Duke led all the way through the game, and not once did South Carolina come within striking distance of tying the score.

George Rogers, sophomore this year, played a stellar game at forward. He missed quite a few crisp shots during the game, but he made enough to make up for this deficiency by scoring 22 points. Not only did he shoot well, but he guarded well and played a nice all-around game. Captain Cole Chandler got loose in the first quarter to score 12 points and thus boosted the Devils to a commanding lead. Werber played a fine floor game, seeming to be in several different places at once and following the ball like a hawk. "Chucky" Connelley only got in for a short while, but he showed flashes of last year's brilliance.

White, Gamecock center, showed up better than he did any of the other South Carolina men. He led his team in scoring with 6 points and played a good floor game as well. In addition, Werber for South Carolina also played a nice game. The South Carolina team was weak in throwing for extra points after a field, making good only 3 points while Duke made 10.

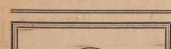

The game was somewhat slow at starting, both teams seemed to be bawling about scoring first, however, it didn't take long for Rogers, Duke forward, to take a free throw, closely followed by Dornin's finger for Wake Forest. From then on through the whole first half of the game the two teams had a tooth and tongue fight to stay in the lead, the period ending with a 17-17 all score.

Within the first minute of play in the second half both Werber and Chandler made a field goal, that had was one of the best of the season. The game was quickly relinquished through the remainder of the game. Dukes defense in the second half was good but the offense was mighty near perfect. Jackowski and Werber played a game that baffled all Wake Forest efforts to stop them. Werber managed to get in four field goals while at the same time making a good job of guarding Dornin. Rogers made a total of 12 points while Parley and Connelley were playing a neat game of ball. Thorne made a good pivot man for Wake Forest. Dornin, Weir and Scarborough were the boys who pushed the Deacons so hard throughout the first half and gave them no peace at any later time.

Needless to say the big five basketball championship this year is going to be a new well worth watching and with the clear state that Duke's win over Wake Forest gives to the Blue Devils, we feel that Duke's chances of winning out are greatly increased.

State Has Strong Team Ready for Blue Devils; Both Have Wins Over South Carolina

TEAMS EVENLY MATCHED

Result of this Game Will Have Important Bearing on Standing of Each Team in Southern Conference

When the Wolf Pack from State and the Blue Devils from Duke meet this Saturday night over in Raleigh, a real "battle of the century" should result. The Wolf Pack has been going like a house afire all season, and the Blue Devils seem to have struck their stride in the last two games.

All the evidence in the case seems to point to the fact that the Dukesters have completely gotten over the pre-season slump which hindered them so much up north. In the game with Wake Forest, they played excellently the first half, but when they opened up in the last half, there was no stopping them. For the whole game with South Carolina, the Devils worked at tip speed, and had little or no difficulty in defeating the team that had beaten the proud Carolina Tar Heels only the night before.

This South Carolina game, by the way, broke out another star for Duke, George Rogers. The Duke offensive led the balls to Rogers who took the passes well and usually dropped the ball in for a goal. He scored 22 points during the game with the Gamecocks. Werber and Connelley showed some of their last year's flashy team work in this game, and such team work as these boys use will be hard for State to stop.

State has perhaps the best guard to be put out by Gus Tobei in recent years. They had little or no trouble with Wake Forest, and literally overhauled South Carolina 45-15. Captain Hank Young and Lawrence "Chalk" Hart are forwards have proven to be one of the high power scoring machines of the state. Hart, star of last year's Wolf Pack, is a

The Tech meet will probably be the hardest on the schedule for the Devilfish, and this is saying a lot, when one considers the strong teams which Duke will meet in addition to Georgia Tech. Washington and Lee, University of Virginia and Catholic University all have quite capable swimmers, and it is with these schools that Duke will swim.

The Tech swim will bring one of the strongest aggregations of swimmers ever to be won in North Carolina. Last year in the Ga. Tech-Duke meet in Atlanta, the Techmen showed some class, and they were practically the same team this year that they had last. Fred Eberhardt, southern intercollegiate breast stroke champion, only the Tech breast stroke man by a few yards last year, and this same man will be up with the Georgia boys this year. Last year Tech also had a crack team man, and he also will be with the team this year. In the dashes, however, Tech is not so strong, while Duke is extra strong, being represented in that department by "Puh" Eberhardt and Hans Hansen. Tech's divers have a record all over the south as being experts, but Lander Gough, Duke ace swimmer, will no doubt give them a hard run for first place. Casdill also has two good divers fighting for second places in Stearns and Suller.

The team will enter its first period of intense training on February 14, when the final cut will be made and the individuals put back on the freshman squad.

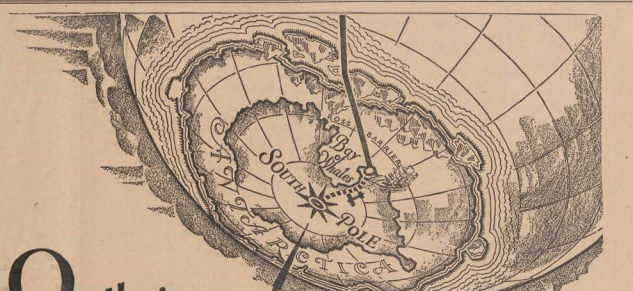
In defeating State, the Devils got off to a good start in their fight for the Southern Conference title this year.

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TELEPHONES ARE BEING INSTALLED ON CAMPUS

Self-Help Students Will Aid in Operation of Telephone System Now Being Completed

The telephone system on the campus has recently undergone a decided change for the better. A number of telephones have been installed at various places on the campus, and the system is now in the process of completion, according to statement by W. A. Tyson, head of the building department of the University. The system is now operated directly through the city exchange. Pay telephones, if not already installed will be within a few days, being located at South gate Hall, East Duke building, and each of the five new dormitories. These are the telephones that are to be used by students exclusively, both for long distance and local calls, except in the case of urgent calls.

However, for the purpose of urgent calls and urgent ones only, such as sick ones or the like, a telephone is in operation in dormitory number one after 5:30 o'clock in the afternoon until 11:00 at night. The whole system after 5:30 o'clock in the afternoon and on Sunday, is operated by self-help students. There are a number of additions yet to be made which will aid to the improvement and convenience of the system which is now being completed.

HOLTEN ADVISES NOT TO CRAM FOR EXAMS

Education Professor Tells Freshmen Not to Attempt to Pass by Cramming

At the regular weekly meeting of the freshmen class on Saturday morning, Dr. Holten Hoffman spoke to the freshmen concerning their fast approaching exams and how to prepare for them. Dr. Holten advised the freshmen to face their exams as a part of a regular day's work and not to get too much excited over them. He insisted that reviewing be begun at once and done continuously. One point which Dr. Holten emphasized very much was to the effect that one should try to get credit for a course, not to get credit for a course. "You are here to get definite information," Dr. Holten said, "the student who passes a course he does not know on a broken shell."
