Huffman Captures Mat Title

Weddie Huffman, Duke's undefeated sophomore wrestler, captured the Southern conference 165-pound grappling crown last Saturday at College Park, Maryland, when he gained a decision over Jim Wilson of V.M.I. in the finals of the annual Southern conference tourney.

Huffman won his title as he lay on the mat exhausted. Wilson had Huffman tied up in the regulation period, and they went into an extra period. Huffman managed to outpoint Wilson in the overtime for the decision, but the effort was too much for him and he collapsed on the mat just as the overtime period ended.

The Duke team finished in a tie for 5th place as Washington and Lee took team honors with 22 points. Other scores were as follows: Virginia Military Institute, 29; North Carolina, 27; Maryland, 11; Duke, 7; Davidson, 7; and N. C. State, 4.

Devil Trackmen Are Preparing For Indoor Meet

The Duke trackmen, who will compete in the Maryland Fifth Regiment Indoor games continued workouts this week in the indoor stadium under the direction of Coach "Doc" Chambers.

The squad of five men will leave next Thursday noon to compete in the meet at Baltimore on Friday evening. The five men piled up four first places and two seconds between them in the recent Southern Conference Indoor championship.

Coach Chambers originally planned to enter the Duke squad in the Catholic university indoor meet at Washington the following Monday night, but it has since been learned that the events Duke planned to enter are open only to teams in the Mason-Dixon conference. However, Assistant Coach "Red" Lewis said that Duke might be allowed to participate. The squad will consist of Val, Lockwood, Brown, Profenius, and Wilmut.

Hank Profenius will run in the Governor's mile, the feature attraction of the Baltimore meet. The other outstanding race will be the "Oriente" 660. Ernie Vail, who holds conference titles in the 70-yard dash and the broad jump, and Bud Wilmut, who holds the high jump title, will compete in those events. Windy Lockwood will run in the mile with Profenius.

Carolina has been invited, and it will be represented by 16-man squad. Dave Morrison and Dick Wiley will compete for Carolina in the 660-yard run.

The remainder of the Duke squad has been working out indoors in preparation for the coming outdoor season. Coach Chambers plans to take a squad of twenty men to the Florida relay which will be held at Gainesville, Florida, March 28.

Bowling League Starts Schedule

Marshall, Read Win Swim Titles

Paced by Bill Marshall and Bayard Read who won individual titles, the Blue Devil swimming team aplashed down the V. P. I. pool last Saturday to take second place for the third straight year in the annual Southern conference championship.

North Carolina, which had already won the conference title in dual meets, captured first place in the meet with 62 points, while Duke had 35. Other scores were as follows: N. C. State, 17; V. M. I., 16; W. and L., 14; W. & M., 14; Clemson, 7; and V. P. I., 7.

Marshall Takes 100

Bill Marshall, Duke's star sophomore sprinter, sparked the Blues by winning the 100-yard freestyle, taking third in the 50-yard free style, and anchoring the 400-yard relay team, which took second. In winning the 100-yard event, Marshall defeated P. B. Holtzendorf of Clemson, holder of the conference record in the 50- and 100-yard events, and Whit Leach, U.N.C. ace, in one of the closest races in conference history.

Bayard Read, junior sprinter, captured the individual crown in the 50-yard sprint, beating record-holder Holtzendorf by more than a yard. Bill Brooks, the workhorse of this year's Duke team, came through with thirds in both the 220- and 440-yard free style events, turning in the best times of his career in both events.

New Records Set

Captain Nick Meise, defending champion in the breast stroke, took second in that event this year, losing to Bob Qualey of North Carolina who set a new record of 2:34.1.

The Duke medley relay team of Brooks, Meise and Jenkins came in fifth as Carolina's team of Gilbert, Qualey and Cochran knocked three seconds off the conference record.

Carolina also captured the free style relay in record time as Duke's team of Read, Jenkins and Meise finished in

This highly spectacular exhibit in the small high-voltage laboratory behind Asbury Hall is not the only remarkable exhibit that the electrical engineers will put on next Friday and Saturday, however. Elsewhere in the laboratories, the E. E.'s will demonstrate other tricks of their trade. In the machinery laboratory, strong-armed muscle men will have an opportunity to test themselves against the "muscle-power" generator, which measures electrically the strength of each person tested. The "Magic dial," which last year answered any type of question put by the audience, increases its efforts this year, and will endeavor to measure the size of the human brain through special skull-electrodes. In the communications laboratory, "Campus Night" visitors will get an opportunity to see behind the scenes with the automatic dial telephone, the automatic wireless signal-recorder, and other almost-human machines.
