

Engineers Show On April 4 Will Feature New Laboratories

War Developments In Engineering Will Be Shown

Duke's College of Engineering will play host to approximately 3,000 students and townspeople, when it presents its thirteenth annual Engineers' Show on Saturday, April 4.

Almost cancelled by the necessity of full-time work on the part of engineers by the "speed-up" program, the Show will give Duke students their first chance to see the newly-founded department of aeronautics of the College, as well as the new Aeronautics Laboratories.

On display, too, for the first time will be the electrical engineering department's new 300,000 volt generator which pushes a flaming arc across a 20-inch gap in a demonstration of "static-magnetic lifting," technically in research on power-line failures due to lightning flashes on the line.

Open from 2 to 5:30 in the afternoon and 7 to 10:30 at night, the Show will consist of over 30 different exhibits in the four engineering buildings on East campus, Aeronautics, Assembly or Electrical Engineering, and the Civil Engineering Building or Mechanical Engineering.

Dr. Brandon, president of Delta Epsilon Sigma, honorary engineering leadership fraternity which annually sponsors the show, today issued a special invitation to all students to attend the exhibit, and declared that Saturday night would be the "Night of the Night" on campus, with special emphasis being put on exhibits that would be enjoyable to couples attending.

Particular parts of the Show will be the exhibit on the newest developments brought about in the field of engineering since the declaration of war, it was stated. Final plans have not as yet been made, however.

Nursing School Trains Women To Become 'Angels of Mercy'

With United States Armed Forces in Britain, in Australia, in Dutch Guinea—wherever there is a battle to be won in the fight for freedom—go United States Army Nurses.

This growing exodus of trained nurses from the United States is tied to take part with the A. E. F.'s abroad has caused a great shortage of nurses here in America.

Duke's School of Nursing is doing its share in training the women in white who are to take their places in the nursing world. Sixty-five members of the freshman nursing class, who have completed their first year of training at Duke Hospital, last week received their caps, signifying that they have successfully passed their preliminary training and is well on the way in her professional training.

As each student nurse receives her cap, she takes the Florence Nightingale pledge, which is the Hippocratic oath of the nursing profession, promising to live up to the ideals of the nursing profession. The ceremony is held every year since Miss Nightingale, the first "Angel of Mercy" went to the Crimean Peninsula to set up her own nursing organization with her own funds, and saved thousands of British soldiers.

From then on, each student will take her place in learning the actual practice of the nursing profession, as well as taking a series of courses that teach her the theory of the profession. She will work some every day in actual practice.

Finally, after a grueling training period, she will get her full-pledged nurse's status, after she will take her place in her profession.

Duke's student class in nursing is one of the best in the country, although more come from North Carolina than anywhere else. Students come from New Jersey, Florida, Pennsylvania, Ohio, and such far away places as Albuquerque, New Mexico.

Platform of the Blue Party

We, the members of the Blue Party, recognizing the existing weaknesses in the present system of Student Government, hereby pledge ourselves to a platform based on the following proposed amendments to the SGA constitution (petition for the calling of a constitutional convention already in circulation).

Article IV—Section 1, Legislative
The legislative power of the Men's Student Government association shall be invested entirely in a Student Council and a Student Senate functioning as a unicameral organization. The Senate shall be composed of the president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer, and two elected representatives each from the senior and junior classes, and one representative from the sophomore class. The Student Senate shall be composed of the editor of the Chronicle, the president of the YMCA, the president of the Pan-Hellenic Council, the president of the freshman class, and one representative from each dormitory located on the Trinity College campus that has a majority of undergraduate men living in it, excluding those dormitories which have been assigned to the members of the freshman class.

Article VI—Section 5, Elections
The time, place, and method of election for representatives to the Student Senate shall be left to the discretion of the Student Council. The time of the election shall be set on a date not earlier than one week after the regular Student Council elections. This provision made because of the uncertainty of future spring vacations which date regulates the time of elections according to the present constitution.

To lead our party we have nominated a man in whom we have supreme confidence to carry out the above platform—a man, true, tried, and tested, a leader and a reformer, a man who has changed his word and who isn't "changing horses in the middle of the stream" for the sake of personal glory, a man qualified by experience from each dormitory located on the Trinity College campus to lead the Men's Student Government Association—Don Slimester.
