Powers of Duke University, also spoke, and Mr. W. Newsome of Durham read a poem of his own composition written about Mr. Duke and his life and work. Mr. Duke was one of the founders and officials of the Duke University.

The service that will be held tomorrow will call to mind the service that was held in memory of Duke's older brother, James Buchanan Duke. Mr. J. B. Duke died in October, 1925, and when tribute was officially paid to his memory members after that former August Duke, W. "Chalky" Connelley only got in for a short while, but he showed flashes of his last year's brilliance.

While Gamecock center, showed up better than did any of the other South Carolina men. He led his team in scoring with 6 points and played a good floor game in addition. **TELEPHONES ARE BEING INSTALLED ON CAMPUS**  
Self-Help Students Will Aid in Operation of Telephone System Now Being Completed

The telephone system on the campus has recently undergone a decided change for the better. A number of telephones have been installed at various places on the campus, and the system is now in the process of completion, according to statement by W. A. These are the telephones that are to be used by students exclusively, both for long distance and local calls, except in the case of urgent calls.

The whole system after 5:00 o'clock in the afternoon and on Sunday, is operated by self-help students. There are a number of additions yet to be made which will aid the improvement and convenience of the system which is now being completed.

At the regular weekly meeting of the freshman class on Saturday morning, Dr. Hollman Holtan spoke to the freshmen concerning their first approaching exams and how to prepare for them. Dr. Holtan advised the freshmen to face their exams as a part of a regular day's work and not to get too much excited over them. He insisted that reviewing be begun at once and done systematically.

One point which Dr. Holtan emphasized very much was to the effect that no one should try to get credit for a course they didn't know. "You are here to get definite information," Dr. Holtan said. "The student who passes a course he doesn't know on a broken shell," he told the freshmen that they should persuade themselves to take the course over which they know they don't know instead of "cramming" in enough bare information at the last minute to barely pass the course.
