## Simon, Heizer, Freeman, Place In Indoor Meet

Bill Simon Takes Second Place in Two Mile Run Tourney in Track Hill

W. AND L. TAKES FIRST

Everything is in Fine Shape; Big Stars Compete for Southern Titles

Going up before much superior appears the Duke Indoor track meet was able to show up well enough to take a 1-2 point. There was no hope of the Duke doing any great work due to a lack of good seasonal material. Bill Simon, star distance man, was the outstanding Duke man in the meet which was held in the Tux Can at Carolina. Simon took second place in the two mile run.

Washington and Lee barely showed out Carolina by a 20-27 score for first place. The Generals took first in the mile race 6-4 to make the final two points for the championship. Maryland and Georgia took third place, both schools showing.

In the two mile race Young of Tech was the winner. This man has not limited his wins to the South, but has taken part in the Midwest games, and several other outstanding northern track meets. As the start of the run both Young and Simon ran together. Simon was able to keep up the pace throughout the first mile, but early in the second the Tech man slowly pulled away. Simon put every ounce of muscle into play, but was unable to equal the long strides of his opponent. Heizer, also of Duke took fourth place in the same event. "He ran a nice race."

Chas Freeman, representing Duke in the high jump, tied for fourth place with Kennedy of South Carolina. Freeman was the only other Duke man to make a show.

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## VIRGINIA MILITARY INSTITUTE TAKES CONFERENCE MEET

Duke Sends Up Team Handicapped by Loss of Men Due to Ineligibility and Graduation

FOURMAN TEAM IS SENT

Gamble, Perry, Matheson and Hughes Represent Duke in First Annual Tournament

 The Duke Gryphons took fifth place in the first Southern Conference Wrestling Tournament. This tournament was sponsored by V. P. L. and was held at Lexington, Virginia on March 6th and 7th. Virginia Military Institute was the tournament winner by an overwhelming score, coming within a point of doubling the score on V. P. L. who took second place. V. M. I. had a score of 23; V. P. L. 17. U. N. C. and W. and L. tied for third with 13 and 12. Duke placed fifth with 6 points.

Duke entered men in four weight groups, but gave an excellent exhibition in all of them. In the 115 pound class Gamble of Duke was defeated by Foyette of V. M. I., but won third place by defeating Smith of W. and L. in the consolation match. In the 145 pound class Matheson of Duke was eliminated by Foyette of V. M. I. In the 165 pound class, Perry of Duke defeated Cecil of V. P. L. in the preliminary bout, but lost the final match to a time advantage of one minute and fifty seconds to Tallman of V. P. L. This last match was considered to have been the closest and best fight in the whole tournament.

Tallman won the championship, but the result might have been very different if it had not been Perry's excellent fight on the same day, while Tallman was fighting his first match. Next day Perry fought a third fight and was second place by defeating Hall of W. and L. in the unlimb class Mitchell defeated Hughes of Duke by a 15-0 score. The final of V. M. I. defeated the consolation fight to Hughes giving him this place.

Severely handicapped by losses from last year and wrestlers being in the eligible list, the Duke boys delivered themselves remarkably well.

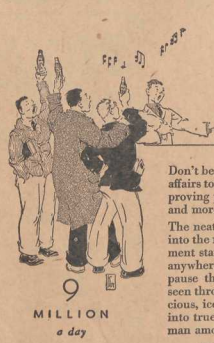

season's record (including the tournament games) shows a total of eighteen victories while in the other column there are only two reverses, these reverses came at the hands of W. & L. (who were also defeated by the Blue Devils later in the season) and Alabama. The record shows victories over North Carolina, North Carolina State, Wake Forest, Davidson, and Maryland, each of these teams were defeated twice by the Blue Devils; those who suffered only one defeat, Loyola, Navy, Georgia Tech, Swannoe,

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Kentucky, Washington and Lee, South Carolina, and Virginia. The Blue Devils had an average offensive strength of over 34 points per game. The highest total score coming at the expense of the Virginia Cavaliers the Blue Devils scored 65 points in that game. The lowest score of the season came in the final game with Alabama, the Devils scoring only 24 points.

One game in particular has undoubtedly resulted in the national recognition of Duke's athletic teams. The game that we speak of was the one in which the Blue Devils defeated the powerful Loyola, a quietest from Chicago.

Upon narrowing down to the competition inside of the state the record of last season shows that the Blue Devils won only five games out of the eight on the

schedule, while during the past season the Devils won every one of the eight games on schedule.

All in all the past season was a great one and our hats are off to those who made it the overwhelming success that it was, and this goes double for those who are leaving school via sheepskin this year, namely Payley, Werber, Counselor and Thorne.

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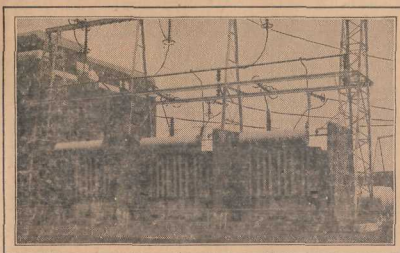
