The best received numbers of the whole program were rendered by the quartet, which sang several religious songs followed by many encores.

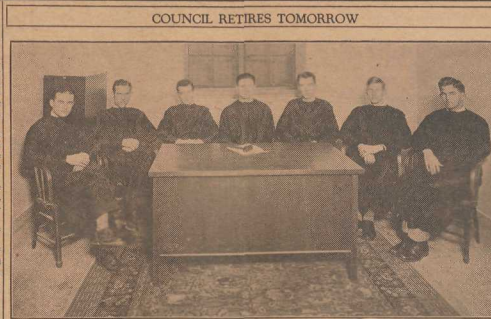
The singing in all the numbers was uniformly good.

Student Government Work Is Shown By Typical Case

Enroll's Note—Shown little has hitherto been known of the inner workings of the Student Council, we present our readers with a summary of the action, consensus, opinion, and dissenting opinion of a case tried this year by the governing body.

In the above case a student was involved for dishonest conduct in laboratory work, the defendant admitted copying drawings. His reason was that he necessarily missed a good deal of work.

THE ACTION
A motion was passed that the defendant be expelled from school, this sentence to be suspended on the condition that he make 30 quality points during the spring and that he break no law of the men's association.

CONCURRENCE OPINION
In light of our recent decision handed down in the Roberts' case, when the Council deviated from the strict letter of the law by passing a suspended sentence in order that the defendant might have an opportunity to live down his mistake and prove his worth to the community, the Majority feels that this suspended sentence is justified since it is an endeavor to aid the man, rather than to punish him, and at the same time making his residence here contingent upon his ability to readjust himself to our accepted mode of living. This humanitarian at-

titude is prompted by our realizing the fact that most college men are going through a period of adjustment and are most susceptible to making mistakes. The Majority, also, reasoned that the copying of laboratory drawings is not considered by the students on this campus as being as serious as cheating on examinations, therefore this case does have mitigating circumstances which are provided for in Article 4 Section 3 of the Constitution. Therefore, let the law be at side if it does not meet with the sense of justice both of the community and the judges assembled.

In its opinion the facts as presented to the Council fail to prove that there were mitigating circumstances prevailing in each degree of preference as to alleviate the application of Article 6, Section 3 of the Constitution. The accused pleads guilty to a major offense, and since his future position, that of a medical doctor, is to be one in which the public will necessarily and rightfully expect him to be in the opinion of the Minority, it is best, in the opinion of the Minority, to prevent such a misplacement of trust which might result disastrously to those whom the accused served in his professional capacity.

With original plays selected from Professor West's class in play writing, Theta Alpha Phi will present in the little theatre about the middle of May a bill of four one-act plays written, directed, and acted by members of the college community.

The winning plays, selected by members of the dramatic fraternity, are announced as follows: "Katie" and "Honey," both written by J. B. Clark, "Mother Says Yes" by Kathleen Holloway, and "Ireland Must Be Heaven," by Ernest Lynch. The authors of the plays will direct, and will have the privilege of including their casts, all the work being done under the supervision of Mr. West, who is director of campus dramatics.

This is the first year that a program of this kind is being presented on the Duke campus, and in doing so, Theta Alpha Phi hopes to stimulate a new and greater interest in creative dramatic work and expression. The Duke Players have offered their assistance in the preparations, and have agreed to lend the little theatre for the presentation, as well as to cooperate in casting the plays. It is planned to give the bill of three or four nights, the first being restricted to invited members of the administration, of the Duke Players, and of Theta Alpha Phi, while the second and third nights will be open to all persons interested in dramatics both in the city of Durham and on the campus.

Try-outs for the four plays will be held in the little theatre immediately after the regular opening of the Duke Players next Thursday night, and all persons on the campus that wish to come out are invited to attend and be prepared for casting.

HEIRING GIVES TALK ON INADEQUACY OF SCIENCE

One must have "something more than mere scientific facts" to solve the problems of human relationships," Dean Herring told his Sunday School class last Sunday morning. The engagement and vital companion to scientific fact is an inspired, dynamic faith like that of Abraham, the Dean stated; the theory of temporary expediency cannot suffice. One must have a faith, and act upon it.

During the morning the question of the time for the Sabbath service in the new chapel for the coming year was taken to a vote.
