Blue Devil Boxers Lose To Heels In Close Meet

FOUR KNOCKOUTS Winslow and Bolich Look Very Impressive in Heavier Weights With Knockouts

BLUE IMPS TROUNCED 5-2 Crowd of 2500 Watch Exciting Bout; Sides, in First Variety Fight, Wins Decision

Cardina defeated the Duke pugilists in a dual meet at the Tin Can last night, but the Tar Heels knew they had not a fine team before the matches were over. The final result was 5-2 in favor of the Hill lads, but the whole Blue Devil squad came through in a manner which satisfied every Duke fan who witnessed the bouts. Winslow and Bolich were particularly impressive, for the Pennsylvania boy put his man away after two minutes of fighting in the second round, and the Duke captain came through from the infirmary, put on his gloves, and outboxed by 20 pounds, he knocked Carpath through the ropes with a terrific right after one minute of boxing in the first round.

Sides, in the 135 lb. class, made a good showing in his first fight, and under a crowd and was a close decision over Rayner. Winslow and Scott lost by close margins to Williams and Leaton respectively. Lloyd put up a particularly good scrap had many of the Durham fans were inclined to think that the bout should have been a draw.

Captain Bolich, Heavily Outweighed, Loses Final Bout Against Carter

WINSLOW FIGHTS GEMELY

Scott, Hyatt, and Lloyd Garner Three Points For Duke Against Conference Champ

Virginia had a severe test in his first defense of the Southern Conference boxing championship, and was extended to the limit to win by a scanty margin of 1 to 3 from the balters of Duke here Saturday night.

Two thousand fans watched the Blue Devils fight for the first time under the wing of Add Warren, who with only two letters back from last year gives the prospect of producing a worthy set of winners.

Duke Captain, Henry, 181 champion, who won the victory for the Cavaliers by outpointing Captain Phil Bolich in the final bout on the card, Bolich's defeat was the first he has suffered in dual meets during his college career.

Don Hyatt, Duke heavyweight, scored the most sensational knockout of the evening when he clubbed Russ into submission in the second round.

Lloyd gave Duke a lead in the first bout by knocking out Russell in the second round.

The 125-pound test between Scott of Duke, and Spiker, of Virginia, went an extra round at the end of which the referee gave his decision to Scott, Champion Tom Fishburn, Virginia 135-pounder, took a decision from Tom Miller. The fight marked Miller's return to the ring after a year's lay-off.

Stuart, Virginia 145-pounder, was scored for the coast of 8 by Frank Barnette in the first round, but he came back strong in the second, knocking Barnette down three times before Barnette was in the towel.

Chuck Winslow gave Doug Myers, Virginia champion, a hard battle in the 125-pound class, but was outclassed and Referee Elms stopped the bout in the second round. Both fighters were exhausted.

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Figures Depict Gain in Library Book Circulation

The Duke university library authors the report that the circulation in the general library and in that of the school of religion are reaching high peaks, as shown from past estimate of circulation for the year beginning July 1st, 1932, and ending June 30th, 1933, which totaled 184,000. Figures totaled from last July 1st to January 1st, 1933, number 96,341, which reveals a slight increase in circulation.

Circulation is divided as follows: Two week books drawn from the main desk amount to 25,000 for the half year; books taken out overnight from the graduate student reserve room number 2435, which does not include the large number handled daily library circulation in the school of religion is 7215; there have been 5185 books charged to the church, which are books in the stacks for the convenience of graduate students and where books may be kept for an indefinite period of time; lastly, books circulated in the reserve room in the dormitories of the library have attained the high figure of 55,616 within the six months.

The graduate reading room, already mentioned, has at this stage circulated more than 10,000 in all of last year, estimated at 2225, as compared to the present record of 3325.

The largest single day's circulation from the main desk were as high as 375 on Monday, December 17th, and this was almost equaled on another Monday, January 4th, when there was a circulation of 363. From the reserve room the heaviest day's work came early in November when 785 were issued to students and faculty.

Duke Library Possesses Remarkable Collection

An unusually extensive and complete file of newspapers may be found in the newspaper room of the main library on the West campus. More than six thousand volumes representing 107 cities in 42 states and the District of Columbia and 33 foreign countries compose the collection. Besides its use for general reading purposes, the collection furnishes a fertile field for research work for graduate students, especially those in the departments of English and history.

Of the six states in the United States not represented, all are west of the Mississippi. The bulk of the foreign papers are from cities in England, France, and Germany, while Japan, Spain, Italy, Belgium, Switzerland, Austria, Holland, and various South American countries are well represented.

The nucleus of the present collection was formed when Dr. W. K. Boyd was student in Trinity college. Dr. Boyd secured two volumes of old North Carolina newspapers, thus beginning the present library collection. After becoming a member of the history department faculty of Trinity, Dr. Boyd made additions to the original volume with files of Virginia and South Carolina newspapers.

From time to time new additions were made until the collection assumed its present magnitude.

One of the valuable collections of files in the newspaper room is that of old colonial papers from the New England states and from North Carolina and Virginia. A large group of anti-bellum and Confederate War newspapers and papers published in the South during the Reconstruction period are valued parts of the collection. Complete files of newspapers from Germany, Austria, and France which were published during the World War, together with a complete file of the *London Times* are on file.

Miss Allene Rummage and N. M. Blake have charge of the division. An excellent system of indexing and arrangement is used for the convenience of those using the files. Various historical sketches and informational notes are appended to each file. The unusual growth of the collection may be indicated by the fact that 1,480 volumes were added last year, with larger numbers of additions expected during the present year.
