The second half of the intramural basketball program has swung into action this week. Winners of the second half will earn the right to meet the first half champions for the loop crown.

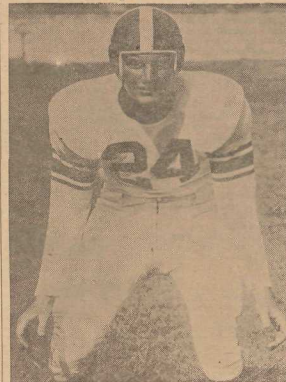

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UNC To Entertain Gerardmen In Woollen Gym, Chapel Hill

Gerry Gerard's Blue Devils basketballers invade Chapel Hill tomorrow night to face the hot-and-cold White Phantoms of the University of North Carolina, with the tip off scheduled for 8:30 in Woollen Gymnasium.

Tomorrow's tilt will preview a busy week for the Duke squad which takes on the Houser Hotshots from N. C. State in the big game next Saturday—the same point-happy Red Terrors who annihilated the hapless White Phantoms 81-41 last Tuesday in Raleigh.

Carolina's Tarheels opened the season with an impressive string of victories, running up twelve victories in as many starts. Invading Madison Square Garden, the White Phantoms ran up against a brick wall—an all too fast moving wall—in New York University which proceeded to swamp the Tarheels 64-35, after holding them scoreless for thirteen minutes and to a score nine points during the first half. Continuing their northern tour, the White Phantoms bowed to the Temple Owls 61-51.

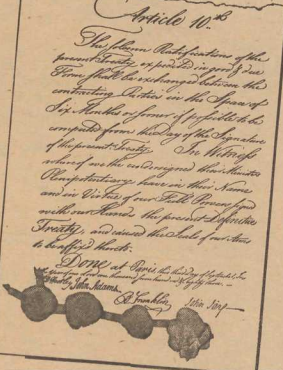

his graduation from the United States Naval Academy in 1881, Dr. Flowers earned his M. A. degree at Trinity in 1900. Davidson College in 1927 awarded him the honorary degree of doctor of law.

Appointment of a special committee to make recommendations for a successor to the president post immediately followed Dr. Flowers' action. The committee will report to the Board of Trustees following a tentative decision.

Early Trinity Instructor
The newly-resigned president first taught mathematics at Trinity College, accepting the post of secretary of Trinity in 1910 under Dr. William P. Few, then the new president. In 1903, his duties were enlarged to include the post of treasurer. Following the creation of the Duke Endowment and the founding of Duke University, Dr. Flowers became vice-president in charge of the business division. Since 1925, he has held membership on the Board of Trustees.

Long active in civil, religious and philanthropic affairs of the state, Dr. Flowers is president of the South Atlantic Publishing Company. He was named "Man of the Year" by the Durham Chamber of Commerce in 1946.
