Brewer of Duke Fresh Text  
with 14 Points

Chapel Hill, N. C., May 7.—Yesterday afternoon on Hanes Field at Chapel Hill, the Carolina Tar Babies won their Duke Preacher freshmen defeat by a score of 30-46. The Tar Babies were pushed by the Imps in all events, however, and the meet was closer than the score would admit.

Carolina presented one of the flashiest track men of the season in Simon's former prep star, who left the field in the lapdancer. Former, Wilmington field, said by experts to be the fastest man in the south, had a bad ankle and was entered by Carolina in only one event. He took the 200 to 22½. Ed Brewer was the best for the Imps, taking two first, a second and a third.

Ed, of Carolina, was the highest individual scorer, counting for 16 of his team points. Brewer was next with 14 points, while Simon of Carolina ran third with 11 points.

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Devils Lose As Carolina  
Wins The State MeetDuke Tracksters Show Up Well, But Tar Heel's Superiority in Dashes  
Too Much; Records Fall During Meet Last Week End; Simon,  
Woodward and Roberts Place First for Duke; Simon  
Equals State Record in Two Mile

Running true to form, Coach Bushnell's distance trackster brought home the home in their division of the North Carolina Conference track meet held in the Memorial Stadium at Greensboro last Friday and Saturday, losing third place in the meet to State College only by a two tenths of a point margin. Carolina won the meet with a total of 65.8 points, with Davidson second and Wake Forest last.

State records in the 850 yard run, javelin throw, broad jump, and discus throw were broken during the meet. The 880 run was trotted by Mullins, of State, in 1:28.3-5, besting the former record of "Matt" Evans, of Carolina, which was 1:29.4-5. Dupree, of Wake Forest, tossed the javelin 165 feet, 3 inches, breaking Prebaker's record of 161 feet 11 inches set in 1926. "Pug" Harper, of Carolina, threw the discus 136 feet 3 inches, beating his own record of 133 feet 7 inches. Kinney, of Wake Forest, jumped 22 feet 1½ inch, thus setting a new record for the broad jump.

In the one mile run, Woodward, of Duke, led the field around the track, coming in first with the time of 4:32. The Duke Devils showed up again in the two mile run, capturing the first two places here, Simon coming in first, and Dancy second. Simon's time was 9:37 which equaled the state record. Woodward showed more points for Duke by taking third place in the 880 yard run. Bennett, Duke weight man, was second in shot putt and third in the discus throw.

Turner tied Jones, of Wake Forest, and Dry, of Carolina, for fourth place in the pole vault. The Blue Devil relay team took third place in the one mile relay.
