









# TECH'S DEFEAT OF DUKES TOPICS AGAINST DUKE

## WITH THE BLUE DEVILS

FOR THE FIRST time last Saturday the student body had a glimpse of the 1934 football squad in action, and by "squad" it is meant that about three times, 20 men, saw action against Clemson.

Most spectators have been convinced that the Duke's cheer is worthy of being called the successor to last fall's outfit. The Devils, led by the three-pointed spearhead of Cornelius, Alexander, and Parker, jabbed the Tiger's skin hard to ring up three touchdowns, all accomplished through the famed Clemson line that held the Tech running attack.

A sports reporter wrote that "Tiger players still held the Yellow Jackets running offensive in higher esteem than the running play of Duke. But this attitude seems somewhat futile when it is considered that the Blue Devil victory was only in a small part of the game, and while they were the first string backs three scores, directly resulted of running plays."

Jack Alexander gives promise that he will crank any line, judging from those ripping plays over the left side of the field that is clearest in the stadium, while Parker kicked and ran the ball well in his home appearance.

### Cornelius Pals the Spectacular Play

Averaging seven yards each time he carried the ball, before Corey eluded his long joints with touchdowns. Cornelius' ability as a hunked field runner definitely came to light against the Tigers. Taking a long Clemson punt on its own 35-yard marker, Cornelius hit out for six yards. With four Tiger linemen a few yards from him when he received the punt Corey took the side-line running down of his opponents and cutting made of one, and then as his mate formed to block for him he traversed down the stripes, feet flashing about on the outside boundary, towards the goal and his last touchdown, a perfect exhibition of speed and skill.

"Four Divisions of the Orchestra as Made by Haydn" Subject of Lecture

The study of the symphony orchestra has been selected as a subject for a series of musical lectures, which are conducted by Mrs. J. Foster Barnes during each Friday's chapel on the Woman's campus.
