# Society Plans Annual Tapping

## BOS To Hold Point Assembly In Page Saturday

Incorporating a new point system for the first time, Beta Omega Sigma, honorary sophomore organization, will distribute activity point sheets to freshmen in assembly tomorrow in preparation for the annual tapping ceremonies Saturday, March 27.

All freshmen who possibly have the required twenty-four points should fill out the sheets, which will then be checked by the BOS, Charles Blanchard, president of the organization, yesterday. Those receiving sheets at tomorrow's assembly are to return them to the SGA office opposite the post office on Monday or Tuesday afternoon from 1:30 to 4:30. New sophomores and others requiring sheets can also obtain them from the SGA office at that time.

Major changes in the BOS point system are as follows: freshmen making major varsity letters now get 14 points instead of 12; freshmen making minor varsity letters get 10 points instead of 10 points; maximum points for intramural participation now 8 instead of 6 points; YMCA participation counts a maximum of 3 instead of the former 3 points (total). Those points for OGD air raid wardens' course receive 2 points.

In view of the fact that this year's tapping may be the last for the duration, the twenty-four remaining members of the original thirty members have purchased a one hundred dollar bond to help the post-war BOS get a new start.

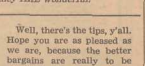

## Student Air Raid Wardens



Shown above are members of the student corps of West campus air raid wardens, 42 in all, who were appointed as official Office of Civilian Defense workers for the university campus. The group, with members of Beta Omega Sigma, local sophomore honorary leadership fraternity, acting as a nucleus for the six weeks course, attended weekly instruction sessions all during the late fall, prior to the last meeting at which assignments were given out and official OGD wardens' emblems were distributed to the group. Sixty-five attended the first session, including BOS members, faculty instructors, campus policemen, deans, aum, and freshman house advisors. The march of draft and reserve

corps calls depleted the group to 42, and the current blackout forced approximately forty on duty. The first semester course included training in aerial precautionary warnings, OGD blackout regulations, gas attack instruction, lectures on types and varieties of bombs, and four weeks of lectures on first aid methods closed the session, and a large group of competent air raid wardens formed the first group to be trained in the university to serve the campus and surrounding territory in aerial emergencies, or in warnings similar to the trial blackout experienced last night.

## Episcopal Bishop Will Speak Here

The Reverend Edwin A. Penick, bishop of the Diocese of North Carolina, will hold a service for the Episcopalians in the Memorial chapel (left wing of the Duke chapel) at 9 o'clock Sunday morning in his annual visit to the Episcopal congregation here.

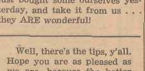
Bishop Penick is a well known figure in North Carolina, for in addition to his Episcopal duties he has served for the last two years as president of the North Carolina Council of Churches.
