VIRGINIA TO BE MET TONIGHT IN SEASON OPENER

Devils Expect to Make Good Record in Conference this Season; Look Great in Practice

IS FIRST COLLEGE GAME

Cavaliers Have Good Team This Year and Expect to Make Things Tough for Dilesters

Coach Cameron and his basketballers left this morning for Charlottesville, Va., where they will meet the Southern night of Virginia today. On Thursday night the Blue Devils will meet Maryland, while on Friday night the Navy Midshipmen will meet at Annapolis. The names of all of the non-making the trip are not available, but the following is an approximate list: Captain Parley, Werber, Conziller, Rogers, Cronin, Shaw, Garber, Carter, and Warwick.

These games will mark Duke's first appearance against college opponents, and the navy Blue Devil supporters are anxiously awaiting the outcome of these games so that a good line can be secured as to the team's prospects. Both Virginia and Maryland boast of their strongest teams in years, while Navy always puts out an outstanding team.

Duke was unusually successful in the games with nearly "Y" teams before the Christmas holidays. Raleigh "Y" conqueror of the Carolina team, was downed overwhelmingly, while Greensboro was scored under to the tune of 103 to 20. Of course neither of these teams offered any real opposition, but the results are enough to make the prospects for a good season very bright.

The Blue Devils will offer to northern spectators one of the fastest stepping teams in the Southern conference, if not (Continued on Page 6)

Duke is expected to place two or three men on the All-Southern squad this year. Bill Werber was given a place on this mythical aggregation last year and the Blue Devil fans are predicting that Joe Cronin, hasty center, and possibly some other member will share the honors this season.

Four Meets Scheduled for Season; Team Will Meet Hard Competition

MANY PUGSTERS ARE OUT

Carolina Meet Will Be First; Devils Will Try to Wipe Out Last Year's Defeat at Hands of Tar Heels

Hazing prospects this year are the best in years for the Duke boxing team, and if things go along right the Blue Devils will go through the season in a very good manner.

There are a number of men from the last years back and with the addition of several new ones the squad will be full. There are also four letter men back including Capt. A. Amund, Martin, southern conference champion, Warren, and Carpenter. Among the other men from last year who are back are: Edwards, and Holmquist. A complete list of all candidates out for the team is as follows: 115 pound class, Edwards and Riddick; 125 pound class, Capt. Amund and Martin; 135 pound class, Starnes and Phillips; 145 pound class, Warren, Matheson, Fuller and Wintz; 160 pound class, Carper; 175 pound and unlimited men will be picked from the following: Hattewell, Balch, and Hyatt.

Carper is the only man on the team who seems to have no opposition for his berth, but all the rest are going to be fighting hard to see who will be the better boxer. Because of a broken thumb St. Amund will be replaced by Martin in the first fight, but after the opener it is expected that the latter will try to train down to the 115 pound class. The greatest competition seems to be in the 145 pound class with four men out for the position.

The men in the unlimited and the 175 pound class will have a double chance. The best man will get the 175 pound position and the second best will get the unlimited berth.

The boxing schedule for the year contains four meets, three of which are away and one here. Carolina is the first team on the schedule and the next is in the 4th of next month. V. F. I. comes next and it is also away on the 22nd of February. The following meet is with Virginia and is the only home meet.

Fishmen Meet Washington and Lee Here on the 18th of January

BAUGHMAN IS THE CAPTAIN

Eight Veterans, Three of Them Lettermen, Make Up this Year's Team; To Enter Conference Tournament

With the first meet of the year only a little over a week off, the Blue Devil Fishmen are hard at work getting in shape to take the measure of the Washington and Lee Generals here on January 18th. Suffering greatly from the loss of Fred and Phil Barnhart, southern champions of last year's tank team, the exact worth of this year's team is not yet known. The times made by the men in the first trial meets of the year, however, indicate that the team will be much stronger than the one of last year.

With eight veterans of last year, three of them lettermen, things look good for a close match with the Generals. Washington and Lee won from Duke last year in the meet up there, and the Devilfish will be out for revenge. Duke will probably be strongest in the dashes this year. "Zip" Brawley, letter man of last year, "Ham" Hannah, another letter man, Sam Smith, freshman dash of last year, Jimmy Smithers, and others go to make up the strongest bunch of dash men ever at Duke. Smith, in trials against this year, has been swimming within 8.5 of a second of the

CAPTAIN STARNES NEVER DEFEATED

1930 Duke grapplers, led by Captain of the 1930 Duke grapplers, has one of the most available athletic records ever turned out by any Duke athlete. In two years' varsity competition and one year freshman competition, he has won every meet he entered and was most of them by a fall.

In his freshman year, Starnes easily won all-state maling after disposing of all competition in the 135 pound class in freshmen, circles that year. After the season, he was elected captain of the freshman wrestling team.

The following year, wrestling his first year on the varsity, Starnes was associated with what is perhaps the greatest bunch of grapplers ever turned out by Duke University. Included in the line up of that team were: Applewhite, 115 pounds, Gode, 125, Starnes, 135, Warren, 140, Cole, 145, Jones, 175, and Captain Hank Culp, unlimited. Of that bunch, Applewhite, Starnes, Jones and Culp were aced as all-southern and Duke had an undisputed claim to the Southern championship.

Last year, Starnes again wrestled on a team that had a claim to the southern championship, sharing that claim with V. M. I. At the close of that season, Starnes and Captain Ole Jones of the 1929 team, were given major letters as awards for not having lost a match in two years.

So, with his career as a wrestler at Duke about to close, Ralph Starnes, captain of the team to close, Ralph Starnes, has been wrestling within 8.5 of a second of the freshman.

Captain Starnes Leads Team North on First Trip for Year for Duke Matmen

MEET F. & M. ON MONDAY

Starnes and Knowles Only Veterans of Last Year's Southern Champ Team Back to Wrestle this Year.

The Duke wrestlers, led by Captain Ralph Starnes, leave the fair of the Princeton Tigers to open the season in the north. The Blue Devils take as Princeton Saturday afternoon, and wrestle Franklin and Marshall the following Monday at Lancaster, Pa. This match with Princeton will be the first one in which both the Blue Devil and the Tiger have figured. Matches with Franklin and Marshall have featured the Duke schedule for the past two seasons.

With one of the hardest schedules in Duke ring history facing him, Coach Thron has the most inexperienced team turned out in the past four years. Captain Ralph Starnes, all-southern for the past two years, is the only real veteran on the squad. Captain Starnes will no doubt hit the 135 pound berth. Elton Knowles, the only other letter man back, wrestled in the 160 pound class last year and can hardly be classed as a veteran. Knowles seems to have a clear inside track in the 160 pound class just at present and will more than likely hold down that weight in all matches this year.

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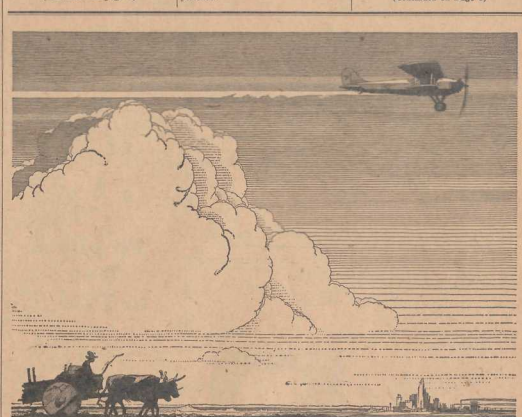

southern record, now held by Earhardt, former Duke star, in the 50 yard dash. Bravley holds the North Carolina Y. M. C. A. records in the 50 and 100 yard dashes, having won both of these events in a statewide meet held last summer. Bravley was also high scorer on the team last year.

In the distances, Captain Baughman and Jimmy Smathers seem to be heading the van, with Rutzshier, Livergood, and Atkins giving them close competition. Atkins and Smathers are sophomores, while the other distance men are veterans of last years' team.

The breast stroke events, in which Fred Earhardt has won southern championships for the past three years, have only one veteran of last year, Herb O'Keefe, to fill in Fred's shoes. O'Keefe is swimming his fourth year on the varsity squad, and seems to be heading for the first breast-stroke place on the Duke team.

He placed fourth in the breast stroke events in the annual Mid-Atlantic block last summer, and first in the North Carolina Y. M. C. A. meet in the same events. Reynolds, a senior swimming his first year on the varsity, and Davis Earhardt are fighting it out for second man on the breast stroke events.

In the back stroke events, Captain Baughman will swim first man for Duke. Baughman is swimming his third year in the varsity.

these events, and is rated as being one of the leading men in the swim in his event. Livergood and Atkins are the most likely candidates for the second man's place in the back stroke events.

A relay team of four men will be picked from the following: Captain Baughman, Bravley, Hannan, Smith, Smathers, and Rutzshier.

Next to the dukes, the Devilfish are perhaps strongest in the diving, with three of last years' men back, Dick Stearns, Alton Muller, and Al Dene. Stearns and Muller dived in all the meets last year while Dene has been on the team for the past two years. Stearns was his letter last year. Bill Franklin, and Al Sexton are also showing up well in the diving.

The Devilfish are heading up against a hard schedule this year, meeting Virginia twice, Washington and Lee once, and other tentative meets and the Southern Conference Tournament ending the season. This will be the first Conference swimming tournament to be held, and Duke should show up well in it. It will be held in conjunction with the basketball tournament in Atlanta on March 2nd.

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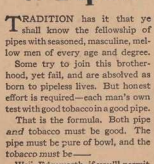

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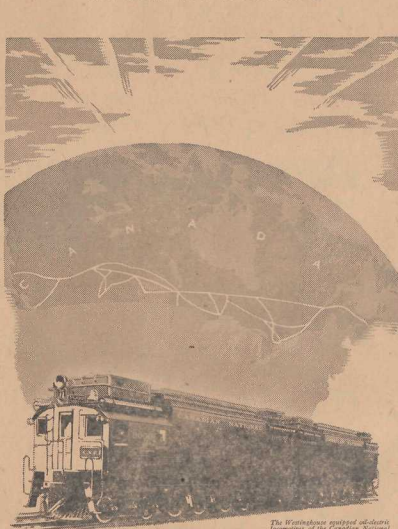
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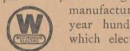
ATTENTION in railway circles focuses this year on a spectacular undertaking by the Canadian National Railways—the electrification of certain trains on non-electric lines.
