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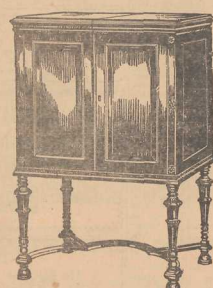

Davidson May Win, Dope Says, But Satans Are Just Now Fresh From Old Missouri

BLUE DEVILS OUTCLASS WOFFORD IN ALL DEPARTMENTS—MUD SLOWS PROGRESS

Passes Feature the Game With 52 Being Attempted By Both Sides

Duke Gets 17 First Downs

Wofford Is Able to Make the Distance Only Three Times While Duke Backs Tear Through Almost at Will—Weaver Makes Good Field General.

The Blue Devils singed their way through oceans of mud and Wofford Terriers to victory last Friday, 14-0. The Terriers' back proved to be far more fierce than their line, and seldom did their teeth find a crack in the Blue Devils. The main feature of the game was the 32 attemped forward passes, 20 by Wofford and 12 by Duke. Duke completed 5 of their 16, while Wofford completed 7 of their 23. Hanes Field was covered with mud and occasional lakes, causing the game to take on a submarine aspect. Duke hit its stride early in the battle and continued a steady march, with frequent interruptions, throughout the affair, scoring 17 first downs to the Terriers' 3, and proving themselves better in every department of the sport. Duke's "featherweight" backfield snaked its way through the mud at will, driving everything before them.

Duke did not score in the first quarter, however, but the second quarter marked the beginning of the fireworks. Frank hurled the ball to Weyger 35 yards for a touchdown, and a few minutes later Weyrick placed the now very rusty swiftness over the last white line again. Weaver scored still again in the opening of the third quarter, having carried the ball down the field with the able assistance of Frank and Weyrick, and in the same quarter Weaver again crossed Wofford's danger line after a series of fine and off-laid plays. Frank scored the last touchdown, after a pretty 25 yard run, by plunging 5 yards through the middle of the line. Kelly kicked 4 chances for a point after touchdowns out of 5 and got some pretty kickoffs during the game.

Duke Varsity Harriers Win 29-30
While Fresh Lose 28-31
To State College

The Duke University Harriers won from the State college cross country run in a most hard-fought Saturday by a score of 29 to 30. Woodward of Duke took the lead by over a hundred yards to finish in the last time of 28:18 for the stiff 4.5 mile course. Nimro, of State, led Chandler of Duke by 40 seconds for last.

In the freshman meet between the runners of the same institution, the State cross-country team won by a close score of 28 to 29, although Duke took the first two places. Perkins of Duke took the lead at the start and held it to the finish, coming in 1:50 yards ahead of Winchester, also of Duke, who was second. The time in the 13 mile course was 1:05.

They presented a strong threat in a spread passing combination but the slick field prevented them from getting quickly enough to receive the accurate passes and they were left stranded. The Blue Devils on the other hand depended mostly upon straight football and crashed through the Wofford line consistently. They also used passes to good advantage.

The Freshmen put up a good fight against the first-year team from State. They had the ability to plough through the State line consistently, but it was the same old story that the varsity had to tell. State had a star back who was able to run through a broken field or the line for that matter, for touch-downs on occasions, and State was always ready to convert a Duke fumble into a State touchdown.

The Cross-Country and Relay teams came out of the fracas in good style. The Relay team was handled from Carolina, who had defeated them last week, and the Cross-Country team split with State. Although the Freshmen took both first and second places, they could not yet enough men in early in the game to win the contest. The Varsity however, managed to win by a slight margin. Woodward, as seems to be his custom this year, again taking first place by a large lead.

Wrestling season opens Monday and Coach Tipton wants all candidates to report to him. There will be a good chance in several of the weights for new men. A few of last years players will not be in fight this year and their places have to be filled. There is a wealth of material to pick from and the Duke wrestling team of this year should compare favorably with the splendid teams of former years.

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BLUE DEVILS TO PLAY NAVY 1927

Big Schedule Is In Preparation For Next Year With Four Big State Games.

The rumor of Duke's game with the Navy line of last term confirmed and it is assured the Blue Devils will meet the Navy in Annapolis next October 22. This is by far the strongest team that Duke has ever scheduled, and few North Carolina teams have been able to receive such recognition. Also, to schedule the big big state games in a year will be made so that all the trips will come at the first of the season. Most likely all the big out-of-state games will be played away from Duke, as this is the first year that such a schedule has ever been attempted. No doubt a rougher Duke schedule will cause a stir in the sporting circles in this state, such as the return of a big schedule for Carolina did a few weeks ago.

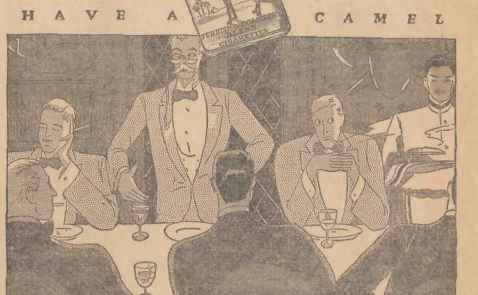
