TAR HEELS CLINCH STATE QUINT TITLE IN HECTIC CONTEST

Carolina Wins Over Duke Basket-
ball by 27-24 Score at Tin Can
Last Saturday Night

The Duke basketball team lost the state championship to the Tar Heel quint last Saturday night by the score of 27 to 24. The Duke men staged a rally toward the end of the game which brought the score up within a point of a tie. But Duke broke their pace in the last minute of play and provided the margin of victory for the Tar Heels. Both teams put up a great fight and played the 2,000 spectators who came through the main gate and crowded the end of the Tin Can to witness the contest.

The game started off with plenty of fast work each team trying to set the pace. The teams traded points at the beginning of the halves but the Tar Heels' better play for the first half and stepped ahead in the scoring. The Blue Devils could not locate the basket and missed the first shot. The Carolina sharpshooters could hardly lose and gained a 14 to 4 lead at the intermission. Hackney and Satterfield doing the most outstanding work.

Duke set the pace during the second half and threatened to take the game out of Carolina's hands. Coach Cameron's men began to get back and exhibited a brand of close guard-shooting. Councillor led the way with eight points during the second half and the team followed him in fine style. Werber also stepped out and ran his total up to eight points. Rodgers, Parley, and Cresson figured in the show but the latter was off a bit in his shooting.

The Duke quint showed a fine type of basketball but could not strike the stride until the latter part of the game. Two more games with Davidson and Virginia respectively, remains on the Blue Devils schedule before the Southern Conference tournament which will be held in Atlanta beginning the first of March.

Buchheit Sends Runners To Virginia Indoor Meet

Duke Stars Won First Honors Last Season; Will Have Exceedingly Hard Struggle This Year as More Than Twenty Schools Have Entered; Woodward, Atsworth in Good Shape

Coach Buchheit announced today that the Duke track team would be represented at the Fifth Annual Indoor Meet to be held at the University of Virginia Saturday night. This will mark the second consecutive year that Duke has been designated in these games. It might be added that the Duke boys copied the lead in the 100-yard dash and set a new indoor record in the mile. He has been back recently but when feeling good should have little trouble in stopping a 4:30 mile (indoor).

Atsworth, the boy who won All-South honors, should easily take the two mile and a half. "This boy has a wonderful record and a pair of legs that can stand a killing pace. It will take a mile or two to stand his speed and an El Quind to stand his wind and stamina. Freeman is without a doubt the outstanding track man that has crossed the Duke track ever in many a month. He needs only a bit in the mile to win a double runner. He is a fast sprinter, wonderful high jumper, good hurdler, and a steady quartermiler. He has possibilities of being high scorer in this meet in spite of the stiff competition.

STATE COLLEGE STUDENTS WOULD BOYCOTT LAUNDRY

Charging that the manager of the college laundry has been over-loading his ward several of his patrons, 750 State college students gathered yesterday to petition the College administration for change in the management of the laundry. The students moved to send their laundry off the campus.

The break between the students and the college laundry, of which J. C. Collins is manager, came when the latter succeeded Paul Chapin, president of the Junior class, with a short-term inflicting a painful scalp wound. More than a dozen other students asserted that they had had trouble with Collins.

Nearly 700 students packed Pullen hall for the meeting following the announcement at the dining hall that the meeting would be held. The hall was not less than 700 persons, so that more than 1,000 other students stayed away from the session because they could not find seats or believed enough students would attend.

A. B. Holden, of Wilmington, vice-president of the students and campus leader, presided. Without discussion, from the chairman, the body went on record to suggest that "something be done as soon as possible about the management of the laundry."

After telling the students that he knew of at least three or four instances within the past four years of students having trouble with Collins, Holden called on students who had had trouble with Collins, either fights or exchanges of profanity, to stand.

"All who have made the administration to get a new manager of the laundry, somebody you know and who can help, somebody like Mr. Chick Dask, will please stand," the chairman said, the result being that the entire number of students present arose.
