In order to do this he's got to look farther than the end

what kind of stuff they're decorating.

In the first place, a voter has to look at motives. He has
to find out why the parties are running the men they are.
If the candidate is a front for a group of high-class politiclans, a voter ought to see it. If a candidate is out for
personal gain only and announces a shining and impossible platform, it should not be too difficult to detect.

In the second place, a voter has to look at methods. By keeping his eyes and ears open he can tell whether party leaders are sincere in their claims or are using noble gestures to hide ulterior plans.

Finally, a voter has to decide. This year's elections
could lead to the end of combines. Equally easily they
could nourish into healthy existence the greatest and
foulest of all combines. They could inaugurate a new era
of complete democracy on the campus or they could intensify an evil system run by the few for the few.

As far as politics are concerned, this is a crossroads year. The student body will get a chance to choose its own destiny, provided that those who are able to vote let their own minds do the talking.

Board in an effort to provide practical, low-cost entertainment features in keeping with the university wartime
policy. Long hours of work by both the WSAB and representatives of the junior class will have preceded tomorrow's carnival and dance —its success or failure now
depends on student response, that unknown-quantity
which has spelled defeat for so many worthy projects
this year.

Denied their big-name bands, their lavish fraternity dances, and all of the other gala events of past social seasons, students may consider themselves, justified in refusing to accept a "substitute." They may consider Joe College Day poor compensation for what they have been asked to give up. They may balk at donning sport costs instead of talis, of abandoning a sophisticated air for a carefree, fun-seeking spirit, at running three-legged races and catching greased pigs instead of spending their hours over a bucket of cracked ice in a local smoke-filled hangout.

It is precisely this attitude that could ruin what should be the best social function in years.

Joe College Day is in reality a worthy contribution and
a definite addition to campus social life. Students in past
years, caught in the rut of a continuous round of formal
affairs, saw no need for exercising their originality in
planning their weekends, and for that reason their origi-nality was stiffed and buried beneath layers of indifference and an apathetic willingness to maintain the social

All we can say is that if we studen took fails to appreciate this effort and by its indifference tomorrow shows that it is rooted too strongly to the old-time social life to open its eyes to a truly original idea, it certainly has no right to criticize or otherwise condemn any future social program. The least they can do is give it a try.


