Plans are Practically Completed For Seventy-Second Commencement Which Will Open on First of June

DR. EDWIN MIMS WILL DELIVER THE BACCALAUREATE ADDRESS

MANY ALUMNI ARE EXPECTED

Interesting Program Planned by the Alumni Secretary—Omn to be Dedicated

Final arrangements for the seventy-second annual commencement are now being made. With one exception all speakers for the occasion have been secured. It is not yet definitely known as to who will deliver the commencement address. Several of the most prominent men in the country are possibilities, but as yet it has not been definitely settled as to the principal speaker. The program of the entire week in all probability will be the exercises on Alumni Day.

The commencement exercises will open on Sunday night, May 12, at 8 P. M., when the baccalaureate address will be delivered in Craven Memorial Hall by Dr. Edwin Mims of Vanderbilt University, Nashville, Tenn. Dr. Mims was formerly connected with Trinity and is now the head of the Department of English at Vanderbilt. He is one of the foremost men in the field of education in the South.

The morning and afternoon of Monday, June 2, will be taken up with a meeting of the Alumni Council at 10:30 and the annual meeting of the Board of Trustees of the College at 3 P. M. In the evening at 8:30 o'clock in Craven Memorial the graduating orations will be heard. The four members of the senior class qualifying will compete for the Wiley Gray Medal. At this time the other medals and prizes offered by the institution and various other organizations of the College will be presented to the winners. At 9:45 the annual reception in honor of the graduating class will be held.

Baccalaureate Sermon
The Baccalaureate Sermon will be delivered at 11 A. M. on Tuesday, June 3, by Willard LeRoy Sperry, D. D., of Cambridge, Mass. Dr. Sperry heads the School of Divinity of Harvard University, and is one of the leading divines of the nation.

The remainder of this day will be given over to the alumni. In many respects this part of commencement will be the feature of the entire program. According to reports now coming into the Alumni Office the campus will be swarmed with returning alumni. Alumni Secretary Thibgen reports that there will be more alumni back for commencement this year than ever before. At 12 o'clock there will be staged the alumni parade, in which all classes holding reunions will march in costume through the campus to the gymnasium. The parade will be held at the Alumni and Alumnae dining hall at 4 P. M. reunion class exercises will be held at the woodland stage, when the several classes will stage stunts and such for the entertainment of all. The formal opening of the Memorial Gymnasium will take place at 8 P. M. The address of the evening will be given by Dr. Plato Tracy.

SEVEN MEN ARE TAPPED

Ritualistic Ceremony Takes Place Saturday Night and Banquet will be Held at Mauborne Hotel

In a service marked with impressive words and dignified seven members of the Rising senior class were tapped by a hooded figure clothed in a red robe yesterday morning in Craven Memorial Hall at the annual Tap Day ceremony of the Red Friars, honorary senior class organization of the College.

After the opening ceremony of the regular chapel exercises had been performed, the remainder of the time was turned over to the Red Friar order. The seven members of the organization walked solemnly on the rostrum, where several chairs draped in the Red Friars' colors had been prepared, and seated themselves. They were in their coats deep red topped with white.

Henry C. Sprinkle assisted dean and graduate student and a former member of Red Friars, then came forward and in a few well chosen words explained the ceremony of the Red Friars and the significance of the honor they were about to bestow upon seven members of the junior class. He explained that these seven men were chosen on the basis of merit alone, irrespective of social or political associations, and that they were the seven leading members of the Rising senior class according to the Red Friars' choice.

After he had retired from the rostrum, hooded figures entered the front of the hall and stood solemnly to the east side of Craven Memorial Hall, where the juniors had been asked to seat themselves in alternate rows. BLUE DEVILS NEAR END OF SUCCESSFUL SEASON WITH ENVIABLE RECORD

TRINITY NINE HAS WON FIFTEEN AND LOST THREE OF HER GAMES

TRINITY-CAROLINA FAY TODAY

Baptists Tie With Lenoir for Third Place in State Honor, While Carolina Takes Fifth Hole

Excluding the game with Carolina this afternoon, Trinity ranks second in the championship race. N. C. State leads the list with 10 games won and only 1 game lost, while the Blue Devils has a record of 7 won and 3 lost. Wake Forest and Lenoir stand tied for third place, while Carolina comes fifth with a total of 3 games won and 5 lost. The number of games won and lost together with the percentage of the teams, excluding today's game with Carolina, is as follows:

With two more games (the Carolina game and the last game with Wake Forest) the total of the games of the twelve Blue Devils stands at 15, with 14 being registered up as victories and four as defeats. This gives the Trinity team this far in the season a percentage of .777. Only three of the defeats have come from college teams, namely, Lenoir, Carolina, and State, while the other defeat was received at the hands of the Davidson Bulldogs; hence the percentage for the season, not counting the Carolina game of this afternoon would be .825.

The season began with a rash. The Christians from Elon opened the work and lost by a score of 13 to 0. Then Guilford came on the scene, and the Blue Devils was defeated 8 to 1. The first big game came with Wake Forest at Rocky Mount, and the Blue Devils took the first of the three-game series with the Baptists 3 to 1. Coach Jones then carried his hard hitters to the Gate City and Davidson entered the arena only to lose the game 5 to 0.

The first defeat of the season came when Lenoir came on the scene, winning this part of the State. The Lenoirans were extremely lucky, and Trinity fell by a score of 2 to 1, in one of the best games of the year. N. C. State visited the Trinity Park next, and as usual Allen was driven to the showers early in the game, and Trinity got the end of the game in a score. The second game of the series with the Baptists came next on the schedule at Wake Forest. Mighty Borrell being knocked out and the game closed for the Methodist 5 to 3. UNSUCCESSFUL SEASON

FRESHMEN WIN ONLY FOUR GAMES OF TEN PLAYED DURING SEASON

PROMISING VARSITY MATERIAL

Defeat East Durham, But Lose to Monroe and M. P. C. I. During the Past Week

In comparing the number of wins and losses this season the little Blue Devils do not appear to have been very antagonistic, but when one considers the relative strength of their opponents, the aspect is somewhat changed. Out of ten games played thus far, they have tied in only four wins, these being over the Raleigh Methodist Orphanage, Greensboro High, State College Freshmen, and East Durham High. They have lost to all the college freshmen teams in the state; namely, Carolina, State, Davidson, and Wake Forest; and to Mount Pleasant Collegiate Institute and Monroe High School. The freshmen have played a weak brand of ball all the season, showing perhaps better form in their failing than in their hitting. There is, however, some promising material for the varsity next year, and the experience that they have gained this year will do much to alleviate the work of breaking them in next spring.

The only win of the past week was that against East Durham High on last Wednesday. The first year men showed their best form of the season, getting nine hits in seven innings.

On Thursday morning the yearlings left for a three day trip in the central part of the state. The game with Thomsville was raised out, and on Friday the strong M. P. C. I. team, which last held the Lenoir College Varsity to a two run lead, defeated the freshmen by three runs. Green elected a homer over right field fence, while Walter M. P. C. I. worked on Tart for double that number; otherwise Tart pitched a good game striking out eleven men.

In the last game on the trip the Monroe High romped on the freshmen for a win by a 15 to 7 score. The game was featured by three home runs, Duttie, Fairley, M. and Young, getting one each. The Monroe boys played a nice brand of ball, but Trinity fished poorly. Gobel, who relieved Thomas in the fifth, worked out the other four innings in good shape.
