We feel that the more direct the application of the theory the more successful will be the results. The funda-mentals of our plan are simple, although we fully expect to be informed of innumerable and "insurrountable" difficulties of execution which opponents of change will throw into our elitorial faces as soon as this page leaves questionnaires by every professor to every member of his classes at the end of each senseter. These question-naires will give every student space to rate all of his professors, in answer to questions on the sheet, on every aspect of teaching and classroom conduct, including lea-ture organization, speaking voice, general interest, per-sonal appearance, amount of time wasted in discussion of impertunel professor. See the subset of subject examinations, etc. The questions must be so worded that personal bias could have only a negligible effect on the answers. These questionnaires would then be turned over to a student committee appointed for the purpose, the results compiled and summarized, and copies sent to the individual professor, the department head, and ad-ministration officials.

The students must be completely honest and critical in their opinions; the professors must study the results and make every effort to improve the points on which they are judged weak; and the administration must recognize student opinion as evidenced in the point as a part basis for promotion, discharge, or transfer. Anything but wholchearted cooperation by all three agencies would, obviously, vitiate the plan.

It is our opinion that no one has a better right than the student—to protest against teaching inefficiency, for it is the student who is making the investment of time and money, and it is the student who is being deprived of a fair return on his investment.


