Red Nichols has been well known in musical circles for many years. He is known as Red Nichols and his orchestra. His orchestra has been expanded and continued to rate as a top attraction.

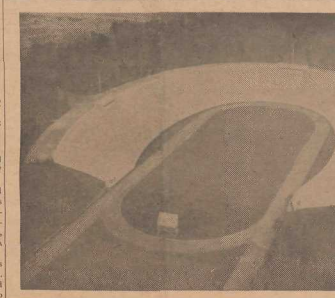
To accommodate the orchestra a half-circle has been built to the front of the band box.

The releases will be handled through the North Carolina state bureau at Raleigh, which Miss Thompson is manager.
