Duke Swimmers To Meet Generals Here Saturday In Initial Encounter

NAVY SCUTTLED IN FRAY WITH DEVILS

Duke Takes Revenge for Defeat Last Year at Hands of Middies in Game of Easy Scoring

A decisive 47 to 25 victory over Navy on Saturday afternoon closed one of the greatest weeks in the history of basketball at Duke, and stamped the outfit as one of the best in the East. To quote a Washington newspaper, "The Southerners flashed as versatile an attack as ever seen on any court." As soon as the game opened the superiority of the Devils became apparent, and it wasn't long before they pulled away, holding a 21 to 0 advantage at the intermission. Speed, accurate teamwork, and brilliant individual work all combined to produce a wonderful exhibition of how the game should be played.

Middie, following the first quarter the Soules were only one point behind, but after Rogers broke loose to tally eight points there wasn't anything to it. As is his habit, Duke sometimes neglected defense in order to increase her score, and this policy, as usual, was well repaid. First, they took a 21-0 lead, and with Werber coming down from his guard position to feed the ball to team-mates, and frequently score himself, Navy seemed totally unable to cope with the situation. The entire team functioned like the proverbial machine, Councillor and Werber especially giving a great exhibition of offensive play, combining fast dribbling and swift shooting to ring up a total between them of 21 points. Rogers, however, was high scorer with 14, while Joe Cronan had to content himself with 8 while waging a merry battle with Captain Olsotok, the Navy's big star, who got the same number. Cronan, while fairly well covered by his opponent, got no tap nearly all the time, and Duke frequently scored directly on top-off plays. Cap Farley, while not as much in the limelight as his team-mates, scored the remaining points and played his usual fine all-around game.

Navy tried any number of combinations in an effort to tie the streak of baskets; at the close of the game they had four centers on the floor at various positions, and strange to say this combination did better than any of the others, which isn't saying very much. The game (Continued on Page 6)

DEVILS NOSE OUT TERRAPIN TEAM

Game Ends with Duke One Point Lead, Causing Ye Sports Editor to Have Heart Failure

After severely trouncing Virginia on Wednesday night, the Duke Blue Devils continued their good work and defeated the Maryland Terrapins by a score of 28 to 27 on Thursday night. The game was so hotly contested from start to finish that spectators believed it the most exciting game ever played at College Park.

Cronan was the high scorer of the game with nine points to his credit. He scored four field goals and one foul. Gayler of Maryland was the next high man with three field goals and two goals from the foul line.

The Duke boys have more than excellent playing ability they have the spirit which will always make them winners.

Blue Devil Swimmers Seek Revenge for Defeat at Hands of Generals Last Year

GENERALS HAVE FAST MEN

Brawley and Hannah Showing Up Well for Duke in the 100 and 500 Yards Dash, Also Strong in Diving with Vets Stearns and Sadler of Last Year

The Duke Blue Devils Christmas vacation getting into shape for the first meet of the year, to be swum with Washington and Lee here Saturday afternoon. This meet, which is called for 3:30 o'clock, should prove to be a fast one, as Duke will be out for revenge, having lost to the Generals last year in Lexington.

Coach Twombly of the Generals has a wealth of fast dash men to bring down with him, as he had a mighty fast freshman relay team last year, from which he can draw for this year's varsity. To offset this strong point of the Generals, Duke has two better men to swim in the dashes. Zip Brawley and Hans Hannah both showing up well so far in the 500 and 100 yard dashes. Sam Smith, another likely looking dash man of the Devils, will not be eligible to swim until after the first half. Brawley and Hannah are expected to carry the lead well Saturday, however. Johnny Blattenberg, veteran distance man of last year is also available for the dashes if necessary, but he will more than likely be used in the distances again against Washington and Lee. Jimmy Smathers, frosh dash man of last year, is also out for the dashes, but also looks better in the distances.

In the diving Duke should also be strong with Dick "Pretty" Stearns, letter man of last year, and Alton Sadler, veteran of last year also back on the team. The dives at W. & L. last year gave the Duke men a run for the first place, but with a year's experience back of them, the Duksters should show up well Saturday.

With Captain Baughman in the back stroke event, Duke should be strong in that event. Baughman, swimming his third year on the varsity, is expected by the coaches this year to show up well in the conference tournament. Charlie Livergood, distance man on last year's squad is also swimming back stroke, with Bob Atkins and Bruce Reynolds pushing him well Saturday.

DEVIL QUINT WINS CAVALIER BATTLE

Duke Doubles Score on Virginia to Win Easily Opening Game of Season

The Blue Devils from Duke University began their invasion of the North last Wednesday night with a spectacular victory at the expense of the Virginia Cavaliers. When the final whistle sounded, the Devils were resting on the upper end of a 65 to 32 score.

It was the official opening game for both teams, and the dazzling floor-work coupled with an uncanny eye for the basket placed the veteran Duke team as a serious contender for the Conference crown, in accordance with all pre-season dope concerning the runners-up at the conference meet last winter.

Starting the game with a grand rush, the Devils rung the basket for 16 points before the Virginians shot a field goal. Due to their excellent passing attack the Duke quint often were open for chances at the basket when the half had ended the score stood 14 to 17 in their favor.

Joe Cronan, Duke's pride at center, was the high point man of the contest registering a total of 18 points, including eight field goals and two free throws. Chalky Councillor played a great game at his forward post and was credited with 14 points for the evening, close behind were Werber and Rogers with ten counters each. Even the reserves showed that they, too, were deserving of praise when they were given their chance on the court. Involving the Tiger of Princeton's lair on Saturday, Duke's team with only two veterans of last year's championship team back met defeat by the score of 19 to 3. Duke's three points were scored by Cap't. Stearns in the 135 pound class with a victory over Kent. The whole team fought gamely but there was no match for the more experienced Tiger matmen. Princeton scored three falls and three decisions. In the 175 pound class, Perry of Duke was ineligible, and the match was forfeited. An exhibition was held and Perry drew his opponent, Linde.

Monday night saw the Duksters at Lancaster, Pa., the home of Franklin and Marshall. The Devils fared better in this meet although they were defeated 23 to 11. The matches were very interesting throughout and the efforts of the grapplers brought many cheers from the crowd that packed the Armory at P. & M.

A crowd estimated at 2,500 witnessed the matches. The Duke team, weakened by their recent hard battle with Princeton fought very gamely, but could not come up to the attack of the Northerners. Hughes of Duke, wrestling in the low limited class threw his man for Duke's (Continued on Page 6)

Although track is usually associated with spring, and is, according to even the most optimistic of calculations, still a couple of months distant, the varsity aspirants are already beginning to work out in preparation for the season's opening meet.
