The Gobline club of Duke University will be installed as Gamma chapter of Sigma Nu fraternity on November 20 through the 22. Following the Doris Kagan concert on Friday evening, November 20, the installation dance will be given in the ballroom of the west campus Union.

Installation of active and alumni members will take place on Saturday morning and is to be followed by a Sigma Nu luncheon. After the Carolina Games, the local chapter will be held at an open house for the delegates and Sigma Nu visitors. The formal fraternity banquet beginning at seven o'clock Saturday evening will be presided over by Dr. Archibald Henderson of the University of North Carolina. Central and Eastern alumni of this and other states will be included in the banquet program as speakers.

On Sunday morning at 10:30 o'clock, Reverend Thomas Wright of Chapel Hill will conduct a special service in which the Gobline club will be dedicated to the Sigma Nu.

The Gobline club was founded in 1928 by Dr. Paul Monroe, eminent educator, as the express purpose of bringing their fraternity to the Duke campus. The petition for the charter was signed and passed by the grand chapter meeting during August of this year at Big-win Inn, Lake of the Bays, Ontario.

HEAD OF PHYSICS GROUP SPEAKS TO FROSH STUDENTS

Prof. Edwards Addresses 250
First-Year Men on History
of Science

EDISON AS AN EXAMPLE

Cited to Illustrate One of Two Types
of Our Outstanding
Scientists

Professor C. W. Edwards, head of the physics department of the Duke University, gave an interesting and informative lecture to between 200 and 250 first-year students, at 7 o'clock last Thursday evening, in the lecture room of the west campus. Tracing the history of the search for light, Professor Edwards told his audience that there were scientists of two kinds, those pure scientists, so-called, who had fundamental conception of the nature of light and principles, and those in the industrial world who set the principles to work for industry. Both are indispensable in their own way, supplementing each other.

The speaker pointed out that as the family is the greatest institution of sacredness here in the world, so the Kingdom of God is recognized as the "family of God, in Christ," thus being based on love.

"Nothing shall separate us from the Kingdom of God if we have that conception of God as being the power which is manifested in these acts," said Dean Russell, in conclusion.

The speaker at next week's service will be Dr. Tullifer Thompson, professor of religious education in Union Theological seminary, Richmond. Dr. Thompson will be on the campus Saturday, Sunday and Monday. In addition to his talk at the chapel service, he will speak at the various class meetings and at Dean Herring's Sunday school class.
