What's in a Name?

According to Carlyle—the Victorian novelist, not the Indian university—it is the soul of things that really counts. The rest, to break it down into our own vulgar vocabulary, is just so much excess baggage—clothes that are non-essential.

Perhaps it was from this point of view that the university has never taken the trouble to name several of the athletic centers on this campus. Or maybe they just couldn't think of anyone worthy of having a stadium named for him. Whatever the reason, this center raises a very strong objection to such impersonal treatment of the homes of Duke sports.

In addition to such reasons that naming the stadiums would be a nice gesture, that it would be proper for them to be called after someone, and that it would perpetuate forever the contributions of various people to Duke sports, we have a rather selfish argument to substantiate our views. One goal of all sportswriters is the maintaining of color in a story, and it certainly doesn't help matters very much when the only reference that can be made is to "the Duke stadium" or "the new gymnasium" or "the baseball field."

Custom among Chronicle writers during the past few years has led them to refer to the Duke diamond as Combs Park. This title has never been officially accepted, however. In our opinion, such a move would be a most fitting tribute to a man who has done as much for Duke athletics as Jack Combs.

There are many Duke sports figures who deserve some permanent recognition for their services. One of them is Cap Card, the grand-daddy of sports at Duke (see Trinity). At this point, we suggest that the proper organization on the campus should look into the matter of naming the stadiums and see that something is done about it.

Lewis Pleads For Harriers

8-Man Cinder Squad Looms for Blue Devils

Faced with the possibility of again having to go through the season with an eight-man cross-country squad, Coach "Red" Lewis yesterday issued another call for recruits as the Blue Devil harriers began to step up the pace in practice sessions.

The time since workouts started has been far too brief to give any idea of what can be expected during the coming harrier campaigns. The main cross-country burden, however, will probably be carried by Captain Hank Profenius, Dick Beeson, Wally Lockwood, and Sam Kinton—all freshmen, Lockwood, who paced the harriers last season in his first year on the varsity squad and who sparked the sensational 1939 freshman, hill-and-duliers may develop into one of Duke's best distance runners.

Only five freshmen reported for tryouts with the Blue Imp squad. Coach Lewis feels that many freshmen failed to answer the opening practice call because they erroneously believe that, due to a lack of experience, they are unable to compete in collegiate levels. Coming to Duke in 1921 direct from his brilliant stay at Alabama, Wade went ahead to place Duke on the list of the nation's top teams. A Rose Bowl team, five All-Americans, 76 wins in 97 games, and five Southern conference titles have been given Duke followers by the keen coaching of the "Silent Scotsman."

Of the four Rose Bowl teams sent West by Wade, three of them came home on the long side of the score. Only a heart-breaking pass by Southern California with forty seconds left to play in the 1929 game spoiled the perfect record of the undefeated, untied, and unscorred-on "Trot Dukes."

Five students realize that in addition to his duties as head coach, Wade is director of the entire athletic system at Duke university. Busy as he is, Wade finds time practically every day during the off-season for plenty of golf and occasional hunting.

This fact may give John (Red) Cochran, sophomore from Birmingham, his first chance in varsity intercollegiate competition.

Those who witnessed last year's Wake Forest-Carolina game remember that it was in this contest that Pruitt got his big chance after Red Mayberry sustained a broken arm two weeks prior to the game. Pruitt turned in an excellent performance as the Deacons trounced Carolina, 12-0.

With the season's first intercollegiate game of this year coming up tomorrow, the Deacons are placing their hopes on Cochran, who sparked the Wake Forest team to a 65-0 win over the Camp Davis Archies last week. Red averaged a little short of (Continued on page 4)

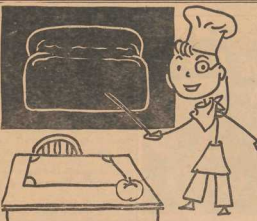

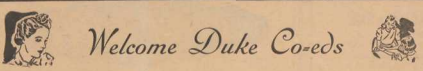
