Coed cheerleaders for Duke in the near future seemed possible tonight as a spontaneous movement for female yell squads members gained momentum on both East and West campuses. Spurred on by rising campus opinion, various students, men and women have approached Coach Clark, head cheerleader, broaching the idea and stressing particularly the need for coed representation on the cheerleading squad as well as on publications, the debating team, the Social committee, and various other all-campus organizations.

Clark, as leader of the cheer squad, is head of the newly named Yell club which is an organization composed of leaders of the three college student organizations, which will attempt to rebuild spirit throughout the university.

Miss Alice Baldwin of the Women's college, in a statement to the press, said yesterday made clear the method by which action might be taken on the question for the Women's college members of the cheerleading squad should be presented to the Women's Students' Government association at a regular meeting of the Baldwin.

"If it is presented to me, I will present it in turn to the Yell club," she said.

Such a move, if instituted, would be nothing new. Two years ago for the Women's college served as cheerleaders in the game of football. Clark declared that it did not look "dignified or a bit ladylike."

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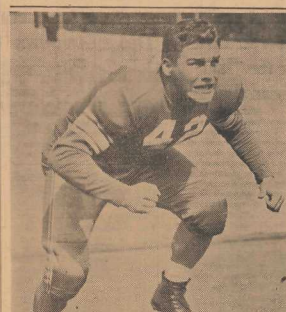

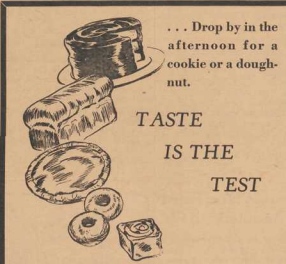
