Convention Called To Consider Change In SGA Constitution

Fulfilling their campaign promises of last spring to inaugurate a more democratic system of voting, the members of the council of the Men's Student Government association have called a constitutional convention, scheduled for next Thursday's general assembly, to consider an amendment which would abolish registration and establish a more simplified method of election of SGA officers.

This amendment, if approved, would mean that registration would be more democratic than formerly. The SGA council, which represents both composites and the independents, is unanimously behind the plan. In order for the amendment to go into effect, a two-thirds vote in favor of the proposal by members of the association present at the constitutional convention will be necessary.

Last SGA constitutional convention met in Page auditorium on Saturday, May 6, 1941, to propose two amendments. The first of the amendments, proposed by motion by Samuel Holton, provided for abolishing the registration system; according to the plan, the officers were to be elected by balloting in general. The second amendment, proposed by motion of the change and 391 against, which would make the voting system more democratic, would come to the vote in greater number.

Phi Beta Kappa Honors 35 Students At Fall Elections

Phi Beta Kappa, national honorary scholastic fraternity and oldest Greek letter fraternity in existence, elected thirty-five students at the fall business meeting Wednesday. This is the largest group ever elected in the history of the Duke chapter, according to Dr. James Cannon, III, secretary-treasurer of the local society.

Crum Discusses Prayer as Force In Modern Life

"Prayer releases tremendous forces which are creating a dynamic in human personality," Dr. Mason Crum, of the University of North Carolina, declared Wednesday night in an address before the students of the Catholic club, held in the Union recreation hall.

"It is a mistake to think of prayer as a 'passive exercise,'" said Dr. Crum, "merely of asking for something, or appealing a higher being. Too often prayer is thought of as a kind of ritual for the elderly, for the people and children and not suited to the robust activities of youth. Calendar Of Events



Tuke Wins Senior SGA Balloting

Ted Tuke, Pi Kappa Alpha, was elected senior Student Government representative yesterday in a special election called to fill the vacancy left by Dick Sayre, who was elected to the post, last spring but was unable to return to the University.

Winning out over eight other candidates, the largest number of the small number of votes cast, Tuke polled 61 votes. Werner Brown, Alpha Tau Omega, ran second with 46 votes. The total number of ballots counted was 107, was declared by the Chanticleer.

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Pitt Scribe Bewails Clawless Cats' Fate

Pitt's worst and clawless Panther squad will stumble into another major suicidal tomorrow afternoon against the strong, undefeated team of Duke University.

With only a few remnants left of the strong physical team that entered the Minnesota contest, head coach Charlie Bowser has his hands full this week getting his patched-up warriors in trim for this Saturday's fracas.

The Jungle Cats have the most unenviable record and the most obvious weakness in the country. The footballers have acquired a slight inferior attitude after their first three games, and will enter the game with nothing to lose, but lots to gain should they overcome their superior foe.

In the opening game of the season, Pitt played a very mediocre Purdue team, and dropped a listless, 6-0, contest to them. Critics said it was without doubt the worst contest that they had ever seen a Pitt aggregation play.

This observer remembers the afternoon three years ago when a stubborn House J freshman team nearly upset the Sigma Chi's in a playoff game, and it was this same Bill McCahan, then playing for House J, who held the sideline spectators breathless with his flashy ability. He spent most of that game throwing completed passes to his mates. And when he didn't pass, he ran with the ball for many yards at a time. In a sentimental moment, one might say that next week Bill will round out four years of sparkling intramural football play in these parts. But whatever the moment, this observer places McCahan at the top of the list when it comes to naming the best and most consistent players of the past four seasons.

Along other lines—quite a bit of action is on the docket for Duke teams this weekend. While the variety edition is invading the Pitt Panthers' lair, Coach Herschel Caldwell was preparing to parade his freshman eleven before the home fans for the second time this season in this afternoon at Duke stadium. At the same time, Coach Red Lewis was scheduled to send his cross-country outfit on their "first you-chase-me" meet of the year. After a rather hot and heavy race of two or three hours, Coach Gerard and his charges have been working hard the past week, and if the Blue Devils don't get off their course, they might be able to sink the Navy.
