. Under this program it is possible for freshmen, sophomores, and juniors to receive officer candidate training during the summer vacation months, thereby allowing complete attention to academic subjects during the regular school year.

Students enrolled in the Marine Corps Reserve (inactive) and are assigned to officer candidate training duty only upon their written request.

Members attend one or two summer training periods of six weeks each. Students enrolled when freshmen or sophomores attend two summer periods while students enrolled as juniors in college, with one year previous military service, are required to attend only the advanced training. The classes are conducted at the Marine Corps Schools, located at Quantico, Virginia, thirty miles south of Washington, D. C.

During the first training period, students are corporals and are paid \$90 a month. Trainees are given the rank of Sergeant and receive \$100 a month during the advanced training period. In addition to this pay, each candidate receives quarters, subsistence, clothing, medical attention, and transportation. The program is financed by the government expense from his home to camp and return.

The PLC enables college students to earn Reserve commissions in the Marine Corps upon graduation through summer instruction without draft and military charges during the school year.

The required periods of military training and after graduation from college with a baccalaureate degree, Platoon Leaders are eligible for appointment to the commissioned ranks as Second Lieutenant, U. S. Marine Corps Reserve. A limited number of graduates, if they so desire, are commissioned in the regular Marine Corps.

To be eligible for enrollment in the Platoon Leaders Class, applicants must be male citizens of the United States with a freshman, sophomore or junior classification. They must not be a member of any other military organization, including the Army or Naval ROTC. However, members of Class III(B), III(C) and III(D) of the Marine Corps Reserve who are otherwise qualified are eligible for participation in the program. They must be

unmarried and agree to remain so until completion of the advanced course of summer military training. They must sign an agreement to serve for the required periods of active duty training and if a veteran, must have received an honorable discharge. Applicants must not have a claim pending for or be drawing a pension, disability allowance, disability compensation, or retired pay from the government of the United States.

Further requirements state that trainees must be over 17 years of age and that they be less than 25 years old on June 30, of the calendar year in which they are graduated from college. No previous military service is required for freshmen and sophomores, whereas juniors must be veterans of the armed forces, having served on active duty for a period of not less than twelve months.

To be considered for the Platoon Leaders Class, a student must be of commissioned-officer caliber and physically qualified in all respects.

Invitational Open Houses
On February 23, fraternities will conduct open houses, with attendance being primarily by invitation. Freshmen may, however, at this time visit any fraternity of their choice for a period of not more than one hour.

February 24 will usher in a formal rushing period which will continue through the 26th, with open houses from 7 to 10 on these evenings. Bids will be mailed by the IFC by February 27, and will be returned by freshmen to the fraternity of their choice at 3 p.m. on Sunday, February 29.

Must Have "Average"
In contrast with previous rushing procedure, only "Average" men will be allowed to participate in the formal rushing period, February 24-26. This year, open houses will be held for those freshmen who failed to achieve the necessary "Average" after the close of formal rushing, beginning on March 1. Bids to these men will be delivered to the chairman of the Rushing Committee of IFC by 12 noon on March 2, and will be distributed and returned by freshmen at 2 p.m. of that same day, according to IFC regulations.


