Gym Turns For Frolic

Woman's college gymnasium will be turned into a typical tobacco social on Friday night, replete with tobacco, corn, and tobacco advertisements. The first of the Plus-cured Frolic gets under way Saturday evening at 8:00 o'clock.

J. Franklin Barfield, self-styled "original singing entertainer," will be featured guest star of the entertainment.

Barfield will bring his colorful quartet to the gym, and the group will go through its typical repertoire which has become so famous to the tobacco social as well as to radio audiences.

A local hill-billy dance band will also present interesting entertainment, with plenty of "swing your partner" music.

Decorations for the dance are being avoided, in large part, by local cigarette manufacturers who will place tobacco around the gym to lend atmosphere to the occasion and plaster the walls of the building with advertisements typical of tobacco firms.

Entrances to the dance will be guarded by a small opening at the base of an initiation barn constructed at the gymnasium door. Chickens and ducks will be wandering around the dance floor, and some old-fashioned carriages will add to the decoration.

All dancers must be attired in rustic garb or old clothes. The men will wear straw hats, and the women, long dresses. The dance, Clarence E. Kefauver, president of the Men's Pan-Hellenic Council, will announce the dance, and several surprise features are promised at the dance, chief among them being the awarding of a door prize, Kefauver said.

Tickets for the 8 to 12 p.m. dance are selling for \$1.25, with a twenty-five-cent war savings stamp being refunded to the ticket holders at the door. Tickets may be purchased from Pan-Hell council members, at the gymnasium, or from the various classes during the remainder of the week, and in the case of the latter, Kefauver said that a sellout is expected and that all those wishing to attend should reserve their tickets early.
