Tomorrow's cinder stick, which may turn out to be the biggest drawing card on the list, may give a good indication of the results of next month's Southern conference. Bill Duke and Carolina have dominated the conference track front for the past several years and they will undoubtedly continue their policy this season.

Incidentally, the deciding factor of the track meet may be the performance of Carolina's ace Warren Mengel. From his past record is expected to top three runners in the low 100-meter, broad jump, high and low hurdles. For the first two of these he holds the conference crown. The Blue and White is banking on Mengel to push Mengel for top individual honors.

There is no particular reason why the diamond outing should be eclipsed by the cinder meet. This is the first Big Five contest to be played in the home park this season and the competition is not too weak. The Wake accounted for one of the Devils' three Big Five losses last year by a score of 8 to 1.

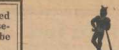

Coach Jack Coombs' Blue Devil basketball team concludes a busy week of diamond activity tomorrow afternoon when the Demon Deacons from Wake Forest invade Coombs park in the inaugural of three scheduled games this spring. Game time is 3:15.

Although Coach Coombs has come through with no announcement as to the starting pitcher, it is probable that Bill McCahan, the Devil's right-handed curveballer, will get the nod in an attempt to win his first straight game this spring.

This week the Coombsmen faced South Carolina's Gamecocks and Davidson's Wildcats. The outcome of both contests showed vast improvement in practically every department, especially the mound work.

Earlier this week the visiting Deacons lost to Carolina, 4 to 1, but the Deacons will have the Coombsmen when tomorrow's diamond tilt starts.

In the match with South Carolina earlier this week the diamond squad trounced the visiting Gamecocks, 13 to 0, in a game that saw Bill McCahan shut out his opponents with six hits and 11 strikeouts for his fourth victory in as many starts.

McCahan was in trouble in the sixth inning only when South Carolina came through with two successive hits with two out, but the ace right-handed finger bowler fanned the next batter.

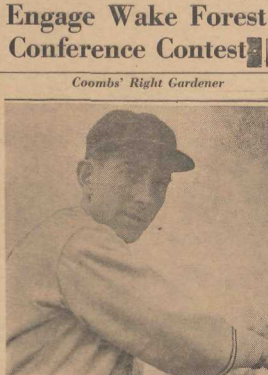

Windy's Cinder Career Began One Afternoon With A Rake

Windy Lockwood, sensational junior miler who has been winning firsts for the Blue Devil cinder artists the past two seasons with pleasing regularity, owes his entrance into the track world to a plain, ordinary garden rake. As Wendell N. tells it, his whole shining career as a cinder paths dater back to his sophomore year in high school and a new coach who was out to whip the local track into shape.

Windy lives in Plainville, Connecticut, where an ex-Duke man, Jim Bernardo, coaches track. Jim was new on the job and he decided not only to reorganize the squad but also to find the local oval of some of its needs and cinders. In order to accomplish his ends, Bernardo tried unassuming students down after class to handle a rake.

Windy was invited to one of these sessions one spring afternoon, and being an obliging sort of person, showed up, rake in hand. Much to Windy's surprise, his invitation was not to help with the clean-up operations, but to run the mile with the Plainville tracksters.

Right then and there, his name was changed from Windy to Lockwood.

to Windy for even though he was putting a lot on it was definitely the "cream of the crop." This something new that was added to the Plainville forces went on to win the state high school championship in the mile in his junior year and to set a record in his senior year that still stands for Connecticut prep school runners to shoot at. In addition, he sports a trophy awarded annually to most valuable man on the track team.

From Plainville and Bernardo's coaching, Windy came to Duke in '39 to pace the freshmen cross-country team to its first undefeated season. Since then Windy has blazed a sensational trail into Duke track history. Not only has he found time to set a new Southern conference record in the four-mile cross-country run at the University of Maryland last fall in the championships and to set a record at last year's Carolina A. U. meet in Chapel Hill in the mile run that still stands, but he has also made Dean's list twice, as well as being elected a member of Tombs and B.O.S.

Blue Imp Nine Wins Tight Tilt Cuts Take Advantage Of Errors to Win

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Saturday Meet To Be Only Home Show for Dukes

The Carolina dual meet is annually one of the classic events in the North State's track program and the Duke team's participation will be especially keen, for the Tar Heels are out to avenge for the 7:15 5/16 setback handed them by the Blue Devils last spring.

The two squads have met twice on the cinders earlier this year—once in the conference indoor meet in February when the Chapel Hill boys ran off with top honors in their own gymnasium, and later in the Carolina relays two weeks ago when no team scores were kept.

In addition to the relays at Chapel Hill, the Tar Heels have also met a strong Virginia squad, with their superiority in the distance and hurdle events they had no trouble in defeating.

The Blue Devils have a tremendous amount of power in many divisions, but they lack a well-balanced team with the quantity of men to bring home the distance and fourth places to be ranked as odds-on favorites.

Moff Storer, the conference 100 and 220 yard dash champ who was slowed down by an injury earlier in the season, along with big Steve Leach, who holds the conference shot put distance mark and will also be throwing the discus and javelin tomorrow, and Werner Brown, holder of the 440 conference record, will all be out tomorrow to make their only home stand of the year before the local track fans.

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
