Take Repares to Lose Now Game

Students Begin Formation of Campus War Committee

Leaders Hold First Meet in East Duke Building Dec. 17

Plans for a Duke student war committee will be discussed at a meeting of leaders of a number of campus organizations to be held in the auditorium of East Duke building tomorrow night at 8.

The purpose of the new body is to aid Duke students in finding their place in the nationwide war effort, Larry Blanchard, Trinity SGA president and committee chairman, said. The plan was suggested by Dr. E. J. Hamilton of the history department. It was taken to the Interfraternity Council, and that body voted to take action on the measure. Larry Blanchard was put in charge of the formation of the body, and Don Simister, Junior class Trinity SGA representative, was named Blanchard's assistant.

A ten point program was drawn up by Blanchard and Simister after studying a similar plan now in action at the University of North Carolina and conferences with administrative officials here. The program is as follows: (1) civilian defense program investigation; (2) physical fitness program; (3) formation of an information center; (4) assistance for Mr. A. S. Brower in the Duke defense office; (5) coordination of the various drives connected with national defense; (6) formation of first aid classes for men and women; (7) building interest in the already existing defense courses on East campus; (8) physical development classes for men and women; (9) approval of all campus financial drives; (10) formation of a student committee to aid in the re-education of the college curriculum.

The program above includes bringing to the campus attention of the nation to explain various problems pertinent to college men and women, the collection and assimilation of news and announcements, and the general direction of the college's efforts.

Shortly after the plan had been approved by the Interfraternity Council, the National Secretary of Education sent a plea to college campuses for aid in the formation of such a group.

"The plan was adopted by the IFC and will be turned over to campus leaders tomorrow night in an effort to do something of value in the present situation," Don Simister said.

Student Tickets At Reduced Price Available at Gym

Thousands of applications poured into the athletic office today as Duke and Durham readied themselves to play host to the first Rose Bowl classic event to be played outside the traditional bowl in Pasadena.

The game is to be under the supervision and management of the Tournament of Roses committee and the Duke athletic authorities, and is to carry out all the arrangements and conditions that have existed in Rose Bowl games of the past.

Numerous officials of the Tournament of Roses committee are leaving the west coast immediately, and will set up headquarters in Durham to aid authorities here in handling the game, Coach Wallace Wade announced yesterday.

Students may make reservations to the game at the athletic office in the new gymnasium beginning Wednesday at noon.

Dwight Dean, graduate manager of athletics, announced today that students may pay the \$1.65 necessary to insure reservation. Tickets will be \$4.00 for students, but \$4.40 for just as they would have been in Pasadena.

Games of chance, square dancing, and card singing will be featured at the Y holds open house for the campus in Grand Vance Courtyard and his Duke Ambassadors will furnish music for dancing in the union ballroom.

Boatette, Blago, Toldo, and various other gambling games played with play-money will be available for those at the gaming initiation. Winners at the various games of chance may win anything from a candy bar and a "penny" room, the proceeds of which will be turned over to the tuberculosis fund.

A card room will be open for those who wish to play. The party will be open to all on a non-dating basis and a capacity crowd is expected to attend, according to Sam Scott, chairman of the Y social committee.

The proposal would call for the selection by each sorority of a staff member to act in a purely advisory capacity. The suggestion will be referred to the groups and a decision will be made at a meeting of the council. Miss Wilson is adviser for the council.
