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### Clean Election At Last

By tomorrow noon a number of candidates will have submitted petitions for the senior representative vacancy in the Men's Student Government association.

Indications are that a goodly number of petitions will be filed with SGA president Larry Blanchard for the office left vacant when senior representative Dick Sayre was unable to return to school this fall.

Registration for this special election will be held on Thursday, October 16. The election, open to senior men of Trinity college, will be held on October 23.

Thus far, no combine arrangements or other "working agreements" concerned with this special election have come to our notice. We profoundly hope that no such perverted politics will be practiced.

This is the first special election for a major SGA office In its its the first special election for a major SGA onice in recent years. Larry Blanchard's neat trick of calling the election as a surprise has given cheap campus politicians very little time to organize into combines.

We have in this election an opportunity of potentially profound significance. Here is a chance for the Duke SGA election system to work as it was originally designed and intended to work—without party line-ups.

The petitions that will be submitted tomorrow will of necessity support capable student leaders. Without combine "trades" and deals designed to inveigle fraternity votes—a thing not possible in a special, one-office election—only good men will be nominated.

For any group to nominate a dead-head would be a waste of time, for this election should be decided hon-estly on a basis of the capability and popularity of the candidates.

The Men's SGA needs a senior representative that will the Men's GGA needs a senior representative that will work. This year's student council has caught the new, dynamic spirit that is quietly sweeping through all Duke institutions and undergraduate organizations. Like many other formerly dead organizations, the Men's SGA is trying hard this year to be something and to do something, to be vibrant and allive.
