For their first home meet the Blue Devils track team faces the N. C. Pre-Flight squad tomorrow afternoon at 3 o'clock in Duke Stadium. Pre-Flight, who do-fested Duke by 16 points three weeks ago, will be attempting to make a clean sweep of its dual meets with the Blue Devils. The field events will begin at 3, and the first running event will start a half an hour later.

So far this season Pre-Flight has taken victories from Duke and Virginia, while losing only to Georgia Pre-Flight. A new battalion of aviation cadets have now entered training at Chapel Hill, and it is probable that several of these men have been picked to reinforce the team.

Last week the Blue Devils cinder men absorbed a 104 to 22 trouncing at the hands of the Naval Academy tracksters, who are aiming this season for their own straight national inter-collegiate championship. Navy has been described as one of the best belated track teams ever put on the field by a college, for they have at least three good men in each event. Jim LaBue and Frank Irwin secured Duke's only two first places in the 220 and 440 yards, respectively. Warren Nordin and Jim Dibble, along with LaBue, were placed in other events to support the remainder of Duke's points.

While at Duke, under the guidance of Lt. (jg) Ray Nasher former Duke ace, will bring to Duke a record of 10 wins and one loss. They tied Camp Lejeune 4-4, and dropped a hard fought battle to the undefeated Georgia Tech team 7-3. Coach Nasher will play the No. 1 position, and will be followed by Lt. John Daughlin, Pfc. The 4-5, and 6 spots will be filled by three of the following: Ted Green, Baxter Napier, Bill Rains, and Suz Wapner, Napier and Tichester are the No. 1 doubles team and Norris and Kelly the No. 2.

## Professor Maggs Continues Career As Solicitor In Labor Department

Moving steadily upward through a labyrinth of government offices, Professor Douglas Maggs of the Duke University law school is completing his career with the wartime government as Solicitor of the Department of Labor.

Scheduled to return to the campus next fall, Maggs has served as the immediate subordinate to Secretary Perkins in the Labor Department since June, 1943. In this capacity he directs a force of approximately 100 lawyers, who handle all the legal cases in which the department becomes involved.

Before entering the labor department Maggs served as legal consultant for the Office of Emergency Management, a wartime agency affiliated with the Department of Justice. He saw action here when on behalf of the United States Government he argued a case before the Supreme Court. Since Maggs' special field is constitutional and administrative law he concerned himself mainly with drafting executive orders of the President, preparing opinions for the attorney general, and rendering advice on questions of constitutional law.

He first journeyed to Washington in 1942 when he became special consultant to the general counsel of the board of Economic Warfare.

Maggs' educational and teaching experiences carried him from Massachusetts to California. His professional training began at the University of California and was polished off at Harvard with a law degree, after

which he taught classes at the University of California, Stanford, Columbia, University of Chicago, and Cornell. When he came to Duke in 1940 he was the youngest professor in the newly expanded law school.

During the era of the late thirties when many of the New Deal measures were being tried in the courts Maggs as head of the wage and hour division of the Department of Justice helped prosecute firms violating the wage and hour law. He also represented the government in an anti-trust case against the American Medical Association.

Maggs is a member of the State Bar of California, and of the Bar of the Supreme Court of the United States. He has contributed many articles to legal periodicals and written several books on his specialty, constitutional law.
