## Y Completes Arrangements For Annual Dad's Day Weekend

200 Reservations  
Already Received

Preparing for its earliest Dad's Day weekend in history, the Y is rushing plans to completion for a three-day program to be climaxed by the Duke-Colgate game.

Working against time, Y members completed the mailing of invitations, a two-week job last year, within three days. With reservations already totaling 200 and still coming in, the question uppermost in the minds of Y men is, "Who will be the first dad to arrive?" Last year's record was set by the father who arrived on Wednesday before the game and Y members are speculating on whether that record will be repeated.

Weekend activities start Friday evening with a pep rally in Page auditorium at 8 o'clock, to which all visitors are invited. Word Clark, head cheerleader, announced that plans for the rally include movies of former games and the introduction of the Big Blue team.

Registration of dads will begin in the Union Lobby at 9 Saturday morning. Father and son luncheon will be held at 10 in the Union ballroom.

Highlights of the weekend activities will be the Colgate game, content with dads the guests of the Y. So that sons and their families may sit together, a special section in the stadium has been reserved in which extra tickets may be purchased at \$2.50 apiece.

Immediately following the game, a faculty-dad reception will be held in the quadrangle between freshmen dormitories and the Union. This reception, scheduled from 5:30 to 6:30, is an innovation in Duke's Day activities.

The annual Dad's Day banquet will be held at 7 o'clock Saturday evening in Union dining hall B and C. Dr. Robert L. Frazier will deliver the address. (Continued on page 4)

Having returned from its trip into the Northland with its second Southern conference victory tucked safely away, Duke's undefeated football team settled down yesterday to a week of concentrated preparation for its clash with Colgate in Duke stadium Saturday.

The Colgate Red Raiders, though defeated by a Dartmouth second half drive last Saturday, boast a well-balanced eleven, and one which should offer the Blue Devils an afternoon of first class competition following the breather win over Maryland, 50-0.

In that game up in Baltimore, the Duke team completely subdued a gallant but outclassed Maryland grid outfit. Taking advantage of several fumbles, Wallace Wade's team rolled up a 25-0 lead in the first quarter, added six more points before the half ended, and then tallied 19 points in the final quarter.

Making the eight Blue Devil touchdowns were Tommy Davis, three, Winston Siegfried, three, and Steve Lach, two.

Lach scored the first touchdown before the game was two minutes old with a 25-yard sweep around right end. A minute and a half later Siegfried plunged into the center of the line on the Maryland 39, broke through, dodged past the secondary, and raced like a clock star for the goal.

From that point on, it was just a matter of how many points the Blue Devils would roll up. Only once did the Old Liners threaten, and that was in the fourth quarter on a gallant 48-yard march that halted on the Duke 10-yard line when Wade sent in a quartet of relays.

The lone disappointing feature of the contest from a Duke point of view was the fact that Maryland completed 18 out of 28 passes. Most of these completions were accomplished while the second and third string backfields were in the game.

## Soccerites Downed 5-0 By Terps

### Devil Booters Prep For Panther Clash

Having been defeated by the University of Maryland 5-0 last Saturday morning, Coach Gerry Gerard's soccer team will be seeking its initial victory Thursday afternoon when the booters travel to High Point to engage the High Point Panthers.

The Duke soccerites had little chance to show their offensive power against the Terrapins Saturday, but the strong Maryland forward will kept the Devil booters on the defensive all during the contest. After Maryland's first team had built up a 3-0 lead in the opening quarter, Coach Jack Warner substituted freely during the remainder of the game.

Due to the shaky play of the Duke soccer team, Coach Gerard has been sending his charges through hard scrimmages this week in an effort to get the squad in shape for the High Point scuffle on Thursday. The Duke players will be out to average last year's 1-0 setback handed them by the Panthers.

turn brought out seventy raging freshmen, hollering "Caroline man."

Today the numeral "45" is painted on the bell-on-top of ten or fifteen layers of paint which once were "45", "45's" and "42's. Each fall enterprising freshmen climb the forty-foot tower in the dead of night, paint their class numerals over those of the preceding year.

Only once was the bell really rung out of turn. In 1937, when Duke led Tennessee in a "moral victory," enterprising freshmen rang the bell. They still remember the day as one of misfortune received from the hands of late upperclassmen, conscious of the sacrilege such an act brought forth.
